It's high adventure as astros spacewalk

CAPE CANAVERAL — Two astronauts stepped out yesterday for NASA's first Thanksgiving Day spacewalk to hook up the plumbing on the international space station's newest addition, a 45-foot high-tech beam.

It was the second spacewalk this week for shuttle Endeavour crewmen Michael Lopez-Alegria and John Herrington, the first American Indian in space.

They connected fluid lines on the \$390 million space station girder that was delivered by Endeavour. Ammonia eventually will flow through the pipes to cool the orbiting complex.

The highlight of the six-hour spacewalk came at the end.

Herrington anchored his feet at the end of the space station's 58-foot robot arm and lifted the 600-pound rail cart that was launched atop the beam. Astronauts inside steered Herrington, with the wag-

on tight in his hands, to the girder on the opposite end about 50 feet away so he could fasten the cart to an identical one already there.

"I never thought I'd be doing this in my life — wow!" Herrington said.

He marveled at the moon rising over the Indian Ocean. "I'd love to take a picture," he said, but noted his hands were full.

The dramatic half-hour ride 250 miles up involved a swing of 180 degrees from one girder to the other. The carts are intended for use by spacewalkers during space station construction.

Herrington and Lopez-Alegria, both 44-year-old Navy pilots, will conduct a third and final spacewalk tomorrow to wrap up work on the new girder.

Americans have been in orbit on 10 previous Thanksgivings, but remained inside their spacecraft.

PETA skewered for turkey ad

NORFOLK, Va. — The nation's largest animal-rights group is under fire for a television campaign featuring a "turkey terrorist" taking hostages in a supermarket.

The commercial by the People for the Ethical Treatment of Animals depicts a store manager being bound and gagged and shoppers taken hostage while an unseen terrorist threatens to beat, scald and dismember anyone who resists.

The terrorist is revealed to be a turkey puppet, which urges people to

stop eating meat. The ad is appearing only on one local station.

"It is always inappropriate to promote propaganda that puts fear in anyone's mind," said Sherrie Rosenblatt, spokeswoman for the National Turkey Federation.

Norfolk-based PETA did not apologize for the commercial, despite a pledge following the Sept. 11, 2001, terrorist attacks that it would play down its incendiary messages.

"A fake supermarket takeover has zip to do with the events of Sept. 11," said spokeswoman Lisa Lange.

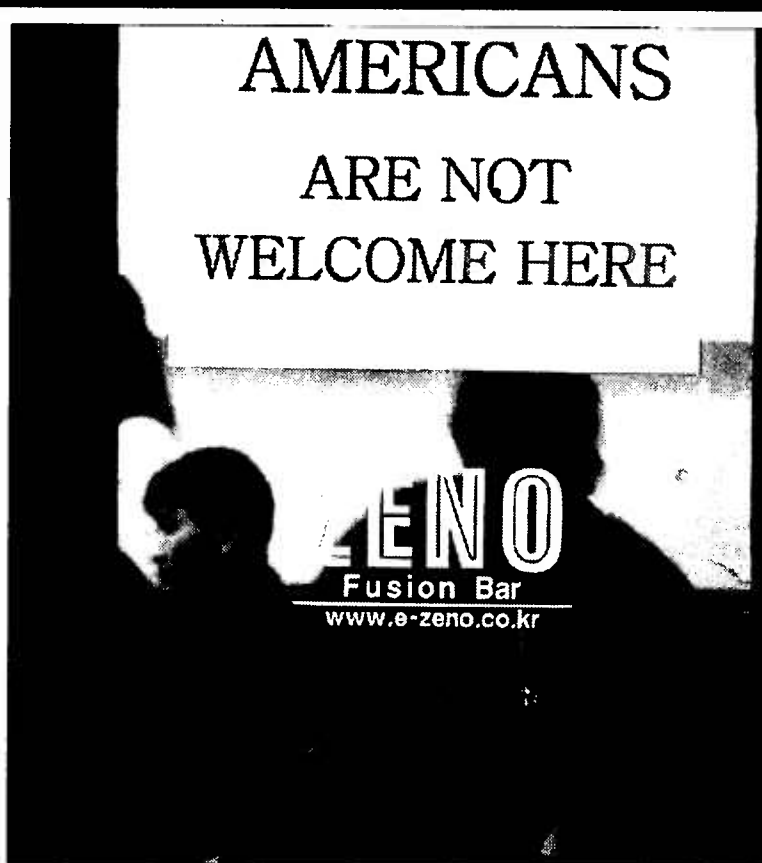

The Company proposes changes to its electric demand response programs under Riders P (installed capacity purchases), U (voluntary load reductions), V (emergency demand response) and W (day-ahead demand reduction). Changes are intended to encourage customers' participation in these programs, conform the programs to changes made in NYISO ("New York Independent System Operator") programs, and provide for consistency in terminology among the riders.

Proposed changes include: (a) Rider P - provide energy payments (in addition to existing capacity payments) with penalties for failure to perform, to conform to NYISO program changes; (b) Rider U - change program name to "Distribution Load Relief Program" (to better communicate program purpose and operation) and lower eligibility requirement to 50 kW to encourage greater participation; (c) Rider V - extend eligibility to retail access customers; and (d) Rider W - set customers' minimum bid at five cents/kWh to conform to NYISO program changes. The Company also proposes to extend the program end-dates for Riders U, V and W.

Bali suspect confessed, top cop says

JAKARTA, Indonesia — In the first major break in the inquiry into the Bali nightclub bombings, Indonesia's police chief said yesterday that a suspect in custody has admitted having taken part in the attack that killed nearly 200 people.

Police said they were looking into possible connections between the suspect and a regional terror group with links to Al Qaeda.

Siege toll rises

MOSCOW — Russian prosecutors said that 128 hostages died during last month's theater siege in Moscow by Chechen militants — eight more than previously revealed, Russian news agencies reported yesterday.

In addition, 41 attackers were killed.

The Moscow city prosecutor's office published a list with the names of 120 Russians and eight foreigners — from Belarus, Kazakhstan, Ukraine, Austria, the United States and the Netherlands. It said that five of the victims had died of gunshot wounds, three more than reported before, the Interfax news agency said. Also Thursday, Moscow

police said one of the Chechen gunmen killed in the raid was the organizer of an Oct. 19 car bombing outside a McDonald's restaurant that killed one person. The police said the information came from a search at the residence of other suspects, but did not name the alleged organizer.

Drug lord out

TUNJA, Colombia — A Colombian court ordered one of the country's former top drug lords released from prison yesterday, as investigators scrambled to find evidence to support further charges, and possibly his extradition to the United States.

Gilberto Rodriguez Orejuela and his brother Miguel once controlled the Cali drug cartel, an empire that moved multi-ton shipments of cocaine across the globe.

In yesterday's ruling, Judge Luz Amanda Moncada forced the government to observe another judge's ruling last week to release Gilberto Rodriguez but ruled that Miguel Rodriguez must stay in prison to serve out a four-year additional sentence for a bribery charge.

Relic not for sale

JERUSALEM — Breaking his silence, the reclusive owner of an ancient burial box said yesterday he will never sell what may be the

oldest archeological link to Jesus, but that he is willing to have it exhibited in Israel.

The inscription on the limestone box reads "James, son of Joseph, brother of Jesus," leading some scholars to believe it contained the remains of James, the brother of Jesus of Nazareth. Others have said it might be a forgery, or that it might have been the burial box of a different James.

The existence of the box was revealed last month by the Biblical Archaeology Review.

Spy-scare arrest

BELFAST — Detectives investigating alleged Irish Republican Army spying arrested a British civil servant yesterday who

worked in the heart of Northern Ireland's suspended Catholic-Protestant administration, police said.

The official, who was not immediately identified, had been one of more than 300 civil servants with access to papers in the joint office of David Trimble, the administration's senior Protestant, and Mark Durkan, its top Catholic.

Yesterday's arrest spread fears that the spying scandal, which already has scuttled Catholic-Protestant power-sharing, could be more widespread than previously thought.

Fort killings tied to marital stress

FORT BRAGG, N.C. — Several killings this summer involving couples at the Fort Bragg Army base probably were due to existing marital problems and the stress of separation, military investigators reported yesterday.

Their study also asserted that military culture discourages soldiers and their families from seeking help.

"There was a prevalent attitude that seeking behavioral health care was not career-safe," said Col. Dave Orman, a psy-

chiatrist.

Earlier intervention could prevent future tragedies — meaning mental health specialists should be in combat battalions, as chaplains are, the report said.

The investigators also said that the anti-malaria drug Lariam, given to troops sent overseas, is unlikely to have been a factor. Side effects of the drug, also known as mefloquine, have been known to include psychotic episodes.

Con Edison Proposes Changes to its Electric Demand Response Programs

Consolidated Edison Company of New York, Inc. ("Con Edison" or the "Company") has filed with the Public Service Commission (the "Commission") changes to its electric rate schedule, P.S.C. No. 9 - Electricity. The Company proposes changes to its electric demand response programs under Riders P (installed capacity purchases), U (voluntary load reductions), V (emergency demand response) and W (day-ahead demand reduction). Changes are intended to encourage customers' participation in these programs, conform the programs to changes made in NYISO ("New York Independent System Operator") programs, and provide for consistency in terminology among the riders.

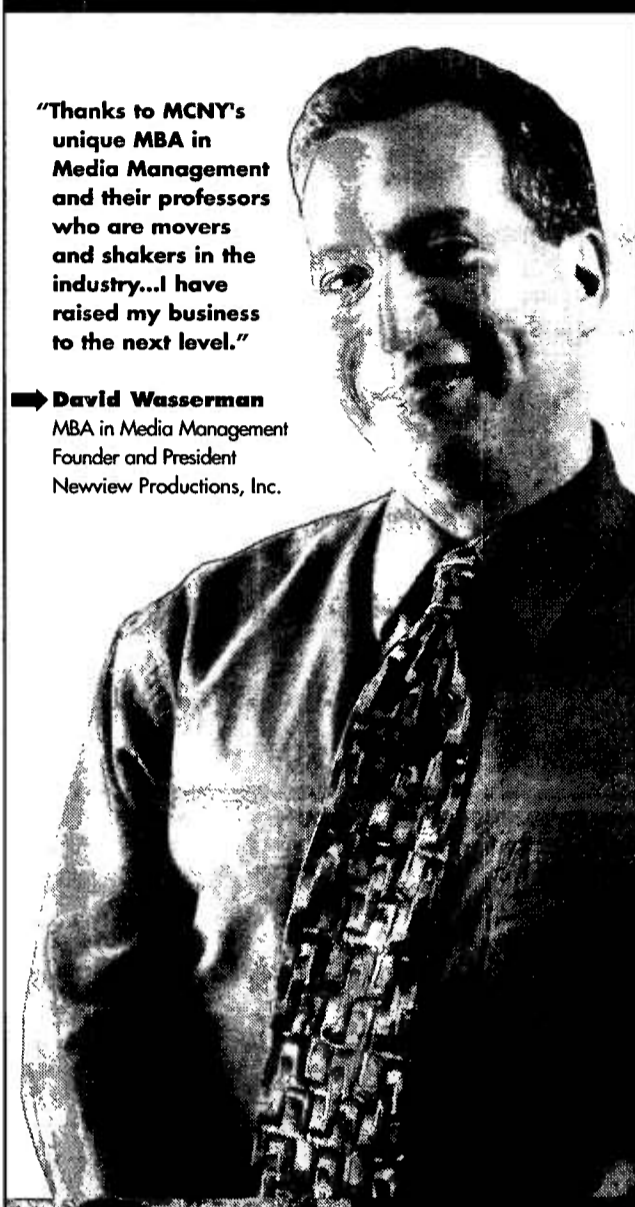
Proposed changes include: (a) Rider P - provide energy payments (in addition to existing capacity payments) with penalties for failure to perform, to conform to NYISO program changes; (b) Rider U - change program name to "Distribution Load Relief Program" (better communicate program purpose and operation) and lower eligibility requirement to 50 kW to encourage greater participation; (c) Rider V - extend eligibility to retail access customers; and (d) Rider W - set customers' minimum bid at five cents/kWh to conform to NYISO program changes. The Company also proposes to extend the program end-dates for Riders U, V and W.

The filing, which is subject to Commission review and approval, is proposed to become effective January 27, 2003. Complete copies of the filing are available for your inspection at the office of the Commission, One Penn Plaza, 8th Floor, New York, New York 10019, and at offices where applications for Con Edison service may be made.
