

Manhattan

■ Cops are looking for a sorry excuse for a bandit, who donned a medical mask and a white bandanna before making a failed attempt to rob a Midtown bank.

The man walked into the Capital One branch at West 31st Street and Seventh Avenue at around 10:50 a.m. yesterday and passed a teller a note demanding cash, cops said.

When the teller refused, the would-be bandit fled empty-handed.

■ A man with a taste for fine fashion was collared after attempting to abscond from Bloomingdale's with thousands of dollars worth of merchandise stuffed into his shopping bag, authorities said.

Arthur Harrison, 42, stashed two hats and two scarves in a bag and tried to leave the store on Third Avenue near East 59th Street at about 8 p.m. Saturday, according to court papers.

The clothing items have a combined value of more than \$3,100.

Store security guards nabbed Harrison before he could get away, authorities said.

He was charged with grand larceny and possession of stolen property, according to the court papers.

■ A Bedford-Stuyvesant man was apparently so desperate to get his hands on some herbal incense that can be smoked for a cheap high — or, in this case, a free high — that he punched a deli worker in the face when the man stopped him on his way out of the store, court records claim.

Justin Reyes, incense in hand, was about to leave the deli at 928 Broadway at 3:26 a.m. Saturday, when the employee confronted him, according to the court papers.

Reyes allegedly slugged the stunned clerk but

didn't get far before cops arrested him and charged him with assault, petit larceny, menacing and harassment.

The brazen bandits — both wearing FedEx uniforms — went into the AT&T store at Kings Highway and Coney Island Avenue at around 9:22 yesterday morning before pulling a weapon and demanding cash and phones.

The thieves left the outlet with 25 iPhones, 25

BlackBerrys and an undisclosed amount of cash, cops said.

The criminals fled the scene on foot, and no one was injured, police said.

■ Another tech-loving thief was collared by cops just a day after robbing a home in Brighton Beach, according to court papers.

Shop-cart kid laughed

The 13-year-old boy who admittedly threw a shopping cart over a fourth-story railing in Harlem — striking a philanthropist mom of two — showed a startling lack of concern for the woman he nearly killed, officials revealed yesterday.

"The respondent was more concerned with the condition of his sneakers than with the condition of his victim," city lawyer Leah Schmelzer said of pint-sized Jeovanni Rosario, 13, whose sentencing in the horrific prank was delayed yesterday.

Rosario and Raymond Hernandez, 12, had spent their time at a Harlem precinct house "laughing and joking," and showed "no empathy or re-

morse," following the Oct. 30 tragedy, Schmelzer told Manhattan Family Court Judge Susan Larabee.

Both boys have pleaded guilty. At sentencing they face anywhere from probation to being jailed until their 18th birthdays.

Victim Marion Hedges remains in serious condition with a head injury.

Pearl Harbor tribute

An airborne remembrance of the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor 70 years ago is planned over New York City today.

Two World War II-era propeller planes will drop 70 roses over the Statue of Liberty at 12:55 p.m., 70 years to the minute after the surprise Japanese attack.

The roses will be anointed with water taken from Pearl Harbor, said Fred DiFabio, directing the event for the Long Island chapter of the Air Force Association.

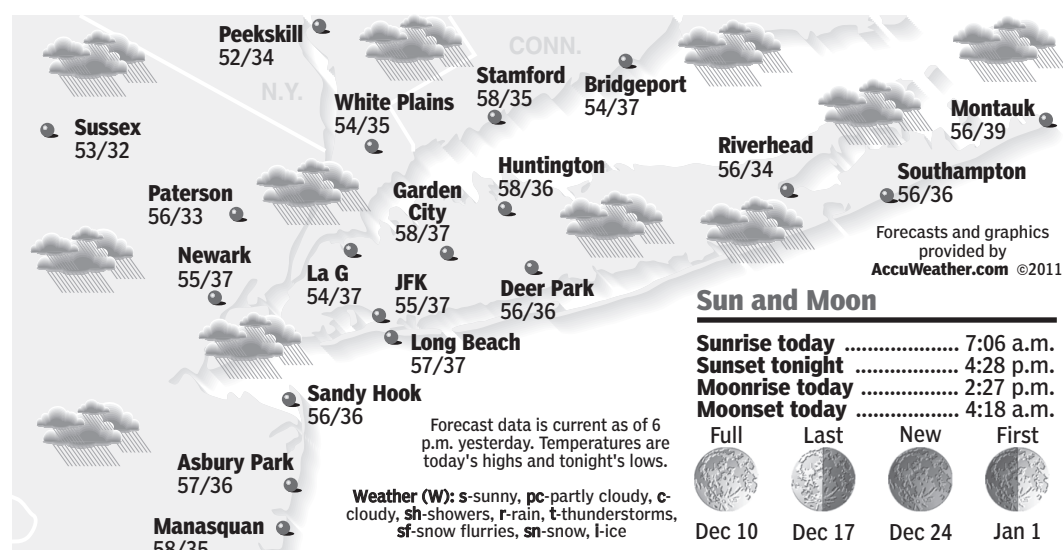
The attack on Dec. 7, 1941, killed 2,402 Americans and led the US to declare war on Japan and Germany the next day.

The planes will take off from Republic Airport in Farmingdale. Before dropping the roses, they'll fly over the Hudson River at the same time a memorial ceremony is held aboard the USS Intrepid.

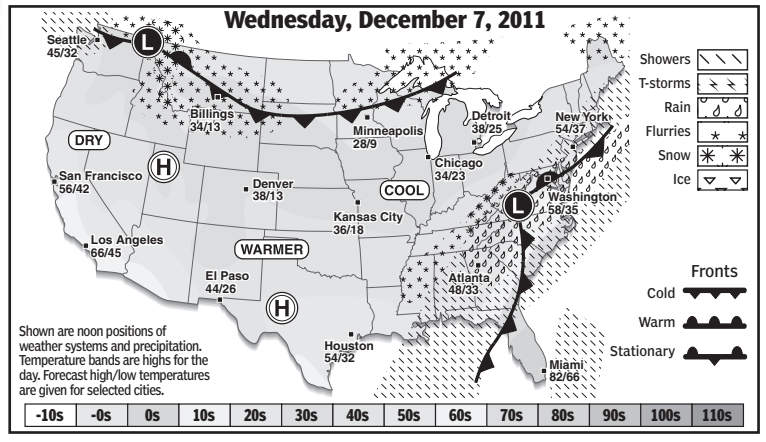

Manhattan

■ A teen gang-banger was arrested for shooting an innocent bystander in Harlem over the weekend, The Post has learned.

Troy Folk, 16, a member of the "FSU" crew, accidentally shot the 40-year-old victim in the abdomen at around 5 p.m. Sunday while firing a .38-caliber gun at gang rivals chasing him near Frederick Douglass Boulevard and West 16th Street, cops said.

The woman was rushed to St. Luke's Hospital, where she is recovering.

Troy was arrested Monday at 7:40 p.m. for allegedly trespassing at the St. Nicholas housing project on West 129th Street and was quickly linked to the shooting, cops said.

He was charged with felony assault and weapons possession.

Investigators recovered Troy's silver firearm, the serial number of which had been scratched off, cops added.

■ A 28-year-old man was ambushed and killed in a stairwell at an East Harlem housing project, cops said.

Aaron Collins stepped out of his apartment at the Wilson Houses on East 105th Street near First Avenue just before 9 p.m. Monday and was shot in the torso by assailants, cops said.

Collins was apparently set up and intentionally targeted, cops said.

Moments earlier, he had gotten a phone call telling him to meet people at that location, cops added.

Collins, who had six prior arrests, was pronounced dead at Metropolitan Hospital.

Queens

■ A self-described member of the Latin Kings gang stabbed a foe during a violent home invasion in Jackson heights, authorities said.

Kelvin Guzman, 16, was

among the group of eight hoodlums who barged into the residence on 95th Street near 31st Avenue at 1:20 p.m. on Dec. 2 and slashed the victim on the arms, hands and head, court papers state.

It's unclear what sparked the bloodshed.

The victim was treated at a local hospital and Guzman, who was identified by witnesses, was picked up the next day on burglary, assault and weapons possession charges, said a spokeswoman for District Attorney Richard Brown.

Guzman allegedly confessed to participating in the gang assault.

The Bronx

■ The bullet-riddled body of a 48-year-old man was found in a minivan in Edenwald, police said.

Cops discovered the body at around noon Monday in a Toyota Sienna that had been ditched at Duryea and Strang avenues.

Cops said two masked gunmen had carjacked the minivan earlier in the day.

Two occupants were yanked from the vehicle, but the carjackers drove off with the third occupant, a man from Virginia. The carjackers eventually fled the vehicle, leaving the man mortally wounded inside.

The investigation is ongoing, but detectives believe the victim knew his killers.

An undisclosed sum of cash was also stolen during the ordeal, cops said.

Brooklyn

■ A Williamsburg woman was robbed by a man she met at a bar, cops said.

The 30-year-old victim and Michael Nazario, 27, were downing drinks at an undisclosed watering hole on Nov. 22 when the victim invited Nazario back to her high-rise apartment building on

South 4th Street near Roebling Street, cops said.

At some point, the victim asked Nazario to leave, and he allegedly refused.

The dispute escalated and Nazario grabbed the victim's MacBook Pro, wrapped it in his jacket and fled, cops said.

Nazario was arrested on Dec. 7 after the victim spotted him at the bar where they first met and called 911, cops added.

He was charged with grand larceny and criminal possession of stolen property.

Staten Island



■ The crook pictured above snatched a debit card from a car in Travis and went on a spending spree, police said.

The card was taken sometime between 6 p.m. on Nov. 27 and 6:30 a.m. on Nov. 28 from a parked vehicle at Signs Road and Richmond Avenue.

She's baaack

Peruvian terror Lori in NY

A beaming Lori Berenson yesterday returned home to Manhattan for the first time since her terrorist-harboring arrest in Peru in 1995, and came bearing a special holiday gift — her 2-year-old son.

Berenson, 42, who served 15 years in prison in Peru, must return there by Jan. 11 to complete the remaining four years of her parole.

"I just hope we don't get caught in a snowstorm," she joked to a reporter about returning to Peru as she boarded her flight to Newark Liberty Airport.

Berenson has promised to go back to the South American country after her controversial release.

"I don't know why there's any concern," said

her mother, Rhoda Berenson. "She agreed to go back Jan. 11, and she will."

Berenson was greeted at Newark by her mother, who was waiting with a coat for her grandson, to whom Berenson gave birth while in prison.

"He's not used to the cold," said Rhoda, who had already met the little boy in Peru. The rest of the family hasn't.

"Everybody's excited about meeting Salvador," she added. "He's going to be front and center."

Berenson stirred international controversy when she was convicted of aiding Peruvian guerrillas in the 1990s.

She admitted to helping the Tupac Amaru rebel group rent a safe house, where authorities seized a cache of weapons after a shootout with the rebels.

She insists she didn't know guns were stored there and says she never joined the group.

In 1996, a military court of hooded judges convicted Berenson of treason and sentenced her to life in prison.

After US pressure, she was retried by a civilian court, which also convicted her, but gave her the lesser sentence.

No. 9 – Electricity, and its Schedule for Retail Access Service, P.S.C. No. 2 – Retail Access.

P.S.C. No. 11 and P.S.C. No. 12, which are subject to Commission approval, modification, or rejection, are proposed to become effective on February 20, 2012. Grift clan is jailed

For almost a decade, they lived like a queen and a prince — tooling around in yachts, private planes and a \$127,000 Mercedes.

But yesterday, mother-and-son embezzlers Judy and Joseph Del Galdo were sentenced to at least four years in prison for swiping \$16 million from the book-keeper mom's SoHo employers.

A parole board could keep the grifters in prison for as long as 12 years under the sentence handed down by Manhattan Supreme Court Justice Charles Solomon.

The pair pleaded guilty to grand larceny in November after Manhattan prosecutors caught them conspiring to plunder the two companies where the mom, who lived in Sayreville, NJ, had worked for 22 years — Hi-Fashion Fabrics, Inc., and Timeless Treasures Fabrics.

The mom, 66, would siphon funds into a dummy company, Tea-Rific Beverage Inc., for which the son, 46, who lived in Buford, Ga., was the sole signatory. *Laura Italiano*
