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1 Proceedings 2 ALJ MULLANY: Good evening. Μv 3 name is Sean Mullany, and I'm an administrative law judge employed by the 4 Department of Public Service. I'm here to 5 6 preside over tonight's public statement 7 hearing. I'd like to begin by opening this 8 9 hearing. This is a public statement hearing in cases 14-E-0493, Proceeding on the Motion 10 of the Commission as to the Rates, Charges, 11 Rules and Regulations of Orange & Rockland 12 13 Utilities, Incorporated for electric service, 14 and 14-G-0494, Proceeding on the Motion of the Commission as to the Rates, Charges, Rules and 15 Regulations of Orange & Rockland Utilities, 16 17 Incorporated for gas service. This hearing is being convened pursuant to a notice of public 18 19 statement hearings that was issued on June 10th, 2015. 20 21 The purpose of tonight's hearing 22 is to hear public comment on a proposal to increase the electric delivery revenues for 23 24 Orange & Rockland, Incorporated, and increase 25 the gas revenues for Orange & Rockland,

1 Proceedings Incorporated. We have fact sheets in the back 2 3 of the room for anyone who would like additional information about the proposals 4 under consideration. 5 Sitting with me is Greg Sayre. 6 7 Commissioner Sayre is a member of the Public Service Commission of the State of New York. 8 9 If you do want to speak tonight, offer any comments, please fill out a card in 10 the back of the room. And we are going to be 11 12 accepting speakers in the order in which the cards are filled out. There are also a number 13 of different ways that people can submit 14 15 comments. If you want details on how to do that, please see one of the representatives in 16 17 the back of the room, or feel free to come up and ask me. 18 19 So with that I'd like to ask 20 Commissioner Sayre if he wants to offer a 21 couple of remarks. 22 COMM. SAYRE: Thank you for 23 turning out on this cool summer evening when I'm sure you have better things to do. I look 24 25 forward to hearing what you have to say.

1 Proceedings ALJ MULLANY: So we have two cards 2 that have been filled out, and I'm going to 3 call these speakers in the order they filled 4 out the cards. The first speaker is Michael 5 6 P. Sweeton. 7 MR. SWEETON: Thank you. Ι 8 appreciate the opportunity. And I am the supervisor in the Town of Warwick in Orange 9 County. I'm also the president of the Orange 10 County Association of Supervisors and Mayors. 11 12 And I'm here tonight to tell you that I just think the case that deals 13 primarily with the gas -- I mean, the electric 14 rate increase, you've done a fair job I think 15 16 in your agreement. But the gas delivery 17 that's going to impact us to an average of ten percent is really high. And it hits us at a 18 19 time when our economy still struggles and businesses and residents are struggling to 20 make ends meet. A ten percent increase as an 21 22 average, I mean, 14, 12 and 11 over the three years. It's based on a lot of things, I 23 24 understand, but a nine percent return on 25 equity seems kind of crazy to me. I don't

1 Proceedings know how many people in Orange County or in 2 3 New York state are making nine percent on any investments they're making at this time. 4 So that seems a bit excessive to me. 5 O&R makes the case that property 6 7 taxes have gone up and they've got to cover 8 that cost. I think you could stretch out the 9 time period by which they can recover that. 10 That could help lower the rate impact. They've added 23 new positions, 17 11 12 on the gas side. I know O&R is not a big company, but they are a subsidiary of Con 13 14 Edison now, one of the largest utilities in 15 the United States. I can't believe they can't find 23 people through some kind of sharing 16 17 agreement to do what they need to do. So all of these things that are adding to this 14, 13 18 19 and 11 percent increase just seems excessive 20 to me. Governor Cuomo has imposed, with 21 22 the Legislature, on all of the municipalities, on the school districts, that we have to live 23 within our means, a two percent maximum. 24 I 25 don't understand why they don't have to do the б

1 Proceedings 2 same. It seems unfair to me. I'm also a small businessman. 3 Т have a business that I use natural gas to heat 4 5 in my business. I spend eight to ten thousand 6 dollars in the winter months a month on 7 natural gas. So these kind of numbers of 8 increase is going to be a big hit to me. Ιt 9 may be what pushes me over the edge and wants to leave my business that I've had since 1976. 10 So I implore you to please revisit this 11 discussion and take these things into 12 consideration. 13 14 I speak for myself, for my 15 residents in my town and the villages that, 16 believe it or not, we all still are trying to 17 struggle through whatever this new state of economy is. It's not like it's always been. 18 19 So please take these comments constructively, 20 and I hope that some changes can still be made. 21 22 Thank you. ALJ MULLANY: Thank you very much, 23 Mr. Sweeton. 24 25 (Applause)

1 Proceedings ALJ MULLANY: Gerald P. Kleiner. 2 3 MR. KLEINER: Good evening. 4 ALJ MULLANY: Good evening, Mr. Kleiner. 5 6 MR. KLEINER: I don't really have 7 prepared remarks. I looked today on the website to see some of the comments that have 8 9 been submitted. I am Second Ward Alderman in 10 Middletown, so I'm speaking on behalf of 11 12 myself, but also my constituents, who have already asked me time and again how come the 13 14 delivery charge is more than the gas. And I don't have the answer to that. I know a lot 15 16 of what goes in it. And certainly in the Second Ward we've had rental hikes where I 17 live, we've had commonwealth, we've had 18 19 lock-outs, we've had our streets being torn out while the old gas lines are being 20 replaced. And it's mostly being done by 21 22 subcontractors, and I understand that it's an expensive proposition. We also passed a 23 24 resolution last year as a city when the 25 initial 20 some percent increase was supposed

1 Proceedings 2 to be done all at once. So I'm happy that the 3 project agreement has extended that over the three year period. 4 But I really think -- I agree the 5 6 increase in electric rates is not severe. But 7 the increase in the gas delivery, it's a lot. 8 It's a lot for the average customer to pay 9 when you look at what the dollar figures are. 10 So I just would like to speak, I read the objections today from the Municipal Consortium 11 12 and also from the Rockland County attorney. 13 And I think they make some good points. I 14 know O&R says they are grudgingly favoring the joint project -- Joint Proposal. They say 15 that they're not really happy with it. But 16 17 nobody is happy with everything in an agreement when it's worked out that way. 18 19 But I would certainly, on behalf 20 of my constituents -- Mr. Sweeton has made some good suggestions -- I think the 21 22 amortization could be extended. I'm not so sure about some of the write-offs that are 23 24 being taken for the closed facilities. And of course the FERC increases have hit us in the 25

1 Proceedings Mid-Hudson. And I think that all really has 2 to be considered. 3 I would oppose the agreement just 4 in terms of -- I know you looked at a lot of 5 6 numbers and a lot of information, but I don't 7 really see enough there that I can make the good judgment call on what the total financial 8 9 picture is. And I would like to see that 10 extended. And if there's any way to mitigate the gas delivery rates or to stretch them out 11 further or to somehow reduce them. 12 We have a lot of unfunded mandates 13 14 in the City of Middletown. The tax cap is an unfunded mandate. Because we have to make do, 15 it doesn't stop pension costs, it doesn't stop 16 17 all these other fixed costs from going up. So the city is hit hard, we are hit hard in 18 19 services. That hits the taxpayers and 20 therefore the ratepayers. And, you know, the city does provide the infrastructure. 21 Ιt 22 leases the rights-of-way. It really allows 23 the utility company to deliver its services. 24 And I would like to see you try as hard as 25 possible to reduce it and mediate that impact

11 1 Proceedings 2 of the gas rate increases. 3 Thank you. 4 ALJ MULLANY: Thank you, Mr. Kleiner. 5 6 (Applause) 7 ALJ MULLANY: Theodore Walsh. 8 MR. WALSH: Good evening, 9 gentlemen. I didn't -- I wasn't really 10 prepared to come to discuss other than I'm a homeowner within the village of Florida, town 11 of Warwick. 12 I think Supervisor Sweeton and the 13 14 gentleman who just preceded me stated it very well. As a homeowner living on a limited 15 16 fixed income and a senior who's lived in this area all of my life, I'm finding it extremely 17 difficult. When I read the article in the 18 19 Times Herald Record in reference to the gas rate increase, it was kind of overwhelming. 20 Ι 21 take a look at my bills and I see -- I heat 22 the house with natural gas. I'm a single individual, I live all by myself, have no 23 relatives at all on the East Coast. 24 But. 25 that's besides the point.

1 Proceedings 2 I take a look -- O&R encourages 3 people to look at alternate suppliers. I decided two years ago to switch to IDT as an 4 alternate supplier. When I take a look at my 5 qas bill -- and qas is primarily my main 6 7 concern. The electric, as the previous 8 gentleman said, seems to be within range. I'm 9 not saying that it's excessive, but maybe that too could be given some consideration, 10 especially for seniors living on a limited 11 fixed income. When I take a look at the gas 12 13 bill, and I have one right in front of me, the 14 one right now, the supplier charge was twelve 15 dollars and 98 cents, which is, you know, for 16 one person there's no heat now and next to 17 nothing in hot water; \$12.98, and it costs \$30.38 to deliver \$12.98 worth of gas. I 18 19 think this ties in exactly with what the previous gentlemen were talking about. 20 For a homeowner, the impact, we 21 22 have nowhere to shift the impact. The taxes, everything else is going up. Pensions are not 23 24 going up at this point. And believe it not, I 25 was talking with some of my relatives out west

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2	today, and they're saying, bluntly put, you're
3	a damn fool for staying in New York state,
4	you're being ripped off big time. You could
5	live a lot cheaper if you were to move
6	elsewhere. You know, I've lived in this area
7	all of my life. This is where my roots are.
8	I don't really wish to move, at least at this
9	point, unless I'm being squeezed further and
10	further and further, in which case I'll have
11	no choice but to move.
12	But I think that, you know, this
13	is something from a homeowner point of view
14	the other people were talking about, the other
15	two gentlemen were talking from, you know,
16	their supervisory point of view. But, as I
17	said, I'm speaking from a homeowner, but I'm
18	saying it from the heart. It's getting
19	extremely difficult. I know all companies
20	need to make a profit, but there's only so
21	much that we as homeowners can afford to pay.
22	Beyond that point it's a case of giving up
23	something. I don't go out to eat, I don't go
24	out doing anything. My only luxury is having
25	cable TV, the Internet service and the phone

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2	service in the house. And I was driving a
3	vehicle that was 26 years old, falling apart,
4	I had to get another vehicle. So now on top
5	I've got car payments. I know that's not your
6	concern. But my concern is there's only so
7	many dollars to go around. I can't cut back
8	any further on gas and electric usage and
9	still function in the house.
10	Please give us, as homeowners and
11	what the previous two supervisors, gentlemen
12	said, please give us some consideration and do
13	the best that you can in terms of, you know,
14	stretching the situation somehow or at least,
15	you know, minimizing costs so that we can
16	continue to survive and live in an area that I
17	really want to live in and have lived in for
18	72 years.
19	Thank you very much for your time,
20	I really appreciate it.
21	(Applause)
22	ALJ MULLANY: Thank you, sir.
23	Do we have anyone else who would
24	like to offer remarks? Sir, have you filled
25	out a card at all so I know who you are?

15 1 Proceedings 2 MR. ZOLNOSKI: Not yet. I was waiting for everybody else to do so. 3 4 ALJ MULLANY: Okay. 5 MR. ZOLNOSKI: Okay, done. 6 Okay, can I come up? 7 ALJ MULLANY: Absolutely, yes. And if I could just ask you to let the court 8 9 reporter know your full name and the spelling. 10 MR. ZOLNOSKI: Okay. My name is Tom Zolnoski. It's Z-o-l-n-o-s-k-i. 11 I'm 12 retired from the City of Middletown DPW. 13 And just reading the paper the 14 other day about the rate increases, I think, 15 you know, it's -- I think everybody is just 16 stretched beyond their means. And I realize 17 how O&R, you know, had to recover from the rates from the devastation from the 18 19 superstorms. But I think, you know, I think that everybody is stretched beyond their means 20 already. And I would like to think that O&R 21 22 has recovered financially and is still in good shape financially where you wouldn't have to 23 24 warrant such outrageous rate increases. So, 25 you know, with trains derailing nowadays, I

16 1 Proceedings think, you know, a train must derail right 2 3 here. I think, you know, you need to slow down as far as, you know, everybody's 4 livelihoods here. 5 6 Thank you very much. 7 ALJ MULLANY: Thank you, 8 Mr. Zolnoski. 9 Do we have anyone else who would 10 like to offer comments? (No audible response) 11 12 ALJ MULLANY: Okay. Well, first 13 off, I would like to thank all of you for 14 coming out here tonight, and for those of you 15 who offered your input, we appreciate it. And 16 it will become part of the record and will be 17 considered by the Commission. And if you have an interest or desire to offer any additional 18 19 comments, please check with us and we can give 20 you the information you need to do that. We're going to, like we did in the 21 22 afternoon session, we are going to keep this 23 open for at least an hour, just in case 24 somebody else shows up. But we're, I guess 25 the technical term is not adjourned but we're

17 1 Proceedings 2 going to turn the microphones off and wait until eight o'clock and then we'll formally 3 adjourn the hearing. Thank you. 4 5 (Whereupon, a recess was taken) 6 ALJ MULLANY: Mr. Cea. 7 MR. CEA: Yes, sir. 8 ALJ MULLANY: Please come on down 9 and tell us --10 MR. CEA: You guys didn't keep me waiting for long. 11 12 ALJ MULLANY: No, we have been 13 waiting for you. 14 MR. CEA: That's good. I went into Goshen. 15 16 ALJ MULLANY: We're glad you're 17 here. MR. CEA: Okay. I came because I 18 19 heard that Orange & Rockland is seeking a \$12 a month additional delivery charge. 20 That's above and beyond the \$20 delivery charge we 21 22 pay now. That represents a 60 percent 23 increase they're requesting in one increment. 24 I don't know if they have any of their 25 representatives here, but we in the private

1 Proceedings sector don't have any such rich uncles or any 2 3 revenue falling from the trees in 60 percent increments. 4 5 I got a \$13 a month increase this 6 year on my Social Security. And they're 7 seeking \$12 plus tax. I'm probably in the red 8 slightly by the time they're done with me. 9 That's prior to any additional gas or electric 10 costs. But it's totally unconscionable 11 12 that they should request, if my figures are 13 accurate, I'm going on hearsay, and you 14 gentlemen can feel free to correct me if I misstate something, because I like to be 15 16 accurate in what I speak about and the 17 information I leave with, so I can share it with others and I'll be more informed myself. 18 19 But what I got in a Social Security increase 20 represents a 1.7 percent increase. And if their \$20 a month delivery charge increased by 21 22 1.7 percent, I don't think anybody would come 23 out tonight to protest it. You're talking 24 about 34 cents, not \$12, and certainly not a 25 60 percent increase, as I mentioned.

1 Proceedings In addition to which, I picked up 2 some paperwork tonight that spells out -- it's 3 a letter that I picked up in a store I was in 4 that we're supposed to sign it and mail it up 5 to you guys at the Public Service Commission. 6 7 Now, this is not to embarrass anybody, but are 8 some of you commissioners appointed by the 9 governor, or at least one appointed by the 10 governor? COMM. SAYRE: All commissioners 11 12 are appointed by the governor. MR. CEA: Okay. So to me we're 13 14 behind the eight ball already, because here's a governor who is refusing to allow the 15 16 fracking for the natural gas that would drive 17 the prices down for the end line consumer. Myself and other homeowners and apartment 18 19 renters and any other utility ratepayer would 20 necessarily be paying less because it would be a larger supply, and that usually drives 21 22 prices down. So now, and I know from what I read that the DEC said it was okay, it was not 23 24 a bad thing to frack. But the governor, in 25 his usual dictatorial fashion, chooses to say

1 Proceedings 2 no, I'm going to put a moratorium on that. He played with that for four or five years, 3 almost six years, and said well, we'll study 4 it a little longer, we'll study it a little 5 6 longer and we'll study it a little longer. 7 What influence do you fellows have and any ladies on the board have with Andrew? I wish 8 9 he were here tonight so I could have an 10 exchange, a dialogue with him, because something is wrong. 11 12 Now, you guys, I hope you guys 13 will share some exchange with me, because I can go on for quite a while, but I've got to 14 15 come up for air once in a while, so --16 ALJ MULLANY: Well, I guess I 17 should clarify that tonight we get to hear from you. 18 19 MR. CEA: All right 20 ALJ MULLANY: There isn't any 21 colloquy at all. 22 MR. CEA: All right. So that's 23 why they call it a hearing I guess, okay. All 24 right.

So the stuff I have here

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2	represents this. There's a proposed eleven
3	and a half percent increase for electric rates
4	and a 35.1 percent increase for gas rates.
5	And I already addressed the gas situation.
б	Fracking. Frack. You'll bring in money to
7	the state. And I guess Andrew and the state
8	doesn't care that the prices will go up,
9	whether they be delivery costs or consumption
10	costs for either gas or electric, because the
11	state makes plenty of money standing on the
12	sideline charging their taxes, their not
13	their user fees but their state taxes. There
14	are additional taxes, assessments and all
15	sorts of money they make for doing nothing.
16	Orange & Rockland, and I don't
17	represent them, I have no one in the family
18	that works for them, they at least invested or
19	their shareholders at least invested money
20	into exploration and recovery and delivery to
21	me and to you. But the government, Andrew
22	Cuomo, we watch I watch him frequently. I
23	don't believe a word that comes out of his
24	mouth when he claims to be concerned with the
25	destitute and the struggling people in New

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2	York state. And we see him in the news of
3	late frequently stating that he wants to see
4	the minimum wage increase. Does he really
5	care about people who are struggling to make
6	it in New York, those like myself that are
7	planning to leave as soon as I can unload my
8	home and my property because of the situation
9	here? It's a laughable state, it really is.
10	And we have a terrible name. Albany, our
11	leaders in Albany have a terrible name among
12	the other 49 states in this nation.
13	So if you'd like a copy of the
14	letter, I'll either mail it, sign it and mail
15	it up, or I'd be happy to leave a copy of it
16	with you now if you haven't seen a copy of it.
17	ALJ MULLANY: I'd be happy to take
18	it from you.
19	MR. CEA: I haven't signed it. If
20	you like, I'll affix my name to it.
21	ALJ MULLANY: Only if you wish to.
22	MR. CEA: Well, I'd be happy to.
23	It will serve the same purpose. It's just for
24	information purposes. I only came into
25	possession of it a couple of hours ago.

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2 And I spoke to many people who would like to come. Most of them are seniors 3 and many of them are not well. So for them to 4 face increases of this nature, 60 percent 5 additional delivery, 35 percent additional --6 7 35.1 percent for gas and 11.5 percent for 8 electric. There's one other figure here I 9 see, and I haven't even fully looked at this, it would result in an overall customer bill 10 11 increase of approximately 16.8 percent. That's not realistic. None of us has a 12 surname that's spelled T-r-u-m-p. None of us 13 14 are Donald Trump. We work for a living, those 15 of us that are fortunate enough to do so, and many of us, like myself, are retired. 16 17 So, you know, we're not looking for a free ride. I never went around with a 18 19 tin cup in my hand for a handout. But I 20 certainly always will protest what I see as a horrible injustice and unfairness. And you 21 22 guys, as the Public Service Commission, are 23 supposed to be there to represent us and the 24 utilities to make sure that both sides get a 25 fair shake. This does not amount to a fair

#### 1 Proceedings 2 shake. And I do hope and we all hope in the state, those of us that are still here, for 3 4 the duration of time that we remain here, that 5 you in fact look out for fairness. Not only 6 for our best interests and the best interests 7 of the utility, they do a good job of it, of 8 protecting their end. You're more I think 9 charged with protecting we the consumers. And 10 I don't come to you guys often. It's the first time I believe I've come to such a 11 12 meeting. But I'm sure I've made my point and 13 I'd be happy to give you the letter. May I 14 step up? 15 ALJ MULLANY: Yes, please. 16 MR. CEA: Yeah. Give an old man a 17 hand here, I'm 67 years old. What's your 18 name? 19 ALJ MULLANY: Sean Mullany. MR. CEA: Oh, Sean Mullany. I 20 called the PSC yesterday. So I appreciate it. 21 22 ALJ MULLANY: Thanks for coming 23 down. 24 MR. CEA: Should I sit around and 25 keep you guys company for a while? Are there

25 Proceedings 1 any other speakers in the house? 2 3 ALJ MULLANY: Only if they come through the door. We don't have any 4 5 scheduled. MR. CEA: Well, I hope -- it was a 6 7 pleasure meeting yourself as well. I used to be able to jump that, no problem. What was 8 9 your name? 10 COMM. SAYRE: Greg Sayre. MR. CEA: Nice to meet you. All 11 right, fellows, thank you so much. 12 ALJ MULLANY: 13 This hearing is 14 adjourned. Thank you. 15 (Time noted: 8:00 p.m.) 16 17 18 19 20 21 22 23 24 25
