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SECTION 1.0 INTRODUCTION

Astoria Generating Company, L.P. (“AGC” or “the Applicant”) operates two electric generating stations in the Gowanus/Sunset Park neighborhoods, Community District 7, Borough of Brooklyn, Kings County, City of New York, namely the existing Gowanus Generating Station (“Gowanus”) and Narrows Generating Station (“Narrows”). AGC is proposing to repower the older, less efficient electric generating units at Gowanus and replace them with new, more efficient electric generating units (the “Gowanus Repowering Project” or “the Project”).¹ (Figure 1). At the initial stage of this Project, AGC has prepared this Public Involvement Plan (“PIP”) in accordance with Commissioner Policy 29 (“CP-29”) of the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (“DEC”), relating to environmental justice (further discussed below), and Public Service Law, Article 10, Sections 160 through 173 (“Article 10”) and regulations and guidance established by the New York State Siting Board on Electric Generation Siting and the Environment (the “Siting Board”), in order to encourage public participation important to and necessary for the development and implementation of the Project.

The current megawatt (“MW”) rating of Gowanus is 640 MW. The Project will result in a MW rating no greater than 610 MW, 30 MW less than the current facility. The current MW rating of Narrows is 320 MW. Upon the commencement of operation of the Project, AGC will retire Narrows resulting in no less than a total decrease of 350 MW of traditional generation in the Gowanus/Sunset Park neighborhood. As further discussed below, AGC believes the Project sizing with the retirement of Narrows will result in cleaner, more efficient electric generation and provide the electric reliability required for the Gowanus/Sunset Park neighborhood as renewable energy production, transmission and distribution expand over time. Furthermore, the Project, by continuing the location of the generating units on barges, will also maintain the critical infrastructure resilience demonstrated by the existing Gowanus facility.

Article 10 provides the mechanism for siting power plants of a certain size in New York State. Pursuant to Article 10, Section 162(4)(b), based upon the nature of the Gowanus Repowering Project, the provisions of Article 10 do not apply. To accomplish the Project, AGC would

normally submit an application for a permit to construct and operate the Project to the DEC pursuant to its rules and procedures found generally in the New York Code of Rules and Regulation (“NYCRR”), Title 6, and subject to environmental review procedures established by the New York State Environmental Quality Review Act (“SEQRA”) and regulations promulgated thereunder at 6 NYCRR Part 617. Article 10 contains a voluntary “opt-in” provision in Section 162(5) and after consultation with government officials and community leaders, AGC has decided that it will instead voluntarily proceed with an application for a Certificate of Environmental Compatibility and Public Need pursuant to Article 10 before the Siting Board.

DEC’s Commissioner Policy 29 (“CP-29”), relating to environmental justice (“EJ”), requires that any application for a permit potentially affecting a geographical area which may be considered a Potential Environmental Justice Area (“PEJA”) must be accompanied by a robust and enhanced public participation plan to invite vigorous participation from the community in the permitting and environmental review processes. According to DEC guidance,

CP-29 Section V.D. requires applicants for permits covered by CP-29 to actively seek public participation throughout the environmental permit review process. Public participation in the DEC environmental permit review process means a program of activities that provides opportunities for stakeholders to be informed about and involved in the review of a proposed action. Public participation, including open and effective dialogue with stakeholders, can build relationships, provide a forum to address concerns, and help develop and promote actions that minimize impacts on the surrounding community and the environment as a whole.

See Tips for Preparing a Public Participation Plan Pursuant to the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation Commissioner Policy-29, Environmental Justice and Permitting (February 1, 2006).

As further discussed below, the Project potentially will affect PEJAs. Therefore, in order to assure the greatest practical public outreach and public participation in the permitting and environmental review decision-making processes, this PIP will comply with DEC’s requirements in addition to the relevant requirements of the Siting Board found at 16 NYCRR §1000.4.

As is presented in Siting Board rule 16 NYCRR §1000.4, this PIP will provide for the following activities:

- (1) consultation with affected agencies and other stakeholders;

- (2) pre-application activities to encourage stakeholders to participate at the earliest opportunity;
- (3) the establishment of a website to disseminate information to the public and updates regarding the Project;
- (4) notifications to affected agencies and other stakeholders throughout the Project;
- (5) activities designed to educate the public as to the Project, as well as the permitting and environmental review processes, and to encourage participation by stakeholders in the permitting and review processes; and
- (6) establishment of a fund to assist community involvement in the permitting and review processes.

SECTION 2.0 PROJECT DESCRIPTION

2.1 COMPANY PROFILE

AGC is a wholly owned subsidiary of Eastern Generation, LLC. Included in AGC's portfolio are three natural gas- and dual-fired generating facilities located within the New York Independent System Operator ("NYISO") Zone J power market: the Astoria Generating Station (959 MW) located in Queens, NY; the Gowanus Generating Station (640 MW) located in Brooklyn, NY; and the Narrows Generating Station (320 MW) also located in Brooklyn, NY. AGC acquired the three generating stations from Consolidation Edison Company of New York, Inc. ("ConEd") in 1999 as part of the New York Public Service Commission's electricity market restructuring.

2.2 PROJECT PURPOSE AND NEED

Even with the State's laudable ongoing Reforming the Energy Vision ("REV") policy and regulatory initiatives, the goal of generating 50% of the State's electricity from renewable energy sources by 2030, and possible future transmission and energy storage projects, traditional in-City energy generation will be required for reliability purposes well into the future. In order to maintain system reliability, the NYISO currently requires at least 80% of New York City's electric generating capacity needs be met through in-City generation. To further the State's goal to reduce greenhouse gas emissions by 40 percent by 2030 and the City's goal of reducing such emissions by 80 percent by 2050, such traditional generation should come from the most efficient and cleanest units possible, with qualities to increase resiliency and reliability. Additionally, much of the renewable generation envisioned to meet the 50% goal is intermittent

in nature and will require nimble rapid response backup that can be called on multiple times a day to complement the new system needs. The efficient, rapid response, barge-mounted units of the Gowanus Repowering Project will position New York City electric generation for the future.

The DEC has announced the development of new regulations for add-on pollution control systems for reducing nitrogen oxide (“NO_x”) emissions from older existing peaking units. Those rules, though not yet proposed, are expected to go into effect by 2023 and will apply to both the current Gowanus and Narrows facilities. AGC is preparing for the alternative of maintaining the current units in compliance with the upcoming regulations through the installation of Selective Catalytic Reduction in parallel to the Project but believes that repowering Gowanus and retiring Narrows will result in greater energy efficiency and reliability, as well as emissions reduction, and be better positioned for the future than the current Gowanus and Narrows units. The new units will have substantially lower NO_x emission rates than will be required by the DEC for the existing units and will have lower emission rates for other pollutants as well, such as carbon dioxide (“CO₂”) (a greenhouse gas), sulfur dioxide (“SO₂”) and particulate matter.² This is an important advantage as it is expected that the older units will operate more over time in response to varying climate conditions and reliability pressures.

Specifically, the Project will replace older, less efficient generating units with new more efficient units at the same location, properly zoned as a M-3 heavy industrial area, and with substantially lower emission rates (further discussed below). The Project will not only result in the retirement of Narrows, farther within the Sunset Park community, but may further displace other less efficient units on a citywide and regional basis. Experience from 2000 to 2015 has shown that improvements in certain emissions within New York City resulted at points in time when substantial generation modernization occurred (e.g., the commencement of operations at Astoria Energy I in 2006). The Project will continue this improvement of the overall emissions profile in the City.

Also increasingly important is the matter of resiliency of the Project. After the tragic destruction of Hurricane Sandy, it was evident that the current Gowanus facility continued to operate through the storm with minimal impact. The barges are uniquely positioned to operate through

extraordinarily high tide and storm surges and to adapt to future water level rise. Continuing a new, more modern barge facility in the same location will add to electric generation reliability during a similar storm event, a major goal in both the New York State and New York City resiliency plans.

Securing future system resiliency has become a major issue not only in New York but throughout the nation. The Federal Regulatory Energy Commission has begun a proceeding to investigate how to ensure and compensate resiliency. It has defined resiliency as “the ability to withstand and reduce the magnitude and/or duration of disruptive events, which includes the capability to anticipate, absorb, adapt and/or rapidly recover from such an event.” FERC Order, Grid Reliability and Resiliency Pricing, Docket No. AD18-7-000, 162 FERC ¶ 61,012 (Issued January 8, 2018.) The barges, with their mobility and enhanced ability to remain operational under the most extreme tidal and storm conditions, serve an essential function in a resilient New York City. Furthermore, as the City and State move toward greater reliance on renewable energy sources, should the Gowanus units no longer be needed for reliability, the barges may be easily removed without leaving vast abandoned infrastructure in the community.

2.3 EXISTING GOWANUS STATION

Gowanus, operating since 1971, is a 640 MW fuel oil and natural gas facility consisting of 32 simple cycle combustion turbine units situated equally across four floating barges moored to a pier located on the Gowanus Bay in Brooklyn, NY, in the Gowanus/Sunset Park neighborhoods. The facility is one of the largest floating generating stations in the world. The site includes approximately 25 acres of piers and submerged land.

As mentioned above, Gowanus services the NYISO Zone J (New York City) power market and is electrically connected within the Gowanus/Greenwood sub-load pocket at the 138 kilovolt (“kV”) level. This sub-load pocket encompasses much of Sunset Park and experiences constraints in providing electricity during peak electrical demand. The units are flexible from an operating perspective, can start with as little as fifteen minutes notice, and are available year-round to offer system-peaking capacity. 16 of 32 units are equipped for dual-fuel firing. The fuel oil used at Gowanus is Ultra Low Sulfur Diesel (“ULSD”). ULSD has been used at Gowanus exclusively since April 2010 and at Narrows since January 2014. The ULSD is currently stored in a floating double-hulled fuel storage barge that is moored to the pier. In

addition, both Gowanus and Narrows have black-start capability. Gowanus was the first generating station to resume operations following the Black Out in August 2003 and, as discussed above, remained unharmed and functional during Hurricane Sandy.

The current utility interconnects include (1) an existing natural gas pipeline, (2) a 138 kV electric transmission line to the existing, immediately adjacent ConEd substation, and (3) existing water supply and wastewater discharge pipelines.

2.4 PROPOSED REPOWERING PROJECT

The Gowanus Repowering Project will entail the replacement of the current 32 older generating units on four barges with eight larger more efficient, natural gas-powered units situated equally on two barges. The decrease from four barges to two barges (along with the retirement of Narrows) is expected to result in a reduction in the total shaded footprint of the water which could have additional benefits for aquatic habitat. The retirement of Narrows also opens up the possibility of using the interconnection infrastructure at Narrows to support offshore wind resources or provide opportunities for energy storage (potentially on barges). AGC is exploring such opportunities.

As mentioned previously, the total MW rating of Gowanus as repowered will be no greater than 610 MW, 30 MW less than the current facility. Upon the commencement of the operation of the Project, Narrows will be retired resulting in an additional decrease of 320 MW of traditional generation. The Project is right-sized to maintain reliability based on an analysis of future energy needs for the Sunset Park area.

The Project will continue to provide critical quick start capabilities and improve from an under 15-minute to an under 10-minute start time. Black start capabilities for this Project will be provided by storage batteries instead of the current conventional diesel powered engines. The batteries will also provide power for station operation totaling approximately 3 MW. Existing utility infrastructure will largely be used at the repowered facility, which will minimize environmental impacts normally associated with the construction of new interconnects. ULSD will continue to be stored in fuel storage barges and used primarily as a back-up fuel as required by the New York State Reliability Council for reliability and resiliency purposes (to be used no more than 720 hours per year).

The repowered facility will result in a significant decrease in emission rates (pounds per MW-hour produced) for all major pollutants: CO₂, NO_x, SO₂, carbon monoxide (“CO”), volatile organic compounds (“VOCs”), and particulate matter (“PM_{2.5}” and “PM₁₀”). The new, more efficient Project, even if operated more frequently than the current Gowanus facility, will displace substantial pollution from older, higher emitting in-City generating facilities, along with the reduction of emissions from the Narrows facility which is closer to Sunset Park residences. This increased efficiency coupled with the displacement of older units will also result in a significant decrease in the use of natural gas for electricity generation in the City. Actual greenhouse gas and ozone producing emissions, regionally and locally, will be reduced dramatically.³ Finally, as discussed above, the barge mounted generating station will meet storm resiliency needs and provide generation reliability during significant storm events.

AGC will be contracting for the delivery of turnkey generating units. Any onsite installation activities associated with the Project will be performed by union workers, as has been the consistent practice of AGC, and local workers to the extent possible.

AGC will identify and study potential environmental impacts associated with the Project and assess whether its initial assumptions regarding the positive nature of the Project will be realized and whether certain potential impacts may occur which should be mitigated. This PIP is designed to assure substantial public involvement during the environmental assessment process.

2.5 STUDY AREA

In Siting Board rule 16 NYCRR §1000.2(a), the study area for any project subject to review and approval under Article 10 is defined as “an area generally related to the nature of the technology and the setting of the proposed site. In highly urbanized areas, the study area may be limited to a one-mile radius from the property boundaries of the facility site.” The Project is clearly located within a highly urbanized area. In 6 NYCRR Part 487, rules promulgated by the DEC for the analysis of environmental justice issues associated with projects subject to review and approval under Article 10, the minimum required impact study area is a one-half mile radius around the proposed location of the facility. Such impact study area may be increased “based on site-specific factors, including the nature, scope and magnitude of the environmental impacts, the projected range of those impacts on various environmental resources, and the geography of the

area surrounding the location of the proposed facility.” 6 NYCRR §487.4(b). Therefore, the study area may vary, depending upon expected impacts of the Project, but will include portions of the Brooklyn neighborhoods of Sunset Park, Gowanus, and Red Hook. Due to the close proximity of the points of interconnection to the Project facility, as detailed in Section 2.3 above, the study area for the proposed Project does not require inclusion of a separate study area for the point of interconnection.

The permit applications and accompanying environmental analyses will further define the study area and discuss project alternatives and impacts to the study area. For purposes of this PIP, the Project study area provides a general boundary for identifying affected agencies, community organizations and other relevant stakeholders and, as such, will be considered to be approximately one-mile in accordance with Article 10. (Figure 2).

SECTION 3.0 IDENTIFICATION OF STAKEHOLDERS

The fundamental first step in designing a Public Involvement Program is determining who may be affected by the Project. AGC has identified affected agencies and municipal entities, utilities, adjacent landowners, community organizations, and other stakeholders, utilizing DEC and Siting Board guidance; prior submissions of DEC-required public participation plans and Article 10 PIP plans; review of County GIS records, tax records, and personal visits; and conducting internet research. Furthermore, as the Project is a repowering of an existing facility, AGC is knowledgeable of the surrounding community and, therefore, of additional public interest groups and stakeholders. AGC considered the following in compiling its list of actual affected agencies and other stakeholders:

- The location of the Project and the surrounding neighborhood;
- The point of interconnection;
- Sign-in sheets from previously held public meetings and outreach efforts;
- “Local Parties,” as defined under 16 NYCRR §1000.2(s);
- “Affected Agencies,” as that term is used in 16 NYCRR §1000 *et seq.*;
- Nearby schools and other community and municipal entities;
- Adjacent Community Boards and City Council Districts;
- Public interest groups;
- Adjacent landowners;
- Certain City, State and Federal elected officials.

A master list of stakeholders with mailing addresses (referred to as the “Notification List” attached hereto as Appendix A, which includes all known, potentially interested parties) was developed based upon the combination of efforts described above. Sections 3.1 through 3.5, below, identify stakeholders by category.⁴ The Notification List will be updated as necessary based on information received during PIP activities. Initially, a mailing will be sent to all entities on the Notification List, providing notice of and information regarding the Project and the applicable regulatory processes.

SECTION 4.0 ENVIRONMENTAL JUSTICE

As discussed above, the Project will comply with the rules contained in 6 NYCRR Part 487 promulgated by the DEC for the analysis of environmental justice issues associated with projects subject to review and approval under Article 10. As mentioned above, even though Article 10 does not apply to the Project, AGC has chosen to voluntarily submit the Project to the Article 10 process.

Per CP-29 and the relevant definitions in 6 NYCRR §487.3, PEJAs or EJ areas (collectively, “EJ Areas”) include census block groups featuring populations that meet or exceed at least one of the following statistical thresholds:

- (1) At least 51.1% of the population in an urban area reported themselves to be members of minority groups; or
- (2) At least 33.8% of the population in a rural area reported themselves to be members of minority groups; or
- (3) At least 23.59% of the population in an urban or rural area had household incomes below the federal poverty level.

Based on current 2010 census data, as updated in 2015, and other data obtained from the DEC’s Geospatial Information System (GIS) Tools for Environmental Justice website (www.dec.ny.gov/public/911.html), and in accordance with DEC regulations at 6 NYCRR §487.5, AGC has mapped EJ Areas within the study area. (Figure 3). As may be seen by the map, the Project is proximate to several EJ areas.

AGC will engage meaningful public participation in developing an accurate and comprehensive description of the local conditions of the community in which the Project is located. Moreover, AGC will update and involve the public in the environmental review process and the consideration of potential environmental impacts resulting from the Project, including projected air pollution emissions and cumulative impact (in accordance with the requirements of 6 NYCRR §487.7 regarding cumulative impact analysis), to evaluate whether the Project will result in any adverse disproportionate impact on the proximate EJ Areas. *See* SEQRA requirements and Article 10 requirements set forth at 16 NYCRR §1000.5(l)(2)(xi) and 6 NYCRR §487.

SECTION 5.0 PROPOSED PUBLIC INVOLVEMENT PLAN

As noted above, according to 16 NYCRR §1000.4(c), a Public Involvement Program should include: (1) consultation with the affected agencies and other stakeholders; (2) activities to encourage stakeholders to participate in the permitting and review processes at the earliest opportunity; (3) activities designed to educate the public as to the specific proposal and the review process; (4) the establishment of a website to disseminate information to the public; and (5) notifications of major milestones. The PIP will be ongoing throughout the entirety of the environmental and permitting review process to ensure that information regarding the Project is being distributed and the public outreach events are encouraging meaningful participation in the decision-making process. Moreover, the PIP is designed to evolve in response to public concerns throughout the design and review of the Project.

5.2 CONSULTATION WITH AFFECTED AGENCIES/STAKEHOLDERS

In advance of the submission and throughout the implementation of this PIP, AGC has engaged and will continue engage regulatory agencies, elected officials and public interest groups to present and discuss the Project. Due to the large number of stakeholders on the Notification List, it may not be practical for direct consultation with all stakeholders. Therefore, AGC has developed a list of key agencies and stakeholders with which AGC will pursue direct consultation (the “Consultation List,” attached hereto as Appendix B). To the extent that these conversations did not take place prior to the submission of this PIP, AGC will offer to meet with the government agencies and community groups on the Consultation List to introduce the company and its goals, the Project and the environmental review process (including the availability of funding for the community to participate in the process), and to discuss initial issues of concern. As with the Notification List, the Consultation List will be fluid during the Project review process and will be updated as necessary. Regardless, AGC will circulate a notice to the Notification List offering smaller meetings in addition to the larger public meetings discussed below. During all stakeholder discussions generally, throughout the review of the Project, AGC will solicit feedback on issues that stakeholders want considered in the Project design or review. AGC will track this feedback in a meeting and comment log as presented in Appendix C.

As further discussed below, AGC will develop informational materials; maintain a project website; host community meetings to inform stakeholders and residents within the study area; provide answers to specific questions or concerns about the Project and identify applicable studies and impact analyses pertaining to the Project; and participate in other specific consultations as requested by stakeholders.

5.3 PUBLIC PARTICIPATION ACTIVITIES

The public outreach activities described below capture only the more structured elements of the planned public participation. AGC is prepared for an evolving process that may include additional meetings and the development of working groups for specific tasks that may arise. AGC’s primary representative will facilitate responses to questions and concerns on an ongoing basis. Formal and informal meetings with the community and stakeholders will be documented and reported monthly utilizing the log in Appendix C. At each of the planned public meetings,

large poster board displays with information on relevant topics will be used for the presentations. Translators will be provided for Spanish, Chinese (multiple dialects, as necessary), Arabic, American Sign Language, and other languages as may become necessary (see discussion below on Language Access).

As provided for in Article 10, through the Siting Board, AGC will make available funds for community groups to hire consultants to assist them in the review of technical documents and the preparation of comments. Even if this Project were not pursued under Article 10 and instead pursued under applicable SEQRA regulations, AGC would have worked directly with groups to facilitate technical assistance funding.

5.3.1 PROJECT ANNOUNCEMENT MEETING

AGC will hold a community meeting at which the Project will be presented. The Project Announcement Meeting will be held at a convenient location within the study area. There will be two sessions – one in the afternoon and one in the evening – in order to maximize potential participation by community members. The information provided will include (1) the AGC company profile, (2) the Project, (3) the Project schedule, (4) the environmental permitting and review processes (including the availability of funding for the community to participate in the process), (5) potential environmental impacts, (7) architectural design, and (8) environmental justice issues.

5.3.2 ADDITIONAL PUBLIC MEETINGS

In accordance with Siting Board rules, there will be certain public comment periods and meetings before a presiding examiner prior to the adjudicatory hearing required by Article 10, Section 165. AGC will work with the Siting Board and the DEC to establish enhanced comment periods. In addition, AGC will work with agencies, elected officials and other stakeholders to ensure the information, resources and studies prepared by AGC are satisfactory and AGC will participate in smaller stakeholder meetings as necessary.

5.4 EDUCATIONAL MATERIALS

AGC will prepare educational materials to inform the public about the Project and the environmental review and permitting process. These materials (e.g., facts sheets and brochures) will be mailed to stakeholders via mail or email in advance of scheduled meetings. All

educational materials will also be distributed at additional public meetings, stakeholder engagement, the local libraries and community board, and on the Project website.

A transcript of the proceedings at each public meeting will be prepared and posted on the Project website. Following public meetings, Appendix A will be updated to include new participants who sign in and will be posted on the Project website. A set of follow-up documents will be mailed (and/or emailed) to those listed in the updated Appendix A. These follow-up documents will include (1) a meeting summary and/or minutes, (2) responses to specific issues or concerns raised during those meetings, (3) updates on AGC's work and the public outreach process, (4) reminders and/or revisions to the meeting schedule, time or location. AGC may choose to communicate with stakeholders, providing the information listed above, in periodic progress reports so as not to inundate stakeholders with diffuse information. All documents, including any such progress reports, will be posted on the Project website.

5.5 WEBSITE

AGC has established a website for the Project, www.repoweringbrooklyn.com (to be operational upon issuance of the final PIP). The website provides information regarding the Project and all applicable environmental and permitting review processes. The website will be updated continuously throughout the Project when new documents or other information become available. Information that will be provided on the website includes:

- Project description
- Project benefits and need
- Summary of permit requirements
- Environmental review processes (including intervenor funding) and relevant website links
- Submitted documents to agencies
- Project photos and renderings
- Notifications and schedule of meetings, milestones and deadlines
- Tracking reports/comment logs (Appendix C)
- Public presentations and summaries or transcripts of meetings (as appropriate)
- Periodic progress reports
- Applicant contact information (mailing address, toll-free number, email address)
- Addresses of local repositories
- Comment portal

The project description and, to the extent practical, public presentations will be translated on the website in Spanish, Arabic and Chinese (as discussed in Section 5.7 below). Contacts for further translation will be provided.

5.6 NOTIFICATIONS

As discussed above, AGC will issue a notification to all known stakeholders (Appendix A, updated over time as necessary) by letter and/or email (perhaps through periodic progress reports) regarding each major milestone and notice at least 14 days prior to any public meeting (notification of smaller events as appropriate). All notifications will be accompanied by a copy of any appropriate agency filing. For public meetings, in addition to individual mailings to stakeholders, AGC will publish the notice in two local newspapers and notifications will be provided on the Project website (and may be distributed throughout the community as necessary).

5.7 LANGUAGE ACCESS

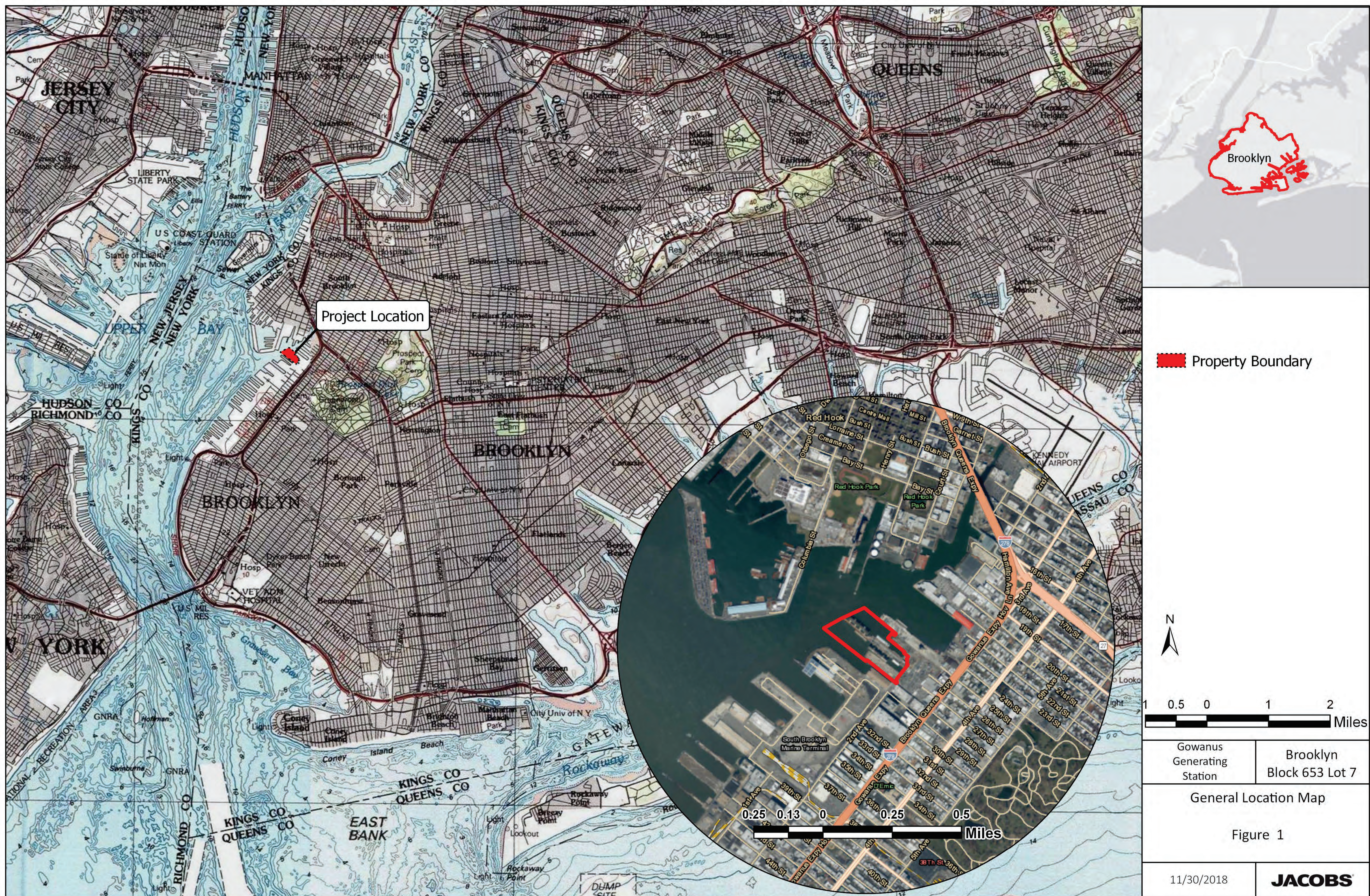
16 NYCRR §1000.4(d) requires the PIP to identify, according to United States Census Data, (1) any language other than English spoken by 5,000 or more persons residing in any 5-digit zip code postal zone located within the study area and (2) any language other than English spoken by a significant population of persons residing in close proximity to a proposed project. As discussed above, the study area for purposes of the PIP is an approximate 1-mile radius from the Project. Within the study area, there are four primary zip codes: 11215, 11220, 11231, and 11232. 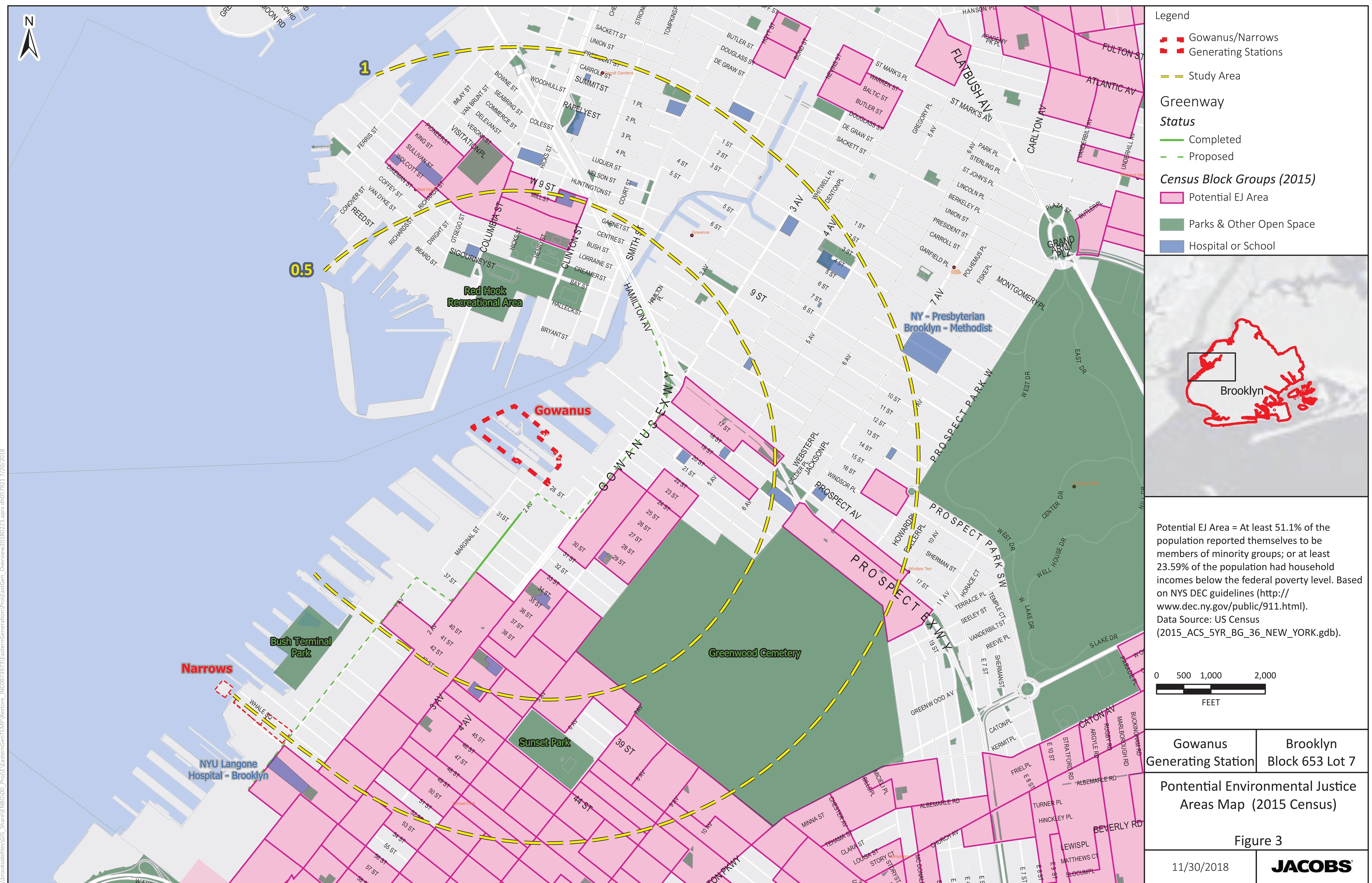
