## Re: Case 03-E-0189 Covanta Petition to include Waste-To-Energy for inclusion in the RPS

Dear Secretary Brilling,

I am writing to request that the Public Service Commission (PSC) deny the petition of Covanta Energy, which seeks to include Waste-to-Energy (WTE) as a renewable energy source eligible for inclusion in the New York State Renewable Portfolio Standard (RPS).

The RPS was designed to provide incentives to technologies that reduce the environmental impacts of our energy consumption. This Commission has on two prior occasions determined that WTE (i.e., incineration of solid waste to create energy) is not an eligible resource. The Order to establish the RPS states "incineration is not sufficiently consistent with the proposed RPS environmental objectives" to be included as an eligible resource." Last year, for the second time, the commission explicitly found that WTE was not an eligible resource stating that "we anticipate that substantial operational changes in the way industry converts municipal solid waste-to-energy would need to be made in order to mitigate concerns expressed by parties to the proceeding as well as the general public, and which this commissions shares, in order for such facilities to participate in the program."

There have been no substantial technological advances or operational improvements since last year to make WTE a more viable candidate for inclusion in the RPS. In fact, just last month, the State of Connecticut fined Covanta \$400,000 for air emissions violations and ordered one of its units to shut down after it was found to have emitted dioxin/furan levels more than 250 percent higher than the allowable standards. This further justifies the Commission's previous decisions. Facilities that violate air emission standards should not be funded through ratepayer monies intended for energy resources that reduce environmental impact.

Nearly half of New York's population resides in communities that do not meet minimum air quality standards. Rate-payers do not want to fund energy sources that contribute to this problem. Indeed, in 2004, when the PSC conducted a robust public participation process on the establishment of the RPS, rate-payers overwhelmingly stated that waste-to-energy should not be included as an eligible resource. The 2004 Order to establish the RPS refers to the thousands of public comments received by the PSC opposing inclusion.

I respectfully request that you deny Covanta's petition so that the program continues to meet its goals to reduce the environmental impact from our consumption of energy.
