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1 (The hearing commenced at 2 3:00 p.m.) 3 A.L.J. PRESTEMON: Good It's three o'clock. It's 4 afternoon folks. 5 the scheduled start time for this public statement hearing. So to those few of you who 6 are here, welcome to the public statement 7 hearing in Public Service 13-G-0136. 8 9 case concerns the rates charged by National 10 Fuel Gas Distribution Company for gas service. 11 My name is David Prestemon. 12 I'm an administrative law judge with the 13 Department of Public Service. I'll be 14 presiding in this hearing today. 15 The -- this case, as I say, 16 involves the rates of National Fuel Gas 17 Distribution Corporation. It was initiated by 18 the Commission as an investigation in April of 19 2013. After certain hearings, the parties to 20 the case began negotiations which eventually 21 resulted in a proposed settlement known in 22 Commission parlance as a joint proposal. 23 joint proposal was signed by the Company,

National Fuel Gas, by the staff of the

Department of Public Service, by multiple

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interveners, which is a party that represents
large industrial customers, by People United
for Sustainable Housing, Buffalo, by the
Utility Intervention Unit of the Department of
State, which is the -- a representative of

consumer interests.

And this joint proposal is now pending before the Commission for its consideration. The Commission can adopt it in its entirety, it can modify it, or it can reject it. The purpose of this public statement hearing is solely to allow members of the public who want to do so to give their comments in person, orally, on the record of the case. We have a reporter here who will be taking down everything. This will be transcribed verbatim and included in the record of the case.

If you or anyone you know wants to comment in this case, but you do -do not want to speak here or someone could not be here, there are a number of other ways to provide your comments. You can do so on the Commission's website, by email to the secretary of the Commission, by mail, or by

phone. And if you see Scott out in the library, he's got a handout which gives all the information about how you can do that.

In addition, there will be three more public statement hearings, one here tonight beginning at six thirty, and then two in Niagara Falls. So if you are interested in speaking here, I would just ask that you fill out a card with Scott, giving your name. And we will call on people in their -- the order that they hand in those cards.

I'm informed at this point that no one has done that. So in about twenty seconds, we will start sitting here and waiting quietly for someone to speak. If you have questions to pass the time, I might be able to help with some of those. But as I say, the main purpose is to get public comments and right now we don't have anybody interested in speaking.

We will hang around for a while to see if anybody shows up late. It -it is not necessary to be here in the beginning of the hearing in order to speak.
We will wait for a while to see if somebody

1 gets here later. And again, as I say, we'll 2 be back here at six thirty for an entirely new 3 hearing. (Off-the-record discussion) 4 5 A.L.J. PRESTEMON: All set. MR. BURKE HUGHES: 6 My name is Richard Burke Hughes, R-I-C-H-A-R-D, 7 B-U-R-K-E, H-U-G-H-E-S. 8 9 A.L.J. PRESTEMON: Thank 10 you. 11 MR. BURKE HUGHES: At one 12 time, I worked for National Fuel back when it 13 was Iroquois Gas. I just -- I have some 14 things here I'd like to say. I see these 15 refunds and everything, we're talking about 16 quite a few million dollars here, twelve, 17 thirteen million dollars. I don't know if the Public 18 19 Service Commission is aware, but at one time, 20 and I saw this with my own eyes, the National 21 Fuel had a woman who -- well, she was a chronic alcoholic was what she was. At that 22 23 time, you could take, given enough years in

the company, a year off at full pay and

another year off at half pay. Okay? This

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woman took a full year off at full pay and then came back to work. And unfortunately, her drinking was just as bad when she came back as it was when she left. Okay?

Holidays, paid holidays, well, everybody gets paid holidays. At the gas company, you also got your birthday as a paid holiday. As I said, your -- your sick time built up over the years until you had a full year and a half year. All right.

Bernie Kennedy, who was the

-- he started with Iroquois Gas in the land

department, moved up, right up through the

ranks until, on his retirement, I think he was

president and chief executive officer with

National Fuel Gas. Every year they have the

ten highest earners in Buffalo. And the

National Fuel Gas is always up there with a

million five, you know, up in that salary.

Who knows how much bonuses?

Now Bernie was a chairman -president, chief executive officer pretty
close to twenty years. He retired, I think,
at seventy years of age. Okay? I don't
object to a man making a good living, but a

1 couple of years after Bernie retired, he was 2 still on the board of directors and lo and 3 behold, they offered him a buyout of his Twenty-five million dollars was the 4 5 buyout for his pension. Now the man's seventy-four years old. He should already be 6 a multi-millionaire; right? Okay.

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The gas company has had, for years, all the local offices where the meter readers work out of and they had a sales floor. You had a salesman selling appliances; right? My feeling is what you should pay when you're paying a gas bill is you should be paying for the gas you use, the means to get it to you, the pipelines. I -- I don't see where this sales floor and selling gas appliances -- leave that to your Appliance Store, people like that. Okay. I think you could -- with the excesses, you could cut gas bills in half.

And -- and when I say excesses, I -- I think the rich are always crying oh, you're nicking the rich. Paul Allen of Microsoft fame just took delivery this year on a four hundred and forty -- fourteen-foot yacht. His old yacht was for sale, was three hundred and twelve feet, I think, for a hundred and seventy million dollars. Right? It doesn't sound to me like you're abusing the rich. Bill Gates built a home in Seattle, sixty million dollars. I grant you he gave computers to libraries all over the country, a generous man, but you know, the excesses are with the rich.

And I just feel that not -not just the gas company, the electric, these
employees make terrific money. They go to
work for these companies and they work right
through to retirement and beautiful retirement
plans, the whole nine yards.

when I think back, I remember on one occasion the Country Club of Buffalo, and I was reading the meter. And the first month I read it I -- I knew something was wrong, but I couldn't, you know -- and I was in a hurry because I had a lot of work to do that day. So the second month, I read it and I walked around the meter and I'm looking what's wrong, what's wrong. I looked at it again and I looked at it again.

Well, lo and behold, a

mistake was made when the meter was set, one of these big block meters. And somebody had failed to tell the -- or whether they didn't have it on their paperwork or what, it was a special dial meter, the difference being that in a regular dial meter reads in hundreds of cubic feet and then the special dial meter was thousands of cubic feet. So this -- this meter had only been in place for maybe a year or so, but of course, instead of paying for five thousand cubic feet, it should have been fifty thousand cubic feet.

And so they -- they -- they got together with them and figured out well, they owed us twelve thousand dollars -- owed National Fuel Gas twelve thousand dollars.

And they made arrangements that it would be paid. And of course, from that point on, it was -- so it's not all -- you know, what you're paying for here is -- is the employees.

And -- and as I said, I'll pay for the guy taking care of the pipelines, the gas comes -- the people that take care of the pipelines,
