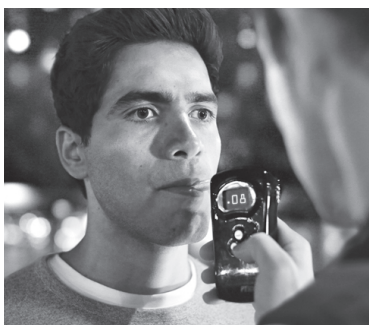

# A brimful Cap man's long heist record

He wears a lot of hats. The man suspected of robbing New York and Los Angeles banks while wearing Yankees and Mets caps is homeless, a Bombers fan and a career criminal who held up a bank the very day he was released from prison — for bank robbery.

Jon Paul Waulters, who was arrested Wednesday, told investigators he is the "Coast to Coast Bandit" who donned the baseball caps while stealing more than \$8,000 in seven stick-ups since March.

People who lived with him at Manhattan's Bellevue Men's Shelter say he was a quiet type.

One former bunkmate

added, "He takes too many showers at night."

But no amount of scrubbing could clean up his lengthy rap sheet — Waulters (inset) is a career criminal convicted of at least 11 heists.

On April 1, 2009 — the day he was released from a two-year prison stint for bank robberies — Waulters walked in to a Manhattan Wachovia branch and

stole \$1,045. The Post reported then. Two days later, he struck again.

He spent five years behind bars for the two jobs and was paroled in June 2015, records show.

Cops caught him Wednesday after he allegedly held up two more banks. He admitted to having robbed seven banks in Manhattan and Queens since March, as well as ones in LA, New Orleans and Las Vegas, officials said Thursday.

Despite wearing the caps of both New York teams, Waulters, 50, confirmed he is a Bombers fan, a law-enforcement source said.

Waulters was held without bail after a hearing Thursday. His lawyer, Jonathan Marviny, declined to comment.

# 'Mob dealer' outside posh prep

A Gambino crime-family associate has been arrested for selling painkillers "right in front of" Brooklyn's prestigious Poly Prep Country Day School, authorities said Thursday.

Cops charged ringleader Raymond Raimondi and cohorts Robert Florio, Louisa Valentin, Jeffrey

Tesoro, Vincent Maniscalco and Paul Consentino with conspiracy and sale of a controlled substance, officials said.

Raimondi and Maniscalco have ties to Gambino soldiers, investigators said.

The ring would collect the painkillers from Brooklyn pharmacies and give them to Raimondi, who resold them in Brooklyn and on Staten Island, officials said.

Raimondi allegedly sold one undercover officer \$25,000 in painkillers "right in front" of Poly Prep in Bay Ridge, according to Kati Cornell of the city's Special Narcotics Prosecutor's Office.

It's unclear if any of the drug ring's clients were students at the \$40,000-a-year school, officials said.

At his arraignment Thursday, Tesoro wore blue-felt pajamas bearing images of beer mugs and

pretzels. He left court strapped into a wheelchair after complaining he was in too much pain to walk.

Florio's lawyer, Michael Fine-man, was not concerned when the judge ordered his client held on \$5,000 bail.

"His wife works for Goldman Sachs, so \$5,000 isn't gonna be a problem," the lawyer was heard taunting special narcotics prosecutor Kirsten Krueger.

## Breast-feeding may cut cancer

Women who breast-feed their babies for the recommended six months may also be lowering their own risk of developing endometrial cancer, a new study suggests.

In the analysis of data from 17 past studies, researchers found that women who had ever breast-fed their babies were 11 percent less likely than women who had children but didn't breast-feed to be diagnosed with endometrial cancer.

Longer breast-feeding seemed to further lower the cancer risk, but there was little extra benefit past six to nine months, says the study in Obstet-

rics and Gynecology.

"Cancer of the uterus is becoming more common and we need to try to prevent it," said lead author Susan Jordan of the QIMR Berghofer Medical Research Institute in Brisbane, Australia.

Endometrial cancer is the fourth most common cancer in women in high-income countries such as the United States, Canada and Australia.

The study doesn't prove that breast-feeding cuts endometrial-cancer risks, but it's plausible, the authors write, because the growth of this type of cancer is stimulated by estrogen, which is suppressed during breast-feeding. *Reuters*

## 18-hr. flight will numb your bum

United Airlines will start flying between Los Angeles and Singapore, a distance of about 8,700 miles, making it the longest route to or from the United States.

Westbound flights will be a derriere-numbing 17 hours and 55 minutes. They will leave Los Angeles each evening and arrive two days later local time in Singapore.

The eastbound leg will take 15 hours and 15 minutes with the prevailing tail wind.

The airline said Thursday that with government approval, flights will start Oct. 27 using Boeing 787 planes.

The longest current US flight is Qantas' 8,578-mile trip from Dallas-Fort Worth to Sydney, Australia.

Worldwide, Qatar Airlines offers a 9,032-mile flight from its hub in Doha to Auckland, New Zealand. *AP*

Eggs significantly increased growth in young children and reduced their stunting by 47 percent, according to a study by researchers at Washington University in St. Louis. In a controlled trial in Ecuador conducted in 2015, babies 6 to 9 months old were randomly assigned to be given one egg per day for 6 months, versus a control group, which did not receive eggs. Models indicated a reduced prevalence of stunting by 47 percent and low weight by 74 percent for those children who consumed eggs.

# No more kid nups

## NY marriage age to be raised to 17

A little-known state law that allows kids as young as 14 to get married is about to be removed from the books.

The Assembly on Thursday unanimously passed a bill raising the minimum wedding age to 17, and that's only with both judicial and parental consent.

Advocates said it was about time.

"Child marriage is a human-rights violation that fosters gender inequality and exploitation and whose victims are three times more likely to suffer do-

mestic violence, are much less likely to complete their education and are not able to bring divorce or annulment in their own names," said Judy Harris Kluger, director of Sanctuary for Families.

The legislation, sponsored by Assemblywoman Amy Paulin (D-Westchester) and state Sen. Andrew Lanza (R-SI), ends a practice where kids between 14 and 17 could get hitched if their parents approved.

Paulin said that some of the marriages were "forced."

"This practice is a viola-

tion of human rights that has consistently had a disproportionately discriminatory effect on young girls, inflicting physical and mental-health issues, robbing them of educational opportunities, and increasing their risk of experiencing violence," Paulin said.

Records show that 3,850 children between 14 and 18 were married in the state from 2000 through 2010.

Eighty-four percent were girls, but the two 14-year-olds who married in 2010 were boys.

Current state law sets 18 as the minimum marriage

age, but younger people have wed with the blessing or urging of their families, although 14- and 15-year-olds require court approval as well.

Kluger called that "unacceptable and outmoded."

The new law would outlaw marriages of those under 17 entirely. No consent is needed starting at 18.

The state Senate passed the legislation in March.

Gov. Cuomo made it clear he would sign the bill quickly.

"It's shocking current law allows for children as young as 14 to be married off," he said.

## Battered gran dies

An 80-year-old Queens woman — whose hulking, much younger boyfriend was arrested last weekend for allegedly beating her up — was found dead in her apartment Thursday, law-enforcement sources said.

Janina Olszweka had visible trauma to the head and body when her son found her, sources said. The victim's boyfriend, Marek Piotrkowicz, had been arrested for domestic assault against her five days earlier.

Piotrkowicz, 56, was charged with assault and endangerment, then released by Queens Criminal Judge John Zoll on his own recognizance, according to the Queens DA's Office.

Police were interviewing him and the woman's son, Irek, who routinely fought with his mom, sources said.

## Teacher scolded for Trump tirades

A city teacher repeatedly trashed President Trump to his class before last November's election — and a fed-up student recorded him in the act, The Post has learned.

The Special Commissioner of Investigation probed Susan Wagner HS teacher Alfred Teutonico after the student said he used class time to call Trump a "rapist," a "crook," and a "dictator," documents show.

The teen told investigators Teutonico (inset) "spent the

first two to three minutes of each class 'bashing' Donald Trump," an SCI report says.

The teacher acknowledged to probers that he occasionally opined on the election in class. The SCI concluded he made "political comments" that "were unrelated to the topic of the class lesson."

Teutonico was issued a letter of reprimand, according to the Department of Education. He declined to comment.

## 'Real' hubby on thin ice
