The New York State Public Service Commission seeks public comment and will hold five public statement hearings concerning the Joint Petition filed in the above-captioned matter by Charter Communications, Inc. (Charter) and Time Warner Cable Inc. (TWC). The Joint Petition seeks approval for a series of financial and legal transactions that will combine Charter and TWC into a single company. If this merger occurs, the petitioners assert that the merged entity, identified for purposes of the petition as New Charter, will own and/or manage systems serving approximately 19.4 million broadband customers, 17.3 million video customers, and 9.4 million voice customers across 41 states. As a result of the merger, Charter will acquire, and it intends to retain, all of TWC's existing assets in New York State.

Petitioners assert that the proposed merger will provide net public interest benefits to the New York customers of the merged entity and is in the public interest. According to the petitioners, the benefits identified in the petition and associated with cable and video services occur as a result of the introduction of Charter's all-digital platforms to TWC's New York customers and the provision of additional service offerings and faster broadband service to these customers. For cable, video and voice service, the petition asserts that public benefits from the merger will be enjoyed by New York customers because there are no negative effects on competition for the provision of video or voice services.



Angola waterline-replacement project is OK'd

A waterline-replacement project on Grove Street in Angola was approved by the Village Board on Monday after it awarded a nearly \$265,000 bid to DJM Contracting of Elma.
That (project) is coming soon, said Mayor Howard M. "Hub" Pawley.
The project is expected to begin in the next few weeks, once DJM finishes with another project, and is expected to take a month to complete.
Construction of the waterline on Grove will take place from Prospect Street to the

west of Washington Street. The project will consist of nearly 1,900 feet of 8-inch-diameter polyvinyl chloride pipe, along with ductile iron fittings, gate valves, copper service replacements and other work related to the construction. Once completed, the waterline will have an expected life of about 40 years.
Trustee William G. Houston, who was asked to read the resolution into the minutes, asked that someone else read it because he was unsure at the time about whether he would vote in favor.
"I may be voting against this one," Houston said.
He questioned why it showed a possible

\$12,000 reduction in cost if the project consisted of using the current fire hydrants.
Houston decided to vote in favor of the project after he was told that DJM's pricing was the same with or without new hydrants.
Pawley asked that the resolution be amended to clarify that new fire hydrants will be included in the project.
The village will receive \$100,000 it was awarded as part of Community Development Block Grant funding for the project. It also agreed to borrow \$255,000 in serial bonds to help pay for the remainder of the project. The agreement calls for the village to pay back the bonds as part of a five-year loan.

Court backs Senecas on keeping casino open

The nine-year legal battle to end casino gambling in Buffalo and Niagara Falls may be over.
With the help of a federal appeals court, the Seneca Nation of Indians has won the right to keep its downtown Buffalo casino open, the latest and possibly last lawsuit challenging the Seneca Nation's three casinos.
The 2nd U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in New York City upheld a lower court ruling declaring that the Seneca Buffalo Creek Casino meets all the requirements of federal law. The appeals court ruling ends the latest court challenge by the Citizens Against Casino Gambling in Erie County,

and in the eyes of Seneca officials, upholds their right to full governmental authority over all their lands.
"The Seneca Nation will never tire in the battle to protect our sovereign rights and to exercise those rights for the benefit of our people and all those around us," Seneca President Maurice John Sr. said in a statement Tuesday.
The Seneca Nation recently announced plans for a \$40 million expansion of its downtown Buffalo casino.
The appeals court ruling upholds a 2013 decision by U.S. District Judge William M. Skrety, who rejected the argument that the downtown casino is illegal.
Skrety, who had ruled in favor of casino opponents in two previous lawsuits, found

reason to rule against them this time.
This suit, like the previous ones, argued that the Senecas do not have jurisdiction over their own property and, even if they did, the land is subject to a federal prohibition against gambling.
Skrety, in his latest ruling, pointed to a "new and critical" development regarding the federal government's approval of the downtown casino.
Unlike the two previous suits, he concluded that the Senecas' downtown property is "gaming eligible" because it is now clear that Congress never intended its gambling prohibitions to apply to the casino in Buffalo.

Springville streetscape plan gets block grant

Springville has received a \$225,000 grant for the second phase of a streetscape project on Factory and Franklin streets.
Village Board members announced during a meeting Monday night that Erie County officials had informed them that the village has been approved for a Community Development Block Grant for which it applied earlier in the year.
"With me for the development of the village center," said Mayor William J. Krebs.
The project includes constructing a new parking lot behind the Municipal Building at 65 Franklin St. and creating picnic areas near the building.

As part of the project, the Springville SkatePlex, a skateboarding facility, will be moved closer to the Hubert Library of the Town of Concord. A donated 30-foot-wide gazebo has been placed behind the building and may be used for weddings, theatrical performances and other functions.
The funding will come from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development through the county Department of Environment and Planning.
In another matter, officials agreed to mail surveys to residents with their utility bills asking whether the village should allow small outdoor animals such as chickens, pot-bellied pigs, rabbits and goats.
Board members discussed the possible law change because one resident complained about another's chickens. The vil-

lage forbids outdoor animals but allows each home to have up to six indoor animals.
"Before we look at the possibilities of amending the law, we should see if there is interest," Krebs said.
"Those farms in the village are exempt from the law because they were grandfathered in.
Officials expect to mail the surveys in October and receive responses from residents in November.
The board will meet only once in September. Board members usually meet on the first and third Monday nights of each month, but the schedule was changed because of Labor Day.
The normal schedule will resume in October.

Public mum in Newstead turbine law hearing

A public hearing on proposed changes to Newstead's wind turbine law drew no comments from the handful of residents on hand at Monday evening's Town Board meeting.
Supervisor David L. Cummings said he was "surprised"

by the low turnout at the meeting. "I thought we'd have a lot more people here tonight," he said.
Board members had prepared for more public interest in the proposed law, allotting 20 minutes for the hearing, compared with five or 10 minutes given to other hearings.
However, Cummings said

he took the low turnout as approval of the board's actions on the law from town residents interested in the topic.
"I'm sure that people who are concerned about the issue looked at it and apparently agreed," he said. "The only way you can interpret it is that they agree that the proper changes were made."
The town implemented a six-month moratorium on wind energy in April while the board addressed residential wind turbines.
With no comments during the hearing, the board planned to move ahead with a vote on the proposed law, but that was put aside when Town Attorney Nathan S. Neill noticed that the town didn't have approval from Erie County Planning Board to move ahead with the vote.
The Town Board will now vote on the measure at its Sept. 26 meeting.
The proposed law includes sections designating where the windmills can be placed, how high they can be and how loud. According to the law, wind turbines are not to exceed 50 decibels at 20 miles



Ministers can't agree on migrants

BRUSSELS — Even as three more countries followed Germany in introducing border checks to control a flood of migrants, the European Union on Monday failed to agree on a modest plan that would force individual countries to take in a share of some of the hundreds of thousands now seeking asylum in Europe.

Gathering in Brussels for an emergency meeting, interior ministers from across Europe agreed to share 40,000 refugees sheltering in Greece and Italy, but to share them only on a voluntary basis, a watered-down version of a plan first announced in May.

But as the fractious meeting stretched into the evening, there seemed little prospect that ministers would endorse a new plan put forward last week by Jean-Claude Juncker, president of the European Commission, for a program of resettlement for a further 120,000 asylum seekers that would be compulsory for member countries.

Diplomats said ministers had agreed in principle to this number but not on how it would be divided up among different countries. Discussion on that will resume next month.

The ministers asked Luxembourg to issue a report of their conclusions.
