





HONEOYE FALLS – Historian Jane Oakes will present a program “Early Hop Production in the Genesee Country” on Sept. 1 for the Honeoye Falls/Town of Mendon Historical Society. The presentation is scheduled for 7:30 p.m. at the Mendon Community Center, 167 North Main St., Honeoye Falls. During part of the 19th century, New York was producing most of the hops in the United States. Subjects

included in Jane’s talk are the growing of hops, the social aspect of hops. hop harvesting, how hops were used for brewing and medicine and the boom and bust of the local hops industry. For more information, call (585) 624-5655. Oakes frequently shares local history stories at area libraries, historical societies, and other lecture series. Her topics have included the region’s cheese factories, pioneering women physicians, upstate water cures

and opera houses. Oakes has been involved with historical education for over 40 years, beginning as a teen volunteer at the Valentin Museum in Victor. Her research into local history has contributed to the placement of two structures in Livingston County on the National Register of Historic Places, the Avon Opera House and Avon’s five-arch bridge. Oakes has a bachelor’s degree in theater with a minor in anthropology and a master’s degree in history.

Lecture series highlights effort to help refugees

Livonia Public Library, 2 Washington St., Livonia, will launch a series of community conversation programs on Sept. 1. The first presentation in the series will feature Rochester Rolling Resettlement, a new initiative created by a group of Afghan refugees, who currently partner with the Friends of Roc City Skatepark, regional nonprofits, and the international organization Skateistan. The program is scheduled for 6:30 p.m. The program is free and open to all ages. Local Afghan refugees will discuss their experiences fleeing Afghanistan in 2021, moving to Rochester, and their passion for helping children connect with action sports through Rochester Rolling Resettlement, followed by a question-and-answer session. “I am incredibly excited to bring the amazing people from Rochester Rolling Resettlement here to the Livonia Public Library to discuss their astonishing journey to America and all of the good work they are now doing to help local youth experience action sports,”

says Library Director Frank Sykes. “Their transition to Rochester and enthusiasm for teaching others is an inspiration to me and I hope to others as well.” Skateistan is a nonprofit that introduces Afghan children and other youths who are often excluded from athletics to skateboarding and the creativity and freedom that comes with the sport. The nonprofit is based in Berlin, Germany, but started a pilot program in Rochester — the first in the United States — because of the city’s high concentration of refugees from Afghanistan,

according to City newspaper of Rochester. Last year, Rochester welcomed 323 refugees from Afghanistan, according to Catholic Charities Family and Community Services, which helps settle refugees in the area. To put that number in perspective, it is greater than the number of Afghans who had settled here in the previous five years combined, according to the City newspaper report. NOTICE OF SUBMISSION OF JOINT PERMIT APPLICATION, INCLUDING WATER QUALITY CERTIFICATION

This notice announces that, on or about September 6, 2022, Morris Ridge Solar Energy Center, LLC (“MRSEC” or “Applicant”), a subsidiary of EDF Renewables Development, Inc., will file a Joint Application for wetlands and related permits, including a request for a Water Quality Certification (WQC), with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) and New York State Office of Renewable Energy Siting (ORES), respectively, relating to its proposed 177 megawatt (MW-AC) solar-powered electric generation project to be located in the Town of Mount Morris, Livingston County, known as the Morris Ridge Solar Energy Center.

On June 25, 2021, the Applicant was issued a Siting Permit under Section 94-c of the New York Executive Law from ORES (Matter # 21-00025). The Joint Application that is the subject of this notice covers the permits/approvals required to construct and/or operate the Project under the Clean Water Act § 404 from the USACE and for Water Quality Certification from ORES (Clean Water Act § 401 and 6 NYCRR Part 608). No public comment period is required for the Joint Application at this time.

The Joint Application includes, among other things: a description of the Project, including details on Project components, Project design, Project construction, and related information; an analysis of the environmental setting of the Project; results from analyses conducted to assess potential impacts to aquatic resources, streams and jurisdictional waters from construction and operation of the Project; proposed measures to minimize environmental impacts; and reasonable alternatives. The Application also addresses compliance with the Endangered Species Act and the Historic Preservation Act.

The Project will have the following environmental impacts relevant to the Joint Permit Application under review. Construction of the Facility is anticipated to result in less than a half-acre of temporary impacts to federally jurisdictional wetlands and streams. In addition, four new permanent culvert crossings of federally jurisdictional streams will be installed. The construction of the Facility will not result in any permanent loss (fill) or forest conversion impacts to federally-regulated or State-regulated wetlands or State-regulated adjacent areas.

Pursuant to the ORES regulations, this notice is being provided in accordance with 19 NYCRR § 900-1.4(b)(1) and § 1.6(c) and will be published at least three (3) days prior to the filing of the Joint Application with ORES. A copy of the Joint Application will be served on the Chief Executive Officer of each municipality in which any portion of the Project is located, as well as those persons and agencies enumerated in 19 NYCRR § 900-1.6(a).

This Joint Application, when filed with ORES, will be available on the Project’s dedicated website (<https://www.edf-re.com/project/morris-ridge-solar-project/>) or on the ORES website at (<https://ores.ny.gov/permit-applications>) under Matter Number 21-00025.
