

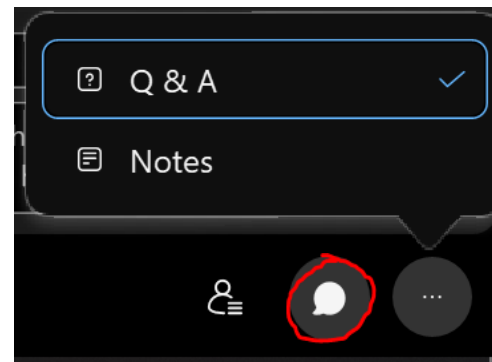
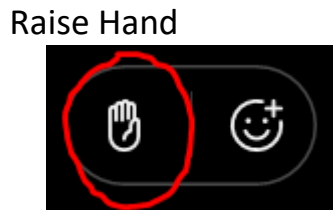
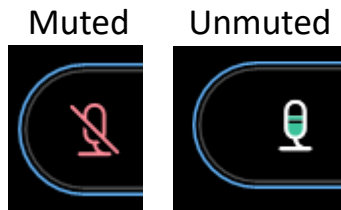

Background & Order Directing Proposals

Recent Procedural History

- **9/15/2022** Order Initiating NENY and Clean Energy Fund Interim Reviews
- **12/19/2022** DPS Staff files EE/BE Report seeking stakeholder feedback
- **3/2023** Stakeholders file comments in response to Staff EE/BE Report
- **7/20/2023** Order setting parameters for 2026-2030 LMI and Non-LMI EE/BE portfolios and directing PAs to file proposals
- **11/1/2023 – 1/25/2024** PAs file proposals and supplements
- **1/26/2024** Secretary issues Notice Soliciting Comments

PSC Order Directing Proposals

- Established roles among the PAs with respect to the Non-LMI and LMI portfolios
 - Designated NYSERDA as the lead administrator of LMI one- to four-family programs statewide, affordable multifamily programs in the Upstate region, and affordable new construction programs statewide.
 - Established that NYSERDA, Con Edison, and KEDLI/KEDNY should collaboratively administer LMI programs for the affordable multifamily segment in the Downstate region.
- Established \$1 Billion annual budget across PAs, between LMI (30%) and non-LMI (70%), for 2026 through 2030
- Adopted a “Strategic Framework” to guide the evolution of the EE/BE portfolios and ensure that they are aligned with New York’s energy efficiency and emissions reduction policy objectives
- Directed DPS Staff to assess the form and function of the LMI JMC and initiate improvements to more effectively deploy ratepayer-funded LMI programs

2026-2030 LMI EE/BE Portfolio

LMI EE/BE Portfolio

Portfolio Objectives

- Reduce energy consumption and cost for households experiencing the greatest energy burden;
- Maximize the impact of ratepayer funds through effective coordination, the leveraging of other funding sources, and administrative efficiencies;
- Simplify participation and administrative burden for applicants and contractors;
- Seek and incorporate feedback from market participants in the design and implementation of programs;
- Enhance transparency in program and portfolio performance; and
- Ensure clarity and certainty on program guidelines, goals, and budgets to market participants, including the minimization of volatility in program budgets.

Portfolio at a Glance

- \$1.57 billion from 2026-2030
- 100.4 million MMBtu e- in lifetime energy savings
- Estimated over 600k LMI households served

LMI EE/BE Budgets

- \$313M annually to LMI programs, an increase of \$131M per year over current funding levels
- Together, the Non-LMI and LMI Orders modify NYSERDA's proposed budget allocations to maximize funding for LMI EE/BE projects and increase resources for workforce development:
 - Increase in budgets to programs incentivizing LMI projects by \$97M
 - Increase total funding for Workforce Development from \$66.1M to \$83M and adjust so that a greater proportion comes from Non-LMI budget
 - Reduce total General Awareness and Education budget and shift some funding for Disadvantaged Communities engagement to the Non-LMI budget
 - Reduce NYSERDA administrative budget from 14.2% to 12%, with reduction (\$22M) going back into LMI programs
- “Money Out the Door” metric established at 80% of total funding
- PAs have limited flexibility to shift budgets across years to ensure sufficient funding through 2030
- Budgets can be administered on a fuel neutral basis

Administration and Oversight

- Transition away from current JMC structure
 - DPS Staff to document transition in filing by June 29, 2025
- NYSERDA, KEDLI and KEDNY (National Grid), and Con Edison to file single 2026-2030 LMI Portfolio Implementation Plan by September 12, 2025
- Improvements in LMI Portfolio Management
 - Order calls for increased oversight by DPS Staff
 - Staff to develop Key Performance Indicators with input from stakeholders
 - Staff to file Performance Management Framework by July 14, 2025
 - Order calls for improved stakeholder engagement by DPS Staff and PAs
 - Coordination with Energy Affordability Policy (EAP) Working Group

DPS Oversight

- Provide the ability for DPS Staff, PAs, and stakeholders to have visibility into key program metrics and outcomes.
- JMC transition to align PA coordination with the administrative responsibilities in the 2026-2030 timeframe
- Facilitate improved stakeholder engagement on the LMI EE/BE portfolio, including the incorporation of in-person stakeholder meetings to discuss the status and performance of programs, emerging issues, and opportunities for improvement.
- In engaging representatives of Disadvantaged Communities, DPS Staff and the PAs should leverage, where appropriate, the ratepayer-funded Disadvantaged Community Engagement initiatives administered by NYSERDA, including the Regional Clean Energy Hubs and the Energy Equity Collaborative.

Performance Management

- DPS Staff ordered to establish a framework that can be used to track progress and measure the overall performance of the 2026-2030 LMI programs and portfolio
 - Identify key performance indicators (KPI) for the LMI programs that can be used to measure progress
 - Staff currently assessing the current reporting structure and considering enhancements that might include more granular and frequent reporting
 - Plans for enhanced stakeholder engagement, both DPS and PAs

Program Areas and Considerations

One- to Four-Family Homes

- NYSERDA to administer EmPower+ statewide as primary EE/BE program for LMI 1-4 family homes
- Includes no-cost home energy assessment, no-cost direct-install component, and comprehensive track (full subsidy for low-income; up to 50% for moderate-income)
- Incentive structure will be addressed in Implementation Plan and subject to DPS Staff Approval
- NYSERDA to assess program participation by region and specify how it will improve uptake in underserved regions
- NYSERDA to coordinate with LIPA to align offerings and ensure that Long Island LMI customers have equitable access to EE/BE programs

Customer Referrals

NYSERDA and Utilities to focus on improving customer referral process:

- Prioritize low-income customers with high energy consumption
- NYSERDA and Utilities to jointly file LMI Customer Referral Plan by July 14, 2025
 - Specify utility customer information to be shared with NYSERDA in accordance with DPS Data Access Framework
 - Detail steps to increase conversion of referrals to program enrollments
- NYSERDA to make 3% of EmPower+ and Upstate Multifamily program budgets available to Utilities for customer referral and coordination activities
 - Allocation by utility to be determined after filing of Customer Referral Plan

Affordable Multifamily

- Con Edison and KEDLI/KEDNY (National Grid) to continue administering Affordable Multifamily Energy Efficiency Program (AMEEP) in their service territories
- NYSERDA to administer:
 - Upstate affordable multifamily program
 - Direct Injection program providing incentives and assistance to HPD and HCR
 - Technical Assistance offerings for affordable multifamily building owners
- NYSERDA to refine technical assistance offerings
 - NYSERDA directed to clearly communicate levels of technical assistance available to the market and, where relevant, right-size assistance to align with utility incentive program design and delivery

Affordable New Construction

- Meeting shifts in high performance building code will require shifts in building design, development, and construction practices
- NYSERDA to transition support for affordable new construction activities from the provision of direct incentives to offering technical assistance for developers, builders, the design community, and housing agencies.

LMI Electrification

- Scaling electrification in LMI segment is challenged by installation costs, operating cost concerns, knowledge gaps & limitations on available data, and varying housing typologies. Order authorizing Energy Affordability Guarantee Pilot (14-M-0565) will help fill knowledge and data gaps.
- Order outlines guiding principles for LMI Electrification:
 1. Prioritize Weatherization and Energy Efficiency
 2. Focus on Energy Affordability
 3. Target the Conversion of Delivered Fuels Customers
 4. Align Programs and Policies to Enable Affordable Electrification
 - Examples include bill assistance, landlord/tenant cost-shifts, submetering policies, and other programs that mitigate energy burden.
- 15% of LMI EE/BE program budgets to support LMI electrification

Income Eligibility Considerations

- Order directs NYSERDA to modify criteria for low-income (EmPower+) to include annual income at or below 60% of State Median Income/Area Median Income, whichever is higher
- PAs to coordinate with housing agencies to identify opportunities to align affordable multifamily program eligibility criteria between programs
- Commission declines to broadly adopt open-ended geographic eligibility for programs specifically directed to address needs of income-eligible customers
 - Encourages PAs to explore strategies to streamline EE/BE program enrollment and facilitate community-scale projects
 - PAs may consider specific opportunities to incorporate geographic eligibility in a manner that ensures LMI funds are not directed toward non-LMI households

Cross-Portfolio Activities

Disadvantaged Communities

- Order emphasizes that NYSERDA's DAC Engagement proposals should not be understood as serving primarily LMI customers or working primarily with LMI programs.
- Climate Justice Working Group explicitly included low-income households in the Disadvantaged Community Criteria for the purposes of the accounting of clean energy and energy efficiency investments.
- It is the Commission's position that the responsibility to invest in EE/BE and clean energy solutions in Disadvantaged Communities must not fall primarily to the 2026-2030 LMI Portfolio.
- Order reinforces that PAs must focus on reaching a collective goal of at least 40 percent of annual EE/BE program investments occurring within geographic Disadvantaged Communities.
- Order directed DPS staff to work with PAs to monitor DAC reporting over time and address instances of under-investment.

DAC Engagement

- The Commission directed PAs to consult with the Regional Clean Energy Hubs and engage with stakeholders representing DACs to identify needs and opportunities in DACs, reiterated in Non-LMI EE/BE Order.
- The Commission expects the utilities to collaborate with the Regional Clean Energy Hubs to increase access to utility-administered programs.
- The Order directs Staff and the PAs to consider how to leverage the Energy Equity Collaborative and DAC Stakeholder Services Pool.

General Awareness & Education

- EE/BE Orders direct NYSERDA to refine its approach to general consumer awareness initiatives:
 - NYSERDA marketing efforts should be synchronized to drive participation levels that can be supported with available program budgets
 - NYSERDA should focus on targeted outreach to customers identified by the Utilities as high priority, as well as customers in geographic areas where NYSERDA and/or stakeholders identify a need and/or capacity to serve more customers, ahead of implementing broader general awareness campaigns
- Joint Customer Platform Utility Integration Plan included in Non-LMI EE/BE Order will be inclusive of Non-LMI and LMI portfolio needs. Statewide Residential Engagement Website will integrate offerings across the entire EE/BE portfolio and satisfy the need for a more streamlined, accessible, and comprehensive customer interface.

Workforce Development

- Orders authorize funding for NYSERDA Workforce Development programming:
 - Build workforce required to accomplish scale of EE/BE work necessary to achieve Commission's goals
 - Prioritize training opportunities for LMI workers and Disadvantaged Community residents
 - Commission encourages NYSERDA to align training curricula and program designs with EE/BE contractor needs and create a pipeline of trainees that can be hired by contractors participating in NYSERDA and utility EE/BE programs.
- Orders distribute WFD funding between Non-LMI and LMI budgets and direct NYSERDA to realign outcomes such that benefits to Disadvantaged Communities result from both Non-LMI and LMI Portfolio spending.
- NYSERDA to file single EE/BE Workforce Development Implementation Plan by August 13, 2025
- Commission directs NYSERDA, in consultation with DPS Staff and stakeholders, to conduct assessment of NYS EE/BE workforce needs and opportunities, due January 31, 2026

Category	Framework	Budget Allocation
Non-Strategic Measures	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Jeopardize the advancement of Strategic energy efficiency and/or building electrification programs or measures; • Increase the use of fossil fuels; • Have an Effective Useful Life of six years or less; • Do not promote conservation behaviors and result in use of more energy through increased operation of a measure; or • Are naturally occurring energy efficiency that results from codes and standards, or through routine market adoption which typically occurs without targeted financing options, rebates, or incentives. 	0%

Strategic Framework: Application

- Measures classified as Non-Strategic include:
 - Lighting
 - Electric plug-in appliances
 - Residential natural gas-fired equipment
 - Partial, phased, or hybrid electrification*
 - Measures with Estimated Useful Life (EUL) \leq 6 years
- Limited deviations from the Strategic Framework are allowed where they support energy affordability for LMI customers

* Phased electrification conditionally allowed for buildings of more than one unit. Hybrid heating solutions are Non-Strategic, but DPS Staff to conduct analysis to inform future programming within EE/BE portfolios and other relevant Commission proceedings.

Strategic Framework: LMI Modifications

Measure Category	LMI Determination
Lighting	Neutral when part of comprehensive work scope; Non-Strategic after 2027.
Appliances	Refrigerators considered Neutral when replacement of existing refrigerator improves energy affordability.
Direct Install Measures	Neutral if installed directly by a contractor as part of a package of measures intended to reduce energy consumption.
Gas Efficiency	Neutral when packaged as part of a comprehensive work scope.

Strategic Framework: LMI Modifications

Measure Category	LMI Determination
Gas Combustion Devices	Conditionally approved for hard-to-electrify multifamily applications, within budgetary limits and acceptable criteria to be established in Implementation Plan. Neutral for 1-4 family only in some emergency no-heat circumstances.
Phased Electrification	Conditionally approved for residential buildings with more than one unit.
Multifamily Comprehensive Work Scopes	Conditionally approved provided limited portion of costs attributed to lighting and subject to gas combustion equipment restrictions outlined above.

Pre-Weatherization Improvements

- Up to 10% of LMI program budgets may be used for remediation of health and safety barriers to building weatherization
 - Available to customers who have been or would be deferred from EE/BE programs due to health and safety hazards or building structural deficiencies
- Order directs reporting and assessment of pre-weatherization investments
 - PAs to track and report data on EE/BE project deferrals and pre-weatherization measures completed through LMI EE/BE programs.
 - After three years of reporting, DPS Staff to assess data and revisit approach.
- Commission expects NYSERDA to seek supplemental funding solutions for most frequent measures preventing LMI households and affordable multifamily buildings from participating in EE/BE programs.
- DPS Staff to coordinate with state agencies on opportunities to leverage publicly funded housing and health programs in the administration of EE/BE programs.

Metrics and Targets

- Primary energy savings targets by PA in Lifetime MMBtu-e (LMMBtu-e) to encourage longer-lived measures
- Additional LMI Portfolio metrics to be established in Performance Management Framework

Cost Recovery

- Utilities to transition back to cost recovery via surcharge
- NYSERDA LMI Portfolio costs to be allocated 50/50 between electric and gas customers (currently electric only)
