Trump supportive of Ukraine's prospects

UNITED NATIONS – President Donald Trump offered an optimistic assessment of Ukraine's prospects after meeting with Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy at the United Nations, saying he believes the country can retake all its territory from Russia after previously asserting that territorial concessions would be a necessity.

Trump claimed Ukraine "is in a position to fight and WIN all of Ukraine back in its original form."

"With time, patience and the financial support of Europe and, in particular, NATO, the original Borders from where this War started, is very much an option. Why not?" Trump said on social media, adding that Russia looked weak after "fighting aimlessly for 3½ years."

Trump said earlier that NATO countries should shoot down Russian aircraft that violate their air space but said U.S. involvement in a potential conflict would depend on the circumstances.

The president's about-face on Ukraine's ability to win the war and support for NATO nations such as Poland that have had their airspace breached came after a day of meetings with U.S. allies during the United Nations General Assembly gathering Sept. 23.

Zelenskyy told Trump there was "good news" on the battlefield and thanked him for selling NATO weapons that are being transferred to Ukraine.

On social media, Trump – who once berated Zelenskyy in the Oval Office – praised him as "a great man" who is "putting up one hell of a fight." After the meeting, Trump jabbed at Russia as a "paper tiger" and said on social media that the United States would continue to funnel weapons to Ukraine through

NATO. Trump's comments about Ukraine regaining its territory are a shift from what he said in the run-up to a meeting in Alaska last month with Russian President Vladimir Putin. Trump rolled out the red carpet for the Russian leader in the hopes the meeting could generate a breakthrough in peace talks.

Putin is seeking full authority over four Ukrainian regions – Luhansk, Donetsk, Zaporizhzhia and Kherson – and the Black Sea peninsula of Crimea, which he annexed in 2014. His forces do not currently control all the territory in the regions.

In August, after he met with Putin, Trump said Ukraine would have to engage in some "swapping of territories." Zelenskyy has rejected any territorial concessions.

The Aug. 15 Alaska summit ended without a deal. And since then, Putin has continued to pound Ukraine, to Trump's frustration.

Before meeting with Zelenskyy, Trump delivered a speech to the General Assembly in which he threatened Russia with tariffs and urged European na-

tions to adopt stiff economic measures to force an end to the war.

"In the event that Russia is not ready to make a deal to end the war, then the United States is fully prepared to impose a very strong round of powerful tariffs, which would stop the bloodshed, I believe, very quickly," Trump said. "But for those tariffs to be effective, European nations ... would have to join us in adopting the exact same measures."

Trump has said he'll put tariffs on nations that are purchasing Russian oil and gas as soon as the European Union and NATO allies fully cut Moscow off. Those efforts have been hampered by Slovakia, Hungary, and Turkey, which are still heavily reliant on Russian oil.

European Commission President Ursula von der Leyen told reporters later, during a meeting with Trump, that the bloc would put sanctions on ports where fossil fuels are coming from Russia. "We want to put tariffs on oil supplies that are still coming to the European Union," she said. "We want to get rid of it."

She said the EU has "to be faster" than a deadline it set for 2027.

Trump said during his meeting with Zelenskyy that NATO countries should shoot down Russian aircraft that violate their air space.

But when asked if the United States would help the countries if they engage Russian aircraft, Trump said it "depends on the circumstance," without elaborating.

His comments came after Poland,

Romania and Estonia recently reported incursions by Russian aircraft over their territories.

Poland reported shooting down multiple drones, while NATO Italian fighter jets escorted three Russian MiG-31 fighter jets away from Estonian territory and Romania scrambled fighter jets to intercept a drone that eventually left the country's airspace.

The incursions have alarmed European officials, who have issued stern warnings to Russia about further violations. The United Nations Security Council held an emergency meeting Sept. 22 at Estonia's request, where officials warned Russia that it was risking a confrontation with NATO.

"Our alliance is defensive, but be under no illusion ... if we need to confront planes that are operating in NATO airspace without permission, then we will do so," British Foreign Secretary Yvette Cooper said at the meeting, according to CNN.

Polish Prime Minister Donald Tusk said Sept. 22 that his country would shoot down aircraft when there is a clear incursion on the nation's territory.

After Trump agreed that NATO nations should shoot down the aircraft, Polish Foreign Minister Radoslaw Sikorski said in a post on X: "Roger that."

Sikorski told USA TODAY in an interview at the United Nations before Trump's comments that Poland supported Trump's attempt to persuade Putin to end the war. But the approach isn't working, he said, pointing to the incursions and Putin's stepped-up attacks on Kyiv.

"We hope that President Trump will draw the conclusion that personal diplomacy unfortunately hasn't worked and that he needs to change Putin's calculus by applying pressure on Russia and by helping Ukraine," Sikorski said.

Poland borders Ukraine, which was invaded by Russia in 2022.

The confrontation between NATO countries and Russia over the aircraft incursions has the potential to escalate, potentially drawing in the United States.

Article 5 of the NATO treaty states that an attack on one member nation "shall be considered an attack against them all."

In addition, members of the public and parties to these proceedings are invited to comment on the proposed closure of certain walk-in office locations operated by the Companies.

NYSEG and RG&E filed amendments to their electric and gas tariff schedules on June 30, 2025, proposing to increase their annual electric and gas delivery revenues for the 12-month period ending April 30, 2027. NYSEG proposes to increase its electric delivery revenues by approximately \$464.4 million (an 18.4 percent increase in total revenues or 35.0 percent increase in base delivery revenues), and its natural gas delivery revenues by approximately \$93 million (a 22.1 percent increase in total revenues or 39.4 percent increase in base delivery revenues). RG&E proposes to increase its electric delivery revenues by approximately \$220.2 million (a 19.8 percent increase in total revenues or 36.0 percent increase in base delivery revenues), and its natural gas delivery revenues by approximately \$72.9 million (a 17.1 percent increase in total revenues or 32.0 percent increase in base delivery revenues). trails. Throughout the hike, you can see and hear a stream running through a small gorge which is flanked by red and orange trees. By mid-October, the center will be a great place to see fall foliage at its peak.

Wolfe Park - This local spot on Doran Road in Binghamton has a lot to offer. With about 3.5 miles of trails, an abundance of wildlife and waterfall views, this is the perfect spot if you're looking to try something new.

IBM Glen - The Glen at 1250 Robinson Hill Road in Endicott has a long and important history. The land has had multiple owners, but it eventually got its current name in 1931 when IBM purchased the site, built the IBM Country Club and developed a carefully-built trail with stone steps and bridges, according to the Fred L. Waterman Conservation Center. While much of the stone steps and bridges have crumbled, the hiking trails still offer beautiful views, a small ravine with cliffs and waterfalls as well as trails for all levels of hiking.

Fall foliage hikes: NY parks worth the drive

Watkins Glen State Park - This Schuyler County park is another one for those who hike for the beautiful fall views. The glen, located at 1009 N Franklin St. in Watkins Glen, is the most well-known of the Finger Lakes State Parks and there's good reason for it. In a 2-mile stretch, the glen's stream descends 400 feet past 200-foot cliffs, generating 19 waterfalls along its course, according to New York State Parks and Recreation.

Letchworth State Park - This year, Letchworth State Park, located in Livingston and Wyoming counties, was named the best state park in the nation in USA Today's 10Best readers' choice poll. The park, which has been coined the "Grand Canyon of the East," boasts 66 miles of hiking trails that surround the Genesee River as it travels through the gorge over three major waterfalls between cliffs. Some of the waterfalls reach 600 feet. At this high elevation, hikers get to see far stretches of red and orange trees.

Adirondack Park Mountains - If you have a day to take a trip up north, fall is one of the best times of the year to hike in the Adirondack Park wilderness area. For a day trip, the southern Adirondacks in Warren County offer a variety of trails for hikers of any experience level. For an easy, family-friendly view, the Pinnacle offers a short trip up for stunning fall foliage views. For a more moderate hike, the Sleeping Beauty Mountain hike in the Town of Fort Ann offers a five-mile round-trip path and a summit fit for leaf peeping. Prospect Mountain, one of the most popular hiking destinations in the area, is a challenging 3-mile climb. The trip, however, is worth it for the 100-mile panoramic views of Lake George and the Adirondacks at the summit.

John Boyd Thacher State Park - Thacher Park, located in the Village of Voorheesville, boasts 6 miles of limestone cliff-face, rock-strewn slopes and a panoramic view of the Hudson and Mohawk valleys and the Adirondack and Green mountains, according to state Parks and Recreation. The historic Indian Ladder Trail, a 2½-mile trek through the park, takes you on a journey with views of the Helderberg Mountains, which are covered in red, orange and yellow fall foliage by late September.

Salt Springs State Park - If you feel like you've hit all of the spots in New York, cross the border into Pennsylvania and give this state park a try. Located on Silver Creek and Salt Springs Road in Montrose, Pennsylvania, Salt Springs is a 405-acre park with trails great for hiking, fishing, hunting and wildlife watching. The park has towering hemlock trees, some estimated to be over 300 years old, as well as a rocky gorge cut by Fall Brook Falls with its three waterfalls.

What Adams' absence means in NYC

Mayor leaves race while Mamdani leads Cuomo

New York City Mayor Eric Adams' Sept. 28 announcement that he is dropping his bid for reelection raised hopes among conservatives that Democratic nominee Zohran Mamdani, a socialist state Assembly member, can be stopped by former New York Gov. Andrew Cuomo, who is running as an independent after losing the Democratic primary to Mamdani.

Adams, a centrist Democrat like Cuomo, was also making an independent bid after a federal indictment on corruption charges that were dropped by the Justice Department after President Donald Trump took office.

But it remains unlikely that Cuomo can surmount Mamdani's commanding lead in recent polls if Republican nominee Curtis Sliwa remains in the race.

Basel Smikle, a professor at Columbia University and former director of the New York state Democratic Party, said Adams' decision to leave the race a little under four weeks before early voting begins makes it harder for Cuomo to use the narrowed field to his advantage. In fact, Adams' name will still appear on the ballot as it's too late to be removed.

Smikle pointed to Mamdani's June primary upset, consistently high polling and, more recently, a wave of high-profile endorsements such as former Vice President Kamala Harris, New York Gov. Kathy Hochul and leading community organizations. The top two Democrats in Congress, both from New York City — House Minority Leader Hakeem Jeffries and Senate Minority Leader Chuck Schumer — have not endorsed.

"I think the overall narrative is going to stay the same," he said. "You have a young candidate in Zohran (Mamdani) who has energized the race, versus (Cuomo) as a more establishment candidate."

Adams has trailed the two front-runners in polling for months, while Sliwa — already at a disadvantage in a famously blue city — has yet to net competitive figures.

Now with Adams gone from the race, his vote share could fall to Cuomo.

But Adams' support is smaller than Mamdani's lead. In the three most recent major polls released within the past two weeks, Mamdani has held double-digit leads over Cuomo, ranging from 21 to 18 percentage points ahead. The polls showed Adams with a 7-9% support and Sliwa with a wider range between the three surveys, with 9%, 11% and 17%.

In Quinnipiac University's early September survey of likely voters, pollsters ran the numbers of a hypothetical three-way race should Adams step out of the running. They found Cuomo would net the biggest boon, with a 6-point boost, while Mamdani would get 1 point and Sliwa's percentage of support would remain the same. That would leave Mamdani with 46% support among likely voters, Cuomo with 30% of support and Sliwa at 17%.

A Sept. 9 New York Times poll and analysis estimated a similar outcome, with Adams supporters likely to throw their weight behind Cuomo. The analysis modeled a prospective two-way race between Cuomo and Mamdani, should Sliwa drop out — which the Republican candidate has not signaled since Adams' announcement. That two-way

model showed a highly competitive race, with 48% supporting Mamdani and 44% supporting Cuomo.

Adams has not endorsed Cuomo

On Sept. 5, news outlets reported the Trump administration was considering Adams to serve as ambassador to Saudi Arabia. Adams initially said he hadn't received a formal offer and had always wanted to be New York City's mayor, before declaring his decision to leave the race on Sept. 28 in a nearly 9-minute-long video address posted to X.

"Who would have thought a kid from South Jamaica, Queens, growing up with learning disabilities, would one day become the mayor of the greatest city in the world," Adams said in the address, sitting beside a picture of his late mother.

Adams touted his administration's policies on housing, crime, education and social services, before blaming the media and an independent city agency that administers the city's campaign finance system, for "undermining" his campaign. He also claimed he was "wrongfully charged because I fought for this city," referencing now-dismissed federal charges in 2024 that accused the mayor of accepting free travel and political donations from Turkish officials to take actions that benefited their country.

Notably, Trump hasn't backed fellow Republican Sliwa, founder of the Guardian Angels anti-crime patrol group.

A 65-year-old Democratic mayor elected in 2021, Adams had been facing calls to drop out of the race for months, with his administration plagued by resignations and corruption allegations.

The race's three remaining candidates were quick to release statements reacting to Adams' news on Sept. 28.

Mamdani, whose campaign has focused on the high cost of living in the

city, released a video statement slamming the mayor's record.

"A city that was already hard has become nearly impossible for those who call it home," he said, referring to Adams' tenure. "But a new day is coming. Over the past year, tens of thousands of you have built the biggest grassroots campaign our city has ever seen. You have knocked on millions of doors, all to make the city affordable. In just over five weeks, we will turn the page on the politics of big money and small ideas and deliver a government every New Yorker can be proud of."

Daniel Kurzyna, a spokesperson for Sliwa's campaign, didn't mention Adams at all in response to the news, instead focusing squarely on the race's

front-runner, Mamdani.

"Curtis Sliwa is the only candidate who can defeat Mamdani," Kurzyna said. "Our team, our resources, and our funding are unmatched. Most importantly, we have the best solutions to help working people afford to stay in New York City and feel safe."

In a statement, Cuomo struck a different tone, saying he believes Adams was "putting the well-being of New York City ahead of personal ambition" in dropping out. Cuomo also referred to unnamed "destructive extremist forces" he says could devastate New York City, adding that it is "not too late to stop them" but did not go into further detail.

NYSEG and RG&E filed amendments to their electric and gas delivery schedules on June 30, 2025, proposing to increase their annual electric and gas delivery revenues for the 12-month period ending April 30, 2027. NYSEG proposes to increase its electric delivery revenues by approximately \$464.4 million (an 18.4 percent increase in total revenues or 35.0 percent increase in base delivery revenues), and its natural gas delivery revenues by approximately \$93 million (a 22.1 percent increase in total revenues or 39.4 percent increase in base delivery revenues). RG&E proposes to increase its electric delivery revenues by approximately \$220.2 million (a 19.8 percent increase in total revenues or 36.0 percent increase in base delivery revenues), and its natural gas delivery revenues by approximately \$72.9 million (a 17.1 percent increase in total revenues or 32.0 percent increase in base delivery revenues). The actual bill impacts of these proposed changes on any particular customer class will vary based upon revenue allocation and rate design.
