LECAKES: Let's go on the I call case 24-E-0322. This is the 3 record. proceeding on motion of the Commission as the rates, 4 5 charges, rules, and regulations of Niagara Mohawk Power Corporation, doing business as National Grid 6 7 for Electric Service, and its companion case 8 24-G-0323, proceeding on motion of the Commission as 9 the rates, charges, rules, and regulations of Niagara 10 Mohawk Power Corporation doing business as National Grid for Gas Service. Good afternoon, everyone, and 11 12 welcome. We are here today for a public 13 statement hearing that was noticed on August 26th, 2024. This public statement hearing concerns the proposed changes in the electric and gas delivery rates and practices of National Grid. National Grid

14 15 16 17 18 filed amendments to its electric and gas tariff 19 schedules on May 28th, 2024, proposing to increase 20 its annual electric and gas delivery revenues 21 effective April -- April 1st, 2025. 22 More specifically, National Grid seeks 23 to increase its electric delivery revenues by

24 approximately \$525 million, which would be an 11 25 percent increase in total electric revenues, and its

09/24/24 - Niagara Mohawk Power Corporation d/b/a National Grid - 24-E-0322, 24-G-0323 1 natural gas delivery revenues by approximately \$148 2 million, a 15 percent increase in total gas revenues. These increases would result in total monthly bill 3 4 increases for the average residential customer of approximately \$18.92, or 15 percent, for electric 5 6 customers, and \$18.34 for natural gas customers. 7 The rate request filing states that 8 the company is focused on three priorities. Number 9 one, continuing to deliver safe, reliable energy 10 service to its more than two million customers; number two, enabling customers to affordably meet 11 12 their energy needs while improving the company's 13 customer service; and number three, supporting the goals of the Climate Leadership and Community 14 15 Protection Act. I am Dakin Lecakes, the chief 16 17 administrative law judge for the New York State Public Service Commission, based here in our Buffalo 18 19 office. With me today is Judge Tara Kersey. Judge 20 Kersey and I are here this afternoon to hear your 21 comments for the record on behalf of the New York 22 State Public Service Commission. Judges Tony Belsito 23 and Mike Clarke in our Albany office are responsible 24 for the legal proceedings for these cases. 25 At the conclusion of the legal

The Commission, in making its decision, must consider the utility's proposal and may approve or 4 5 deny the request, or it can modify those requests. The Public Service Commission has seven members: 6 The 7 chairperson, Rory Christian, and six other 8 commissioners, James Alesi, David Valesky, John 9 Maggiore, Uchenna Bright, Denise Sheehan, and Radina Valova. 10 11 Today, we are here to listen to your 12 thoughts on the company's rate filings. Anv statements you make today will become part of the 13 14 case record. We have a court reporter here who will 15 prepare a transcript of the hearing, which will be available to the commissioners for their 16 17 consideration. When completed, the transcript will

18 also be available for review by the public on the19 Department of Public Service website.

Today's hearing is not a question and answer session, but it is to hear comments from you. However, if you do have any questions,

23 representatives of National Grid are here at the 24 front to discuss with you any questions that you have 25 about your rates or your utility service, including

We recognize that there may be differing 2 viewpoints, but this event is being held so that we 3 can hear from everyone and would like to provide comments and -- or make a statement on the record. 4 5 Please do not interrupt the speakers or these 6 proceedings and make sure to silence your cell phones 7 now. 8 With that in mind, we're going to 9 start with our first speaker, Josh Veronica. 10 MR. VERONICA: Good afternoon. My 11 name is Josh Veronica. I serve as director of 12 government affairs at the Buffalo Niagara Partnership, which is our regional chamber of 13 commerce. We represent over 1,000 businesses, 14 15 nonprofits, and higher educational institutions in 16 the region who collectively employ over a quarter 17 million people. 18 In the wake of the 2019 Climate 19 Leadership and Community Protection Act and the 20 ensuing Climate Action Plan, New York State's need 21 for electricity is greater than ever. State plans

call for significant reductions in the use of fossilfuels to power homes, businesses, and vehicles.

The State's plans for decarbonizationwill not be costless. They will require dramatic

09/24/24 - Niagara Mohawk Power Corporation d/b/a National Grid - 24-E-0322, 24-G-0323 1 increase in the amount of electricity available, 2 which in turn requires a significant expansion of electric transmission infrastructure. Under State 3 plans, the way New York will produce electricity is 4 change -- is changing -- is already changing, which 5 6 also necessitates heightened transmission investment. 7 To meet New York's climate goals, 8 population centers will rely on rurally located wind 9 turbines and solar farms to deliver power, requiring construction of many more miles of transmission 10 infrastructure and upgrading existing infrastructure. 11 12 Additionally, more frequent cases of extreme weather require further grid maintenance and resilience 13 upgrades to preserve energy reliability, which is a 14 15 top concern for our membership. 16 All these grid upgrades require 17 substantial investment from utility providers like National Grid. The BNP commends National Grid for 18 19 its efforts to power our region cleanly and to 20 identify needed investments. National Grid is also 21 working to reduce demand for electricity by providing 22 incentives for energy efficiency upgrades for 23 commercial and industrial customers. 24 However, despite these cost-saving 25 efforts, major grid investment will still be needed

So absent investment from the public 3 sector, National Grid must recover these costs 4 through their rates. The BNP supports National 5 Grid's efforts to ensure we can reliably power our 6 regional economy into next generation. Thank you. 7 A.L.J. LECAKES: Thank you very much. 8 Our next speaker is John Johnson. 9 MR. JOHNSON: Good afternoon. My name 10 is John Johnson. I'm with New York Bus Sales, the Blue Bird and Micro Bird school bus dealer in New 11 12 York State. In 2023, we constructed a six million, 13 20,000 square foot facility in Batavia, New York. That was intended to support the school bus operators 14 15 in Western New York as they converted their -- their 16 diesel fleets to electric fleets as required by the 17 Climate Leadership Community Protection Act, as well as the fact that -- with the -- Governor Hochul's 18 19 mandate to no longer sell diesel school buses after 2027. 20 21 National Grid assisted in the 22 installation and charging stations and technology as 23 part of their Electric Vehicle Make Ready Program.

Thank you. 3 A.L.J. LECAKES: Thank you very much. Our next speaker is Kurt Korm (sic)? 4 5 MR. KOJM: Kojm. 6 A.L.J. LECAKES: Kojm. Please spell 7 your name when you come up for --8 MR. KOJM: K-O-J-M. 9 A.L.J. LECAKES: -- at the microphone. 10 MR. KOJM: Okay. 11 A.L.J. LECAKES: Thank you so much. 12 MR. KOJM: You got it. It's 13 K-O-J-M --14 A.L.J. LECAKES: Okay. 15 MR. KOJM: -- as in Mary. 16 A.L.J. LECAKES: You may proceed. 17 MR. KOJM: Okay. My name is Kurt 18 Kojm. I'm a volunteer advocate with AARP New York, 19 and I'm a ratepayer in the National Grid service 20 territory. I've been a ratepayer for over 21 forty-three years. Thank you for the opportunity to 22 speak today concerning National Grid's utility rate 23 increase. 24 AARP opposes the National Grid rate 25 increase and urges the PSC to reject this increase.

10 09/24/24 - Niagara Mohawk Power Corporation d/b/a National Grid - 24-E-0322, 24-G-0323 1 National Grid is proposing yet another increase five 2 times greater than inflation for its Upstate New York service territories. The company rate increase 3 requests of \$525 million for electric and 148 million 4 5 for gas delivery services are unacceptable and should 6 be dramatically reduced by the PSC. 7 If approved, the Public Service 8 Commission -- this would result in monthly delivery 9 bill increases on the average residential customer of 10 approximately \$18.92 for electric, and \$18.34 for This is excessive and unacceptable. AARP New 11 gas. 12 York strongly recommends that PSC takes into consideration that many of National Grid customers 13 cannot afford their bills right now. National Grid's 14 bills haven't been affordable for low- and 15 16 moderate-income customers, and this increase will 17 just make it worse. 18 Right now, there's over 236,000 19 households -- that's a lot of people -- 236 20 households -- 236,000 households who are sixty days

or more late on their bill to National Grid. And with 46,351 households receiving a final termination notice in July, which is the lattest -- latest data, according to their website. These improve -- these proposed increases would undoubtedly aid to the

09/24/24 - Niagara Mohawk Power Corporation d/b/a National Grid - 24-E-0322, 24-G-0323 1 financial burden of hundreds of thousands of older 2 New Yorkers living on fixed incomes who are already 3 struggling to pay their monthly utility bills and other daily living expenses. 4 5 AARP believes that certain actions by the Public Service Commission should be taken in this 6 7 rate case. Number one, the customer charges should 8 not be increased. They are already too high. High 9 customer changes make controlling your energy bill more difficult. 10 11 Number two, the return on investment 12 requested is 10.5 percent -- far exceeds what 13 utilities around the country are getting and should 14 be reduced. 15 And number three, specifically 16 requiring the utilities apply and maximize all 17 federal dollars available to alleviate cost to 18 existing ratepayers. 19 To conclude my remarks, according to 20 National Grid in their filings with the PSC, a large 21 portion of their request increase is necessary to 22 prepare the groundwork for transition away from 23 fossil fuels and greater use of electricity. This is 24 consistent with the stated jurisdiction we've seen 25 for many recent utility rate increases, and the

09/24/24 - Niagara Mohawk Power Corporation d/b/a National Grid - 24-E-0322, 24-G-0323 results of these requests in the past few years are large (indiscernible) settlements that include staggering, unaffordable utility rate increases for taxpayers. The negotiated outcome of these cases are not working for ratepayers, and the State approach has to change.

7 While this is an issue that's beyond 8 the rate case exclusively, it's certainly a driver in 9 this case as New York moves towards a clean energy 10 future. It is imperative that we stop rubberstamping the placement of enormous costs of New York's 11 12 transition into a clean energy future upon the backs 13 of utility rate taxpayer -- ratepayers, and develop a 14 more equitable strategy -- strategy to pay for its 15 transition.

16 So AARP New York believes that the 17 governor, the Public Service Commission, and the 18 legislature should work together more than ever to 19 make sure energy costs become affordable for all New 20 Yorkers. Thank you.

A.L.J. LECAKES: Thank you very much.
Our next speaker is Thomas Miller.
MR. MILLER: Hello. Good afternoon.
I'm Thomas Miller, director of products and programs
at Good Carbon Co. Good Carbon Co. is a local,

We're focused on the conversion of old, inefficient buildings to very efficient net zero 3 carbon properties. We start with a reduction-first 4 approach that involves air sealing, dense insulation, 5 6 high-performance windows, roofing, et cetera. We 7 then replace the existing gas system with electrified 8 geothermal heat pumps and electric appliances. We 9 also put L-2 EV chargers in every parking spot 10 possible in addition. We also integrate onsite, offsite solar, battery storage control systems, and 11 12 more to provide production and smart management. The result is a 70 percent energy 13

reduction for getting building and ten metric tons of carbon offset per unit, which creates truly sustainable living for our community. Currently, we have 1,000 dwelling units, either retrofitted or in process, another 2,500 over the next twenty-four months, and we plan to scale with 5,000 units in three years and 10,000 within seven years.

21 Our goal is to beat these productions 22 and electrify as many properties as possible, while 23 utilizing the capacity, and transfer the existing 24 wire set on the street and offer a (indiscernible) 25 approach to decarbonization of the community and

09/24/24 - Niagara Mohawk Power Corporation d/b/a National Grid - 24-E-0322, 24-G-0323 economy. As a result, we are heavy, heavy utilizers among the different programs National Grid has to offer.

First, EV Make Ready. The -- the Make 4 5 Ready team has been a pleasure to work with. They have been extremely flexible in our development 6 7 constraints and have been flexible in the program 8 implementation, while staying within the constraints 9 of the regulations and have been a big part of our 10 growth and success as a development company. The team support with our partnership with the NY Green 11 12 Bank and other key partners in financial support has been pivotal to our impact. 13

14 Currently, we have over 400 EV ports 15 in -- in process over ten projects, one of those 16 being one of the largest EV fields in the state at 17 over 100 chargers. We will do over 1,000 more 18 chargers in the next twelve to twenty-four months 19 just with our current pipeline alone.

20 Next is New York Clean Heat. The New 21 York Clean Heat Program is a key incentive that 22 allows us to electrify the old buildings. The 23 problem -- the program has been durable and 24 consistent. We hope to see it continue to be a 25 complementary source of needed capital to different,

The 3 program managers have been good to work with and -and are development friendly. The group has been 4 open to working with us on different sticking points 5 6 and have navigated the program well to help support 7 our different needs. 8 Currently, that's around almost over 9 500 heat pumps, both geo, ground-sourced heat pumps 10 and also air-sourced heat pumps installed to follow our previously mentioned unit conversion projects. 11 12 Next is the grid services and energy transition solutions. This is also known as the 13 Battery to Grid Program as well. This is a new 14 15 program within National Grid that we are exploring --16 a pilot program and partnership and is our most 17 recent endeavor. We have found the National Grid team to be receptive and creative when it comes to 18 19 working with the new battery and grid 20 interoperability services. 21 We're looking to -- looking forward to 22 working with the team to bring new energy products to 23 affordable multifamily space. This partnership help

25 navigate current and future constraints with ease.

grows -- group -- both group -- helps both groups

Lastly, I just want to mention all the 4 5 service, customer connections, engineering and design 6 teams as well. As mentioned, through the -- the 7 breadth of our work, we -- we interact with these 8 teams daily at all levels of our organization. These 9 teams are critical to ensuring the -- the project 10 success and alignment through every step of the way. We find them to be responsive and available to meet 11 12 onsite with our design engineering electro teams just to ensure an optimal design. Well, the job owners 13 ensure sure strong communication across both groups 14 with municipalities -- and with municipalities so the 15 16 expectations and timings are clear. Their support is 17 the foundation for our project's success.

18 Overall, we have and will continue to 19 be a strong consumer and partner with these programs. 20 The ability to keep them fully resourced is critical 21 to our ability to execute and take on new projects. 22 This allows us to provide truly sustainable living at an affordable rate in -- in this local market. 23 We 24 look forward to the opportunity to improve these 25 programs and their outputs while being a leading

Next we have Thomas Allen Kucharski. 3 MR. KUCHARSKI: Good afternoon. 4 Μv 5 name is Tom Kucharski, and I am president and CEO of Invest Buffalo Niagara. We represent the eight 6 7 counties of Western New York and are the region's 8 nonprofit, privately-funded economic development organization focused on job creation by attracting 9 10 new employers to the Buffalo Niagara region. Our organization works closely with 11 12 National Grid to help attract new investment to Western New York. In today's economic development 13 environment, the availability of electric capacity to 14 15 serve projects with ever increasing electric demands 16 is becoming critical to landing new future capital 17 investment. Having significant available electrical 18 capacity on both the transmission and distribution 19 systems gives Western New York an opportunity to 20 capture expansions of existing companies and new 21 companies looking to locate in our region. This is 22 especially critical as our region fields onshoring 23 and high-tech manufacturing interests in the nano and 24 semiconductor space given our federal designation as 25 a regional tech hub.

National Grid's programs also 9 help provide direct financial assistance to prospects 10 looking to locate in our region. Their grants make projects more economically feasible and assist with 11 12 electrical infrastructure and brownfield cleanup 13 costs. 14 Invest -- Invest Buffalo Niagara 15 supports the continuation of National Grid's current 16 economic development programs under this proposed 17 rate filing. Thank you. 18 A.L.J. LECAKES: Thank you. 19 Next, I have Bruce Boissonnault. 20 MR. BOISSONNAULT: Thank you very 21 much. By the way, thank you both for doing this. 22 It's a thankless job, and I -- and I know that. And 23 I also know without my glasses, this won't work. 24 I just want to reiterate what Kurt 25 said and then add a -- add a point. Customer charges

The return on investment of 10.5 percent 3 is -- is above the curve. On that point, AARP is certainly able to provide some 6 7 background if -- if that is helpful, and some detail. The only other thing I wanted to say 8 9 is these are regulated monopolies. And they're regulated for a reason, because human nature leads us 10 to unintended consequences. And so I really urge you 11 12 to -- to regulate, to not rubberstamp this. This is 13 a big increase. That's it. 14 A.L.J. LECAKES: Thank you. 15 A.L.J. KERSEY: Thank you. 16 A.L.J. LECAKES: Next, I have Dominic 17 Costanzo. 18 MR. COSTANZO: Good afternoon. My 19 name is Dominic Costanzo, vice president of portfolio 20 at 43North. We're an accelerator program that 21 invests \$5 million annually to attract and retain 22 high-growth companies here in Buffalo, New York. Our 23 mission is simple: to support the highest potential 24 companies early in their journey, so that subsequent 25 job growth happens locally and positively impacts the

In a few weeks, we'll actually be 2 3 holding our 10th annual finals event, where sixteen companies will make their pitch to secure funding 4 5 from our organization in one of five slots in our 6 yearlong program. Over the past ten years, we've 7 invested in sixty-nine companies. We've collectively 8 raised near -- nearly \$1 billion in funding and have created over 2,000 jobs globally, and over 1,000 here 9 locally in Buffalo, New York. 10 11 We prioritize diversity in our 12 selection process and take pride in the fact that 49 13 percent of our founders are from underrepresented groups, 26 percent of which are female led. National 14 15 Grid has been a partner with 43North since our first 16 year in 2014, and has been a key supporter in every 17 year since, with their investment helping us carry 18 out our mission of growing the region's economy in Western New York. 19 20 National Grid's economic development 21 programs have helped us recruit new, innovative 22 businesses to Buffalo and assisted in the development 23 of an entrepreneurial and innovation ecosystem in 24 Upstate New York, stimulating and supporting

25 high-growth businesses in the National Grid service

We're a private, nonprofit venture development 6 7 organization that supports high-growth potential 8 startups through both pro bono mentorship and access to the most active seed fund in New York State. 9 10 So our core mission is to identify, support, and actually fund companies that can have a 11 12 high impact in terms of both job and wealth creation in our community. We are also catalyzing what will 13 be a sustainable entrepreneurial culture for Upstate 14 15 New York, and we do this through regional 16 collaboration ecosystem partners. That overarching 17 gall -- goal again is job and wealth creation. 18 So since our inception in 2012, we've 19 actually served, pro bono, over 1,700 companies, 20 which have gone on to raise nearly \$1.5 billion and 21 generate more than \$265 million in annual revenues, 22 while supporting nearly 5,300 jobs in our region. We 23 mentor over 350 startup businesses each year with our 24 free coaching services and the financing programs. 25 So starting with that pro bono

National Grid - 24-E-0322, 24-G-0323 mentorship, we do that through dozens of entrepreneurs and residents that bring the kind of expertise that will keep those businesses here and prevent good ideas from dying on the vine. Plus, we actually provide more intensive support services for our underrepresented founders through a program called Founders Go Big.

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In addition, we have an emerging clean 8 9 tech opportunity incubator that serves clean energy 10 and climate tech companies. And in fact, due to our status and stature and leadership in this space, we 11 12 actually are on the governance committee for the new federally designated battery storage engine and tech 13 hub that has certainly been in the press and built up 14 15 over the past several months here in Upstate New 16 York.

17 We've been really fortunate that 18 National Grid has stepped up and supported Launch NY 19 for several years. The grants through, specifically, 20 their National Grid CleanTech Incubation Program, 21 have helped us not only establish, but also expand our support services in order to grow the economy in 22 23 our region. This, very specifically, is creating an 24 entrepreneurial ecosystem that is sustainable, and 25 it's one that will really impact the National Grid

Plus, we're engaging the entire community in this initiative with 10 over 50 percent of our portfolio led by 11 12 underrepresented founders, and over 70 percent of those companies being located in low-income census 13 tracts or neighborhoods. 14 15 National Grid's role absolutely is 16 crucial in continuing to fuel an inclusive innovation 17 permanent economy in our region. Thank you. 18 A.L.J. LECAKES: Thank you very much. 19 Our next speaker is Laurie Wheelock. 20 MS. WHEELOCK: Good evening. Thank 21 you, Administrative Law Judges Kersey and Lecakes for 22 being here tonight. My name is Laurie Wheelock, and 23 I am the executive director and counsel of the Public 24 Utility Law Project. We go by PULP for short. 25 Our organization is a party in the

But I would say with all the rate case 3 work we do, with all the policy cases we do, our direct services is where we make the most impact in 4 5 New York State. And we work with low-income customers every single day. They call us. 6 We 7 provide no-cost assistance. We take a look at their 8 bills. We help explain what's going on with their 9 We direct them to financial assistance usage. 10 programs, including the Energy Affordability Program and HEAP, which opens November 1st. And we try to 11 12 help set them up so they can afford what's coming 13 next.

14 Every single day, my team works with 15 National Grid's consumer advocates, and we've had 16 some very hard cases. How do I afford my rent? What 17 am I going to do when my loved one passes away? Even 18 active domestic violence situations, and we've had 19 amazing results. We've been able to help set people 20 up and get them ready for the winter. But this rate 21 case? It's not personal; it's business. And PULP is 22 very concerned about the affordability considerations 23 and thinks that the State needs to take a very 24 serious look and dive deep into what's going on with 25 every regulated utility when they come forward for a

09/24/24 - Niagara Mohawk Power Corporation d/b/a National Grid - 24-E-0322, 24-G-0323 1 rate increase. 2 So National Grid is asking for 3 approximately \$19 more a month on the electric side, and we are very concerned that their customers can't 4 5 afford that. According to their own collections activity reports, which AARP cited earlier, not only 6 7 were there 228,000 customers behind on their bills by 8 sixty days or more in August, but over 10,000 9 accounts were terminated for nonpayment during that 10 same time. PULP has been going to each of the 11 12 in-person public statement hearings and providing poverty data so that each region has that in the 13 record, and for Buffalo, the numbers are really 14 staggering. In 2021, 56 percent of Buffalo's total 15 16 households were living in poverty or at the ALICE 17 threshold, which is the assist -- asset limited, income constrained, employed household level. In 18 19 2022, children in Buffalo -- there were 39.8 percent 20 of them that were living in poverty. Buffalo's deep 21 poverty rate is the second highest in the state at

20.7 percent, which is a comparison to similar largecities throughout New York State.

24 Everyday ratepayers are always
25 struggling, and we honestly know it's not just

And so we need to dig deep. We need to think creatively. And so PULP 4 5 will be doing that in the rate case. We'll be looking at the level of arrears in comparison to the 6 7 rate of terminations. We'll be seeing how many 8 HEFPA-compliant deferred payment agreements are being 9 offered and what the enrollment into the EAP program 10 is looking. 11 We'll also be seeing how many accounts 12 are being coded for elderly, blind, and disabled, and looking into protective procedures there as well. 13 14 Anything we can do to enhance and make sure that 15 those consumer protections are strong and being utilized. 16 17 But back to creativity. We have to 18 roll up our sleeves and we have to have serious 19 conversations about rate reform, fixed charges, how 20 the ROE is set, and also whether or not the companies 21 are applying for federal funds and if successful, 22 using those to properly offset the cost to 23 ratepayers, because ratepayers can't share the burden

alone.

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National Grid customers are being

PULP looks 3 forward to being a party in the rate case. We look forward to working with the company and the 4 5 Department, and we're ready to work hard. Thank you. 6 A.L.J. KERSEY: Thank you. 7 A.L.J. LECAKES: Thank you very much. 8 Our next speaker is Benjamin Rand. 9 MR. RAND: Good afternoon, Judges. 10 I'm here to speak in support of National Thank you. Grid and in particular the Manufacturing Productivity 11 12 Program that they offer under their economic development side. Again, my name is Ben Rand. 13 I'm the president of Insyte Consulting. We're a private 14 15 nonprofit. We help small manufacturers become more 16 competitive and profitable, maximizing their 17 employment and their economic impact in our region. 18 We're the designated -- we're designated by Empire 19 State as the Western New York Manufacturing Extension 20 Partnership Center, which is part of U.S. Department 21 of Commerce's Manufacturing Extension Partnership 22 Program.

23 We also partner with National Grid and 24 administer their Manufacturing Productivity Program 25 grants. These are for manufacturing customers in

Our team of engineers work with 2 those manufacturers to make their companies more 3 efficient, helping them improve their processes, reduce their costs, reduce waste, increase sales, 4 5 develop new products, and in general make our 6 manufacturing sector more competitive. Many of those 7 projects would not be possible without the assistance 8 that the Manufacturing Productivity Program provides 9 to those manufacturers.

10 The goal is to grow our critical local manufacturing base, which is good for both local and 11 12 the state economy. By providing funding to enable these program improvement opportunities, National 13 Grid's Manufacturing Productivity Program has had a 14 15 tremendous positive impact on manufacturers in 16 Western New York and, by extension, on our regional 17 I'm not aware of any other private or economv. utility-based program anywhere else in the country 18 19 that's delivered such impressive results.

The U.S. Department of Commerce, as part of the MEP program, surveys all of our clients and has done so for twenty years using independent third-party surveying companies. Based on these independent surveys, Western New York manufacturers funded by National Grid's MPP Program grants have

Based on over 3.9 4 5 million cumulative MPP grant value, this program returns over \$500 for every \$1 invested by National 6 7 Grid, which is a tremendous ROI. From a jobs perspective, the program has spent less than \$540 for 8 9 every job saved or created under this program. I'll 10 also submit the specific impact results in areas like new sales, cost savings, et cetera. 11 12 As these figures clearly show, National Grid's MPP Grant Program provides an immense 13 return on investment for manufacturers and for our 14 15 community as a whole. Insyte Consulting commends 16 National Grid for recognizing the importance of their 17 manufacturing clients to the local and state economy 18 and supports the continuation of this program as an 19 offering through the company's economic development 20 program. Thank you very much. 21 A.L.J. KERSEY: Thank you for your 22 comment. 23 A.L.J. LECAKES: Thank you. 24 Our next speaker is Brent Rollins. 25 MR. ROLLINS: Oh, that's me. I didn't

LECAKES: Thank you very much. 4 MR. ROLLINS: All right now. 5 A.L.J. LECAKES: All right. Our next 6 speaker is Yolanda Wyatt. 7 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Okay? That's 8 better. 9 A.L.J. LECAKES: Go ahead. 10 MS. WYATT: Hello. My name is Yolanda Wyatt. I'm a long-time resident of Buffalo, New 11 12 York. Go Bills. I am a ratepayer here in the Upstate New York area where National Grid intends to 13 14 enforce this outrageous increase. I'm a citizen here. I'm a ratepayer, as I said, and I'm disabled. 15 I worked at Buffalo General for 16 17 twenty-eight years so I do know the importance of 18 having electricity. I've been on my own since I was 19 seventeen. I've been paying whenever I get billed. 20 Lately it's been kind of hard. This rate increase 21 will make it worse. 22 I am a volunteer of the AARP group, 23 and I strongly recommend that the PSC take into 24 consideration that people like myself, disabled, 25 elderly, on a fixed income -- we will encounter

National Grid 2 sales have not been affordable for me, a low-income citizen, and I have friends who are -- have a 3 moderate income, working, making almost 100,000 a 4 5 year and still cannot make ends meet in today's economy. And this will be a hardship on them as 6 7 well. 8 Any increase will -- will be a 9 hardship for so many households here in our area. 10 Customers should not have to endure this struggle. So I ask you to please not approve this. Thank you 11 12 for your time. Have a blessed day. 13 A.L.J. KERSEY: Thank you. 14 A.L.J. LECAKES: Thank you very much. 15 Our next speaker is Latrice Gray, I 16 believe. Anyone? It looks like L-A-T-R-I-C-E. 17 Our next speaker will be -- I think 18 it's Theresa Williams (ph.). 19 MS. WILLIAMS: Good afternoon. How 20 are you? 21 A.L.J. KERSEY: Hi. 22 A.L.J. LECAKES: Hi. Do you need help 23 with that? 24 A.L.J. KERSEY: You can pull that down 25 right there.

Just 4 pull it down. 5 MS. WILLIAMS: Just pull it down? 6 A.L.J. KERSEY: That's 7 (indiscernible). 8 MS. WILLIAMS: Okay. All right. 9 I'll -- do you mind? Thank you. 10 Good afternoon. My name is Ms. Theresa Williams, and I am a long-time resident of 11 12 Buffalo, New York. But I'm also a resident -- or was a former resident of Pine Bluff, Arkansas. I'm not 13 here to challenge the logistics of National Grid. 14 I'm asking you to do that. I'm asking you to look at 15 16 their financial rubberstamping of increase. 17 I used to work for Arkansas Power and 18 Light as a journeyman electrician, which is now 19 Entergy Incorporated. Recently, I came across a case 20 involving National Grid Entity Services Incorporated, 21 my company in Arkansas, and Enron. And I've done a lot of homework and a lot of due diligence and a lot 22 23 of footwork. And I found a case involving National Grid and a \$6 million award that they were trying to 24 25 get from my company, Entergy Incorporated, and Enron.

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The judge denied that. But this was in Onondaga
County, which is not Erie County, but is going back
towards Syracuse.

The problem that I'm having here is 4 5 that I would like to know -- I'm not going to talk to 6 you about the electrical part, the grid, or anything 7 of that nature, or what I used to do, okay? I'm 8 having a problem with the finances, the 9 rubberstamping. How did they eliminate a \$6 million loss on a long-term debt on their balance sheet? 10 We're talking about people losing their services or 11 12 not having services. How are they writing this off? Who is their auditors? 13

14 I would like to write a letter, and 15 I've already started it -- started last night -- to 16 the secretary -- not to overlook the two of you, but 17 we have got to get to the bottom of a problem. Thev 18 just tore down the Huntley plant. Are we going to 19 pay for demolition on that? They had to tear that 20 down because they couldn't -- how do you say -- do 21 infrastructure improvements. They couldn't put 22 scrubbers inside the precipitator.

How do I know that? Because the Sierra Club in Arkansas shut down the plant that I used to work at, that I couldn't even breathe in.

And at \$18 increase, let's get real. 3 Please. It's not -- how do you say -- creative 4 5 financing. It's called American greed, what NY did. 6 I wanted to go on record, not to put you all on the 7 hot seat, but to look at their financial 8 rubberstamping of writing things off on their balance 9 sheet. Whether it's long term -- how are you writing 10 it off, as an asset? Are you writing this off as deadbeats? 11 My name is Theresa Williams. I live 12 13 in Buffalo, New York, and I used to work for Arkansas Power and Light, which I now get my pension from --14 15 Entergy Incorporated. And I want to say thank you. 16 A.L.J. KERSEY: Thank you. 17 A.L.J. LECAKES: Thank you very much. 18 Our next speaker is Stephen Tucker. 19 MR. TUCKER: Good afternoon. My name 20 is Stephen Tucker, and I'm the president and CEO of 21 Northland Workforce Training Center in the east side 22 of Buffalo. 23 As New York State's signature 24 workforce initiative, Northland Workforce Training 25 Center is an industry-driven public/private

09/24/24 - Niagara Mohawk Power Corporation d/b/a National Grid - 24-E-0322, 24-G-0323 1 partnership between employers, educational 2 institutions, community and faith-based 3 organizations, and state and local government, focused on closing the skills gap of the local labor 4 pool and creating economic (indiscernible) training, 5 co-ops, internships and apprenticeships, and 6 7 permanent employment for West New Yorkers seeking 8 careers in advanced manufacturing and clean energy. National Grid has been a stark 9 10 supporter of Northland Workforce Training Center from day one. They have utilized their economic 11 12 development programs, community giving, and their foundation to support the rehabilitation of our 13 building, to support literacy training, help purchase 14 15 a van so we can transport students to and from 16 school, and recently provided funding to support 17 upgrades in our electric lab. They brought their 18 Grid for Good Program to Northland and engaged our 19 students on careers in advanced manufacturing and 20 clean energy. They also have hired several of our 21 students for permanent employment opportunities, as 22 well as provided several students with summer 23 internship opportunities.

24 Their support has helped us advance 25 our mission of providing a growing pool of skilled

Thank you. 5 A.L.J. KERSEY: Thank you. 6 A.L.J. LECAKES: Thank you very much. 7 Our next speaker is Reverend Majadi Baruti, I believe is how it's pronounced. 8 9 DR. BARUTI: (Indiscernible). Hey 10 Hi. How you guys been? Welcome back to there. 11 Buffalo. 12 A.L.J. LECAKES: Thank you. DR. BARUTT: Unfortunate 13 circumstances, but welcome back nevertheless. I'm 14 Reverend Dr. Majadi Baruti. I'm the climate justice 15 16 organizer at the mighty PUSH Buffalo. And we are 17 currently dealing with now two great hikes, one from National Fuel Gas and now from National Grid. 18 19 Not only am I a climate justice 20 organizer, I live inside of the City of Buffalo. 21 It's a beautiful space, beautiful people. And I am 22 considered to be middle class, which is nebulous as 23 hell. It is useless to say that because it still 24 feels like I'm in poverty based on the bills that I 25 have to pay. This National Fuel Gas rate hike is

We already deal 3 with the City, whose populace is in poverty, whose 4 5 populace has been redlined and racialized, or what we 6 refer to as racial capitalism -- victims of racial 7 capitalism.

8 We live in an antiquated, old, 9 raggedy, beautifully designed, at the time it was 10 designed, housing. But I asked my fiancé, who is a woman who is living with a disability, to go through 11 12 the house and look at the spaces in which air would 13 be leaking, and there were numerous ones, and our landlord is not going to get them fixed because, you 14 15 know, why would you have to, right? We're just a bunch of African Americans. 16

17 So with her disabilities, with the 18 already high rent, along with a rate hike from two 19 energy companies that we actually have to have 20 because we have medicines that we need to keep 21 refrigerated, this type of thing, we're dealing with a lot. And I'm middle class -- again, a useless 22 23 What about my beloveds in the east side and term. 24 the west side -- lower west side of the city, who are 25 living in abject poverty?

They were homeless because of the gas 7 bill, because of the energy bill. So what we're 8 looking at is the possibility of more people becoming 9 homeless, of more people having not only this 10 high-ass energy burden, but being on the streets just out -- you can just walk right out here. You will 11 12 see them. They are my neighbors. They are my beloved. As a man of the cloth, as a man who is 13 14 clergy, these are the folks that I give service to. 15 And at the same time, National Grid 16 now wants to file this request with our energy 17 regulators to raise the rates some \$19. And it seems 18 minuscule to some people, but it is not. It is not. 19 These increases are not sustainable. The housing 20 that we currently live in is not sustainable. 16 21 percent of National Grid customers are facing energy 22 debt burdens at an average of \$1,362. Many of us don't have the \$62 in our bank accounts. 23 24 11,714 people -- I hate statistics.

25 11,714 people have had their services terminated in

So I guess, the idea 3 is -- by these companies, both National Fuel and National Grid, to hell with Mama Ella, so long as 4 5 their pockets are lined. 6 Speaking of the lining of pockets --7 and I'm going to try to close it out here -- I am a 8 priest, and, you know, we have a tendency to go on 9 and on. National Grid CEO -- I got to find this 10 person's name -- National Grid CEO is being paid over \$8 million a year. I can't even imagine \$8 million a 11 12 year in salary and bonuses. The shareholders are 13 using customers as a piggy bank. 14 The company has filed a request for 15 this 10 percent rate of return on their investments, 16 and these increases will be used to pay for what is 17 more than \$1.9 billion in upgrade to a gas system that, as a climate justice organizer, I understand 18 19 clearly how natural gas is foolishness. It is death. 20 We are literally sitting in Western New York on a 21 I am not exaggerating. We are sitting under bomb. 22 metal tubes that have gas running through them. 23 Several places in this country -- or what my fiance 24 refers to as Total Island -- have exploded. 25 Last year -- or earlier this year,

You know what he 3 was doing when he died in this gas explosion? He was 4 going to the bank. The bank exploded. He died and 5 several people were injured. This gas structure, 6 this current energy system, is inefficient and it is 7 quite literally deadly. To pay for it is -- it's 8 like me paying someone to beat me to death, like we 9 do with the police. 10 We need to reject this rate hike, and we need to do so with great and dire urgency. People 11 12 will become more homeless -- more people will become 13 homeless, and more people will perish. 14 A.L.J. KERSEY: Thank you. 15 A.L.J. LECAKES: Thank you very much. 16 Our next speaker is Clarke Gocker. 17 MR. GOCKER: Good afternoon. Mv name 18 is Clarke Gocker. I'm the senior director of 19 movement building with People United for Sustainable 20 Housing, or PUSH Buffalo. We are not parties to this 21 case yet, although we may become a party. We've been 22 a party in the past. 23 And yeah, I'm really just here to --24 to speak on behalf of -- of our members. I'll, you 25 know, echo a lot of the sentiments of -- of Reverend

And I think we need to consider that as a 3 kind of compounding factor. We need to look across 4 5 the full range of expenses that too many of our 6 low- and moderate-income households are confronted 7 with on a monthly basis.

8 Here in Buffalo, the community that we call home on the west side of the city has seen some 9 10 of the largest real estate appreciation rates in Western New York in the last five years. That's led 11 12 to pretty hefty tax reassessments that have really hit people hard, 400 percent increases in property 13 tax bills on the -- in the last reassessment period. 14 15 A new reassessment process has opened in Buffalo, and 16 we're fearful that, again, a lot of those same 17 residents will be hit with increase to taxes, and if they're renters, that, you know, landlords will pass 18 19 those costs on to renters.

20 Really, since COVID, Buffalo has had 21 one of the highest eviction rates in the state, I 22 think second only to the Bronx. And that persists. 23 And as the good reverend said, you know, any increase 24 in any bill can lead to eviction and homelessness.

25

And then National Fuel. You know,

So you 3 know, together, we think, you know, with the -- the \$19 a month increase for the average customer that 4 5 National Grid's proposing that we'll further 6 sacrifice too many vulnerable residents in our 7 communities.

8 In 2019, we celebrated as a community. 9 We fought hard as an organization to win the Climate 10 Leadership and Community Protection Act and, in fact, our communities were some of the architects of that 11 12 legislation. And when that legislation was imagined and dreamt up, you know, in -- in meetings over, you 13 know, pizza and coffee on the west side of Buffalo 14 15 and across disadvantaged communities in the state, it wasn't imagined that the transition would come on the 16 17 backs of our communities.

You know, we thought that we would be leading that transition, and the transition would be just and affordable for everyone. We don't think that the transition should serve as an excuse for the shareholders of companies like National Grid and National Fuel to, you know, further profit off of the climate crisis.

25

And I've heard a lot of gratitude

We've never participated -- it -- in fact, I don't think we've 4 ever been invited to apply for, you know, any 5 6 economic development assistance from National Grid. 7 But I find it kind of perverse as public policy that 8 we would underwrite economic development policy by 9 handing out a -- a 10-percent rate of return -- or 10 return on equity to investors, you know, for that economic development assistance, when we could be 11 12 making those, you know, direct payments from the State budget and kind of circumventing, you know, any 13 kind of payment to a for-profit entity or their 14 15 shareholders.

16 So if folks in the room are, you know, 17 excited about economic development, there's better, like, policy alternatives than, you know, paying 18 19 private investors a premium to deliver those economic 20 development benefits to -- to our neighborhoods. So 21 I hope the commission takes that under consideration. 22 And lastly, I just, you know, would --23 would echo PULP in, you know, calling on the Commission to -- to, you know, be open-minded and 24

25 creative and thinking about, you know, new rate

We know that the upfront costs are -- are -- remain steep for -- for heat pump technology. But the operating costs, you know, are also steep.

And there's, you know, emerging data 7 8 from NYSERDA and other entities that is beginning 9 to -- to demonstrate that, which is good. But I 10 think what that's pointing to now are solutions that are needed from this body to consider, you know, 11 12 new -- new rate structures that would allow low- and moderate-income households to be some of the first to 13 experience the -- the benefits of -- of renewable 14 15 heating and cooling technologies.

16 You know, as -- you know, with the 17 climate crisis, extreme weather is upon us. We know that, you know, in relation to -- to winter weather 18 19 and the blizzard that -- that, you know, killed many 20 of our residents here in Buffalo in 2022. But we 21 also know that extreme weather in Buffalo means 22 extreme heat. I think it's projected in the next 23 several decades Buffalo will experience its first 100-degree day. We'll begin to see, you know, 24 25 patterns of ninety-degree days, you know, pretty

So yeah, I look forward to, you know, 7 remaining involved and engaged in this proceeding. 8 And just thank -- thank you for the opportunity. 9 A.L.J. LECAKES: Thank you very much. 10 Our next speaker is Richard Dread. MR. DREAD: Yeah. Good evening. My 11 12 name is Richard Dread. I'm a resident of the east side of Buffalo. And I come before you to share with 13 you a concern that I have. I'm concerned not only 14 15 about myself, but other people on the east side, 16 especially minorities who are adversely affected by 17 the rates -- the proposed raise in the cost of keeping electricity in our homes. I'm a senior 18 19 person -- I'm 75 years of age. I'm now troubled with 20 arthritis and me risking getting my electric turned 21 off affects me as far as not being able to keep heat 22 in my house. 23 And being disabled to an extent -- I'm 24 also crippled with the -- the need for a CPAP

25 breathing machine because I have sleep apnea. And

And it's a scary thing to live that kind of 6 7 life. 8 I just want to share that with you. 9 Because it forces us people who live under those 10 kinds of constraints to find other ways to survive, you know, and if -- we -- there are not too many 11 12 other ways you can do it. We -- we need the electic -- the National Grid. We need National Fuel. 13 14 So I just want to let you know how 15 adversely affected not only the minorities, but 16 people in general -- when you raise your hike, we 17 can't pay it. I live on income that is, you know, retirement. I just don't have the money. So please 18 19 don't let me suffer in pain. Thank you. 20 A.L.J. LECAKES: Thank you. 21 Our next speaker is Sam Iraci? Iraki 22 (ph.)? 23 MR. IRACI: Not many people pronounce 24 it correctly as you did. Thank you for the 25 opportunity. My name is Sam Iraci. I'm the

BCAR is a 501(c)(4) not-for-profit corporation 3 that serves as managing agent on behalf of the City 4 5 of Buffalo for all city-owned parking facilities. We 6 manage 1.8 million square feet of parking, containing 7 5,800 square -- of parking spaces serving downtown 8 residents, employees, visitors, and downtown 9 businesses. BCAR uses approximately 1.8 million 10 kilowatt hours of energy a year. 11 BCAR continues to enjoy an excellent 12 working relationship with National Grid. That partnership has helped provide affordable, safe, 13 conveniently located downtown parking in public 14 15 space. Every National Grid manager that I personally 16 work with has been helpful, professional, and 17 effective in helping us achieve our goals. 18 For example, several years ago, 19 National Grid provided two thirds of the funding to 20 convert 8,200 fluorescent lighting fixtures to LED 21 lighting. That initiative helped BCAR reduce its 22 annual utility expense from \$387,688 in Fiscal Year 23 2014 to \$250,902 in Fiscal 2017, a 35 percent 24 reduction that helped BCAR and the City continue to 25 provide affordable parking rates.

Thanks for the opportunity to speak here today. 11 12 A.L.J. KERSEY: Thank you. 13 A.L.J. LECAKES: Thank you very much. 14 I'm going to go back to the one 15 speaker that did not come forward. I believe the 16 name is Latrice. Latrice Grav? 17 That's all the speakers I have Okav. 18 that have signed up cards.
