On Mother's Day morning, Arlene Hanley received an expected but pleasant surprise: a single red rose from three uniformed Boy Scouts — presented to her for the 55th year in a row.

"I'm thrilled to get the roses," Hanley said. "The Tay House sort of adopted me when (my son) Tom started scouting.'

As a tradition every year, the Tay House Troop 19 Eagle Scouts deliver a rose and card to each mother of current and past Tay members.

All of Hanley's children — two sons and a daughter -were scouts

growing up, two of whom became scout leaders and are still active at their respective lodges. Hanley was a den mother for the Cub Scouts for years. even earning the Silver Fawn Award in 1974.

The Tay House in Rochester was founded in 1919, as a part of the Boy Scouts of America organization. The Mother's Day rose tradition started in 1932.

"If (the other mothers) feel like me, they're iust completely elated," Hanley said. "They're just beaming from ear to ear when those boys come to their door with roses on Mother's Day.'

An online fundraiser has begun for a 6-yearold Rochester girl who lost her mother in a deadly crash on the Thruway in Farmington.

Jim and Sue Delmege have started the fundraiser to help pay for the education of Alissa Joy McDonald. Her mother, Deborah McDonald, 31, died after her vehicle crossed the median Friday and was struck by a tractor trailer.

"Deborah was a devoted mother, and would do anything for her daughter," according to a message on the website for the fundraiser. "With her gone from this earth, we want to help her fulfill the hopes and dreams she had for her daughter."

NOTICE OF FILING OF APPLICATION FOR AMENDMENT OF CERTIFICATE OF ENVIRONMENTAL **COMPATIBILITY AND PUBLIC NEED - NYPSC CASE 11-T-0534**

In April 2013 the New York State Public Service Commission (Commission) granted the application of Rochester Gas and Electric Corporation (RG&E) for a Certificate of Environmental Compatibility and Public Need (Certificate) for the construction of the "Rochester Area Reliability Project," approximately 23.6 miles of 115 kiloVolt (kV) line in the City of Rochester and the Towns of Chili, Gates and Henrietta, 1.9 miles of new 345 kV transmission line, a new 345 kV/115kV substation, and equipment upgrades of several existing substations in Monroe County, and equipment upgrades at two substations in Niagara County. The proposed routes for the circuits are primarily within and along existing transmission and railroad corridors. The construction of the Rochester Area Reliability Project is intended to provide for new sources of electric generation for the RG&E system to allow for the loss of other sources. It will also help relieve loading on existing 115kV lines.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO CERTIFICATE

RG&E's application for amendment of its Certificate will request that the Commission approve a change from overhead construction to underground construction for a distance of about 2000 feet from the point where Circuit 941 crosses one RG&E and two National Grid transmission lines near RG&E's Station 67 in the Town of Gates to north of Beahan Road. This change is being proposed to resolve reliability concerns associated with an overhead crossing of the three other transmission lines.

RG&E's application for amendment of its certificate will also request that the Commission approve a change from underground construction to overhead construction where Circuit 940 crosses route I-490, Route 204, and the CSX Railroad in the Town of Gates. This change is being proposed to avoid the potential hazards and cost of approximately 2000 feet of horizontal directional drilling through rock, part of which would be in proximity to highway overpass structures.

FILING AND SERVICE OF APPLICATION

RG&E's application for amendment of its certificate was filed with the Commission on May 7, 2014, and served upon all persons on the Commission's Party List for the proceeding. The application for amendment also will be served upon all persons required to be served with an original application for a certificate under Section 122(2) of the Public Service Law.

Public Service Law § 123(2) requires that a hearing on an application for amendment of a certificate be held only if the change in the facility to be authorized would result in any material increase in any environmental impact of the facility or a substantial change in the location of all or a portion of such facility. RG&E believes that the requested changes, if approved, would not result in any material increase in any environmental impact of the Project or a substantial change in the location of all or a portion of the Project, and that accordingly, a hearing concerning the proposed amendments is not required.
