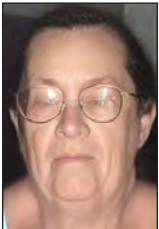

On June 30, 2025, New York State Electric & Gas Corporation (NYSEG) filed with the New York State Public Service Commission (PSC) an Investment Plan for Powering NY, which includes testimony, exhibits, and proposed delivery rate changes to the above-referenced tariff schedules for service.

The changes contained in that filing would increase revenues by approximately \$457.4 million from NYSEG's electric operations and by approximately \$90.8 million from the company's natural gas operations, to become effective in the spring of 2026.

The PSC may approve, modify or reject any or all of the proposed tariff changes. Among other things, the PSC's determination may require revisions of the proposed amount of the increases applicable to particular classifications of service or changes in rates applicable to those classifications for which no increase is proposed by the companies.

The complete NYSEG filing may be examined on the PSC's website or the PSC's Albany office. These cases are open and public. Individuals may provide comments directly to the Secretary of the PSC or offer comments at a public statement hearing hosted by the PSC. As the case proceeds, documents pertaining to the case are posted on the PSC website.

The PSC is required to render a decision within 11 months.

100,000 people rely upon this watershed for drinking water and to sustain economic activity in the region. For 10 years, the Seneca Watershed Intermunicipal Organization has worked to preserve, protect, and remediate this watershed — with great success. This particular “village” happens to include 40 municipalities and five counties working in conjunction with other watershed associations to tackle the contemporary challenges that threaten the health and well-being of this fresh water system. In 2019, courtesy of a state grant secured by State Sen. Pam Helming, R-54 of Canandaigua, the SWIO recruited Ian Smith to be the full-time, on-the-ground watershed steward. Right now, the organization manages 16 different projects that includes the Watershed's Nine Element Plan. The 9E Plan for phosphorus offers a blueprint for current and future actions to maintain a healthy watershed. The plan focuses on improving stormwater management and the runoff of sediments, nutrients, and other pollutants into the system. The plan also supports ongoing efforts to create sustainable wine-growing practices in the region. “One of the major proj-

ects currently underway is the construction of culverts under the Keuka Outlet Trail, which will allow high water in the Keuka Outlet to flow into the prism of the former Crooked Lake Canal, which lies on the opposite side of the trail from the outlet,” SWIO said. “This project has been funded with a \$314,094 grant from the federal Environmental Protection Agency, following the initial investment of \$30,600 provided by local sources.” “So far, projects that have been completed or are currently active account for \$2.2 million provided by public and private grants and donations,” Smith said, noting private donations have contributed approximately \$90,000 in funds, money he said makes a tremendous difference. “All of this has been accomplished with just over half of the municipalities financially supporting the efforts of SWIO, and its sole employee, Smith,” SWIO said. Currently, three counties, 17 of the 28 towns, nine of the 12 villages, and the city of Geneva support SWIO. Much work remains to be undertaken, though, especially with persistent threats like harmful algal blooms and invasive species in the watershed ecosystem. “About half of the municipalities in the watershed contribute their ‘fair share’ to SWIO, which is basically to support

Smith's position,” Town Geneva Town Supervisor Mark Venuti said. “He could use an assistant, and, if we had greater support from municipalities, we'd hire one and get even more work done.” The SWIO continues to work closely with organizations that include Seneca Lake Pure Waters Association, Keuka Lake Association, Finger Lakes Institute, and the Keuka Watershed Improvement Cooperative to meet the present and future needs of the watershed and the communities who rely upon it. Smith also fosters good working relationships with various local, state, and federal

agencies. “SWIO is proof that big challenges can best be met with expertise, collaboration, and cooperation,” Venuti said. “The lakes still face many challenges, but they are living environments that are the basis of the local economy. All municipalities within the watershed benefit from the economic and environmental impact of the lakes. City Manager Amie Hendrix said the fire truck purchase is “something that's been delayed from our capital projects plan for multiple years.” She also noted that the CDBG funds, which may be on the federal chopping block, already have been received by New York for the current fiscal year. Councilors did not need to take action on the proposal Wednesday, but ap-

peared to give their blessing to the administration on beginning the application process. City Council may need to authorize the full grant application and required match, Parrotta said. On Thursday, the fire chief said he likes the city's chances. “We believe our application stands on strong footing,” he said. “The City of Geneva has clearly demonstrated the need for replacement — our current apparatus is well beyond NFPA-recommended {span}(National

Fire Protection Association) service life, with rising maintenance costs and performance limitations that directly impact response times.” Parrotta said the engine “serves neighborhoods that include a significant percentage of low- and moderate-income residents, aligning directly with the CDBG program's national objectives of improving public safety in underserved areas,” noting the city is also highlighting “the engine's regional importance, including its role

in mutual aid responses to surrounding communities.” However, Parrotta said it is important to acknowledge that CDBG is a highly competitive program. “Fire apparatus requests often compete with priorities like housing, infrastructure, and community development projects,” he said. “In addition, the city's ability to front costs — since this is a reimbursement-based grant — will be a key factor in funding decisions.”

The Palmyra Fire Department said dispatchers called them and the East Palmyra Fire Department to the scene, where they found a structure engulfed in flames. Initial reports indicated the possibility of trapped victims, the department said. “The crew was able to gain access to the structure and overcome heavy fire/smoke conditions to look for the trapped victim,” the department

said. While a crew was inside, the department said they learned the three victims — all children — inside the residence had escaped and were being treated by emergency medical services personnel. Deputies said an 11-year-old was taken by Mercy Flight to Rochester for burns, while the two others — ages 8 and 14 — were taken by ambulance to be treated for smoke inhalation. Palmyra firefighters said they were able to knock a majority of the fire down until being

forced to back out because of overwhelming heat from the blaze. Additional firefighters from area agencies arrived to assist, the department said. The department said the fire was declared under control at 10:36 p.m., with some units remaining to put out hot spots. Deputies said the cause of the fire has not been determined. Other departments that responded included crews from South Macedon, Fairville, Lincoln, Marion, Newark, Port Gibson, and Manchester. Finger Lakes Ambulance,

Western Wayne Ambulance, Wayne County Ambulance, Newark Ambulance, as well Palmyra police and state police, also assisted. “Special thanks to the neighbors and (a) bystander that saw this fire,” the fire department said. “Your actions will never go unnoticed for giving our men and women plenty of water and snacks and trying to help the people out. The Palmyra FD appreciates the help you were able to give to us and make sure we were okay and the ones that were in the unfortunate situation tonight.”

he said residents recognized the value of the facility but also pointed to its shortcomings.

“I think the public recognizes it’s aging and investment is needed,” he said.

The facility’s operational challenges go beyond the obsolete ice-making system, Heidl said. Other issues include inadequate visitor and youth locker rooms, an often-crowded lobby, summer heat and “over-capacity” restrooms.

The good news, said Heidl: “The bones of the building are in sound shape.”

Heidl presented three options for City Council to consider:

- Scenario 1: In-kind rehabilitation, which calls for replacing the ice-making system and floor, along with some minor facelifts and reconfigurations of the facility.
- Scenario 2: Integrate a “community center” concept into the facility, which, besides replacing the ice-making system and floor, would include demolishing the south end of the facility and replacing it with a two-story section that would include team rooms, offices, a skate shop and other rooms.
- Scenario 3: Demolish the building and construct a new facility.

While all three scenarios will involve

significant dollars and logistical challenges, building a new facility could cost over \$30 million, Heidl said.

“A lot of money, obviously,” he added.

However, he said there are economies of scale for a larger project, and explained there is state grant money of \$5 million to \$15 million for multi-use community centers.

“There (are) local costs with all these things (scenarios), but it does not have to be the city,” Heidl said, explaining that “local partners” could provide that money.

Heidl did not mention what “local partners” he was referring to, but HWS would likely be the partner he was referring to.

City Comptroller Adam Blowers said earlier this year that the Colleges paid the city \$130,376 for ice time in 2024.

“Hobart and William Smith is grateful for the partnership with the City of Geneva regarding the Geneva Recreation Complex and look forward to reviewing the study,” spokesperson Cathy Williams said Monday morning.

Heidl said additional research likely is needed because of the limited scope of the study but noted that a grant application would be due later this summer.

City Manager Amie Hendrix said additional talks on the Recreation Complex are expected.

“The Complex discussion will likely be part of future budget talks, as well as (a) grant opportunity review,” she said Monday.

Councilors weigh in

In response to a request for comment on the Geneva Recreation Complex study and presentation — there were none at the July 2 meeting — three councilors responded.

All three said the city should move ahead with Rec Complex improvements, although Ward 2 Councilor Bill Pealer Jr did so with some caution.

“The study provided some interesting options,” he said. “Depending on funding, I think they should all be considered. (However) it is a curious time for the consideration of capital improvements of a recreational nature. Council just shot down a lakefront harbor project that was in the works for over a decade. One that would have expanded public access, encouraged recreation, and enhanced economic growth. This batch of proposals would do the same.”

Ward 1 Councilor Chris Lavin has encouraged the city to consider turning over operations to HWS.

“The Rec Center is a great community asset,” he said. “Home to hockey, both collegiate and community. Great winter skating adventures. However, as with many city assets and services these days, it is out of kilter, costing more than it is worth and absorbing virtually all of the Recreation Department’s resources while our parks and other rec services are all but abandoned.”

Lavin said the “rink is antiquated, its key mechanicals held together by hope, tape and too much money. We need to reboot with our great partner Hobart and William Smith to gauge the school’s long-term commitment to hockey downtown.”

Lavin said that if he “could wave a wand, I would make a long-term lease with HWS to manage and maintain the rink and supply public skating sessions and youth hockey time for the community for one dollar per year. The colleges pay dearly for use of the rink, and they could use those funds to assure quality for a great hockey program. At the same time, I would support the administration partnering with HWS to develop a long-term plan to mix public and private funds to replace the rink

and locker rooms with updated facilities. It is a great asset with championship HWS hockey as the anchor.”

Lavin said he fears the city “won’t be able to guarantee ice at The Cooler next winter without some decisive action, but Geneva’s finances are charitably described as fragile at best. Maintaining our great police and fire services are at risk. Investments in recreation have to shift to a pay-to-play basis by those who use them most.”

At-large Councilor Ahmad Whitfield has decided which scenario he supports.

“After reviewing the three proposed options and considering both fiscal responsibility and community impact, I support option 2 — partial demolition and reconstruction to create a multi-use community center.”

Whitfield said option 1, which calls for new rink refrigeration and floor replacement, among some other minor work, “while less expensive upfront, offers only cosmetic improvements and fails to address the systemic issues at the heart of the complex’s decline. On the other hand, option three may be too costly and risky at over \$30 million, especially given our city’s broader infrastructure needs.”

He said option 2 “provides us with a responsible, flexible, and community-centered path forward. It allows us to modernize key components of the facility while expanding its functionality for youth programming, senior services, and public events.”

Whitfield also acknowledged the funding available if Council chooses the community center concept.

“While a 20% local match is required, this type of partnership is exactly how we can responsibly leverage outside resources to bring meaningful change to Geneva,” he said.

The councilor said additional community discussion is needed.

“Our decision on this facility will shape opportunities for generations to come, and it must reflect the voices of those who use it most,” he said. “Let us build not just a better building, but a stronger, more united Geneva.”

ITHACA — Dominic Versage, 84, of Ithaca, N.Y., passed away at his home on July 15, 2025.

Dominic Americo Versage was born on September 28, 1940, in Penn Yan, N.Y., the first of four children born to Rocco Leonard Versage and Anna Josephine Versage (née Massucci). He graduated from Penn Yan Academy in 1958 and, in 1960, earned an Associate of Applied Science degree in electrical technology at the Mohawk Valley Technological Institute in Utica, N.Y. After graduating, he began working as an electronic technician at Cornell University’s Nuclear Reactor laboratory.

In 1963, Dominic joined the newly formed Peace Corps, deciding immediately to join the organization the first time he heard of it. He was assigned to serve in Colombia, based in Pradera, a town in the state on Valle del Cauca, where he taught community development, including engaging in agricultural work and helping build schools and housing, for two years. During his stay, he worked closely with local politician José Azarías Agudelo, who introduced Dominic to his family, including Dominic’s future wife, María Inés. Dominic and Inés married in Pradera on April 10, 1965, after the completion of his Peace Corps service.

The following month, the newlyweds moved to Ithaca, where Dominic resumed his career at Cornell University. He would remain with the university until his retirement in 2006. Initially, he continued his work as an electronic technician, later becoming the Radiation Safety Officer in the university’s Environmental Health Department, and eventually Radiation Safety Specialist in The Department of Environment, Health and Safety.

Dominic began assuming leadership roles at the university early in his career. He was elected secretary-treasurer

of the Cornell Technical Employees Association in 1967, president of the Cornell University Employee Association in 1968, and as an employee member of the Cornell University Senate in 1971. From 1983 to 1985, he served as an employee-elected representative to Cornell’s Board of Trustees and in 1991 received the George Peter Award for Dedicated Service.

Additionally, he was among the founding members of the Cornell Recreation Club, and both Inés and he were instrumental in the founding of the Cornell Colombian Students Association, with Dominic serving as the group’s faculty advisor for many years. Outside of Cornell, he held various administrative positions with the Ithaca Council 277 of The Knights of Columbus and with Local 132 of the American Federation of Musicians, to which he was elected president in 1973.

Dominic’s lifelong passion was for music, and particularly for the accordion. He began playing at age 9, one of the many caught up in the sensation caused by Dick Contino’s appearances on the Horace Heidt talent contest throughout 1948. Dominic performed extensively for both school and extracurricular events throughout his teen years. Upon moving to Ithaca in 1965, he established himself as a professional musician locally and regionally, forming The Dominic Versage Trio in the 1970s. He was particularly proud of his 27-year Friday night residency at Centini’s Coddington Restaurant from 1982 until the restaurant’s closing. Typical of many foreclosures, it was in disrepair and needed, a ton of work done. Regardless, with it being a brick structure it has good “bones.” John is doing the bulk of the renovation.

It was while looking through the attic that John came across some plastic bags. In them were some interesting items: a Purple Heart medal, dog tags, an American flag, old newspapers, other military medals, and a military uniform.

Jessica, who is an attorney, wanted to research and find out if the rightful owner of the items could be located.

She got some help because there were certificates with names on them, along with the dog tags. And, Google search was quite helpful.

The Bronze Star medal was awarded to a Private First Class Howard E. Warner in 1950 for his heroics that occurred in the World War II European Theater of Operations in 1945. Jessica was able to hone in that he hailed from rural Tunkhannock,

Pa., and called an American Legion there (Black Walnut American Legion Post No. 510). She found out that Howard had passed away in 2021. However, she was given contact information for his daughter, Karyn Brostoski.

Jessica has communicated with her and is sending the items back to their rightful family in the Keystone State. Turns out Howard was a U.S. Army veteran and, while he served, was a medic and paratrooper.

The military uniform

looks to be a reproduction due to the condition of it and the more modern-type stitching that was used for some patches.

Karyn was unable to help with any information as to why and how the items ended up in Geneva, as the family has no known connection to the area.

Not sure if the items the Serretts found have much monetary value, but for the Warner family, they likely are priceless.

On June 30, 2025, New York State Electric & Gas Corporation (NYSEG) filed with the New York State Public Service Commission (PSC) an Investment Plan for Powering NY, which includes testimony, exhibits, and proposed delivery rate changes to the above-referenced tariff schedules for service.

The changes contained in that filing would increase revenues by approximately \$457.4 million from NYSEG’s electric operations and by approximately \$90.8 million from the company’s natural gas operations, to become effective in the spring of 2026.

The PSC may approve, modify or reject any or all of the proposed tariff changes. Among other things, the PSC’s determination may require revisions of the proposed amount of the increases applicable to particular classifications of service or changes in rates applicable to those classifications for which no increase is proposed by the companies.

The complete NYSEG filing may be examined on the PSC’s website or the PSC’s Albany office. These cases are open and public. Individuals may provide comments directly to the Secretary of the PSC or offer comments at a public statement hearing hosted by the PSC. As the case proceeds, documents pertaining to the case are posted on the PSC website.

The PSC is required to render a decision within 11 months.

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
