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A.L.J. CLARKE: On the record. case twenty-three G zero six two seven, Proceeding on Motion of the Commission as to the Rates, Charges, Rules and Regulations of National Fuel Gas Distribution Corporation for Gas Service. Good afternoon and welcome. My name is Michael Clarke. I'm an administrative law judge for the Department of Public Service. With me today is Administrative Law Judge Tara Kersey, also from the Department of Public Service. Together we are responsible for presiding over the hearings in this case and the development of a complete record in the proceeding. Assisting us today are Esmin Brown-Anderson and Sangeetha Kailas from the Department's Office of Consumer Services. We're all here today for a public statement hearing that was noticed on December 6th, 2023.

I'm going to briefly provide some background information and then we'll get right into the hearing. National Fuel Gas Distribution Corporation, or N.F.G., filed amendments to its gas tariff schedules on October 31st, 2023, proposing an increase to its annual gas delivery revenues by approximately eighty-eight point eight million

1/17/2024 - National Fuel Gas Corp. - 23-G-0627 dollars, which would result in an estimated total monthly bill increase of approximately eleven dollars and thirty-one cents for the average residential heating customer and approximately sixteen dollars and sixty-five cents for the average small commercial customers.

Under New York State Law, the Public Service Commission must consider a utility's proposal and may adopt or reject it, in whole or in part, or modify it. This hearing is being held so you can provide your comments on N.F.G.'s proposal for the Commission's consideration.

The Public Service Commission has six members. The Chairperson, Rory Christian and Commissioners Diane Burman, James Alesi, John Howard, David Valesky and John Maggiore. As I mentioned earlier, the purpose of today's hearing is to provide you with an opportunity to tell the Commission your thoughts on N.F.G.'s rate proposal. This is not an evidentiary hearing or a question and answer session, but a forum to hear comments from you. Any statements made today will become part of the case record. We have a court reporter joining us who will prepare a transcript of the hearing which will be

If you prefer not to speak at the hearing, there are a variety of other ways to bring your comments to the attention of the Commission. As indicated in the December 6th notice, you can do so through the Department's website, by regular mail or by phone. Regardless of how comments are submitted, they will be given equal consideration.

Okay. We're ready to begin and have three people registered to speak. When I call your name, please speak slowly and clearly so that the court reporter can accurately capture your statement for the record. Please state your name and if you're speaking on behalf of an organization, the name of the organization. Although we are not imposing a time limit, we request that you try to be concise and avoid repeating yourself. Our first registered speaker is John Brown. I don't see Mr. Brown on the list of electronic users. So Mr. Brown, if you're calling in, please press star three on your phone, we can identify you and allow you to give your comment. All right, we're going to move on to Daniel Russell.

MR. RUSSELL: Good afternoon,

Administrative Law Judges Kersey and Clarke. My name is Daniel Russell and I am a legal aid with the Public Utility Law Project of New York, or PULP, as well as an N.F.G. customer. My pronouns are he and him. PULP is a forty year old non-profit with the mission of educating, advocating and litigating on behalf of New York State low income utility customers. PULP thanks the Department of Public Service for the opportunity to provide a public statement in relation to the recent filing by National Fuel Gas, who is an active party in this case. And we are currently working on our expert testimony, which we expect to file on March 1st.

PULP has several concerns that we will be expanding upon in our written testimony, but today we would like to focus on energy affordability. As you stated earlier, on October 31st, 2023, National Fuel Gas filed a rate increase which has the potential to increase delivery bills by thirty percent per month for the average residential customer, up to nearly a hundred dollars a month. The reality is that many N.F.G. customers are already

1/17/2024 - National Fuel Gas Corp. - 23-G-0627 struggling with affordability. In Erie County alone, around fifty percent of children qualify for free or reduced lunch. And as of November 2023, National Fuel Gas has about fifty-six thousand eight hundred and twenty-four customers sixty days or more in arrears, totaling nearly -- totaling nearly thirty two million dollars. Now that the Company is asking for an additional eighty-eight point eight million dollars in revenue, N.F.G.'s historically low compared to the rest of the State, heating bills could skyrocket along with the above-mentioned numbers. Between the pandemic and natural disasters, customers in N.F.G.'s service territory have been hit hard and a thirty percent delivery bill increase could be the final affordability straw that breaks the household budget of many Western New Yorkers.

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As such, PULP urges this Public
Service Commission, the Department of Public Service
Staff, to scrutinize every penny and only improve
those costs necessary to ensure that service is safe
and reliable. Thank you for your time.

MR. CLARKE: Thank you, Mr. Russell.

Our next registered speaker is Ms. Colleen

Ballacchino. Ms. Ballacchino, if you've called in,

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please press star three so we can identify you and

unmute your line. I see -- Esmin, do you see Ms.

Ballacchino? She's an electronic user. Okay. Ms.

Ballacchino, you've been unmuted. Please make your

MS. BALLACCHINO: -- and I represent two hundred and twenty-five productive workers employed at National Fuel Gas. Our membership takes great pride in being the face of the Company and its customer relationships. I.B.W. Local 2199 generally supports National Fuel in Rate Case 23-G-0627 regarding the proposals for the C.L.C.P.A. goals and for future weatherization programs. We feel the current aggressive public policy initiated to ban natural gas in New York State must be managed in a deliberate, measured manner to fully ensure reliability and safety during extreme winter events. It should also provide affordability for customers and mitigate the negative impact this will have on quality union jobs.

National Fuel has a proven history of being experts in the national fuel gas industry and taking all of these factors into consideration and acting thoughtfully for a safe transition, Local 2199

However, Local 2199 does not support the proposed permanent closing of National Fuel's three customer walk-in offices, which have remained closed since the start of Covid-19. These offices are located in disadvantaged communities within Buffalo, Cheektowaga and Jamestown, whose customers depend on public transportation and rely on the consistency of set hours that are Monday through Friday. Many of these customers do not have internet access, computers, cell phones, bank accounts or credit cards and would like face-to-face contact for billing questions. Customers have consistently asked for the walk-in offices to be reopened either by phone or by physically going to the walk-in offices. In fact, since the temporary Covid closure, many customers still utilize the cash drop boxes at their -- at their centers to make required payments. Payments have ranged up to \$90,000. This example further supports the customer need and our desire to maintain these important customer walk-in offices.

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Local 2199 also does not support the Company sending New York related customer service calls to a non-union call center in Pennsylvania. We know there are Pennsylvania representatives being

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utilized to manage New York calls. We feel that New
York related customer service business could be
better managed by Local 2199 members residing within
New York State's National Fuel Gas territory. Local
2199 appreciates the relationship that exists between
National Fuel Gas and our membership. We jointly
support a measured, deliberate approach in managing
the natural gas transition in our service territory.
Such an approach is the best -- in the best interest
of customers, Local 2199 members and National Fuel by
maintaining safe, reliable service. Thank you for
giving Local 2199 the opportunity to voice our
concerns.
