LECAKES: 4 I call to order case 23-G-0627. This is the 5 proceeding on the motion of the Commission as to the 6 rates, charges, rules, and regulations of National 7 Fuel Gas Distribution Corporation for gas service. Good evening, everyone. 8 9 A.L.J. KERSEY: Good evening. 10 ALL: Good evening. 11 A.L.J. LECAKES: My name Dakin 12 Lecakes, I'm the Chief Administrative Law Judge for

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Lecakes, I'm the Chief Administrative Law Judge for the New York State Department of Public Service and Public Service Commission. I work in the Commission's Buffalo offices here at Ellicott Square Building, just down the block on the 10th floor. As the Chief Administrative Law Judge, I oversee the office of hearings and supervise the judges in that office. With me tonight is one of the judges that is assigned to this case, Judge Tara Kersey.

Also assigned to this case who could not be with us tonight because of weather conditions and travel is Judge Michael Clarke. Together, Judges Kersey and Clarke are responsible for presiding over the proceedings and hearings of this case, as well as

Before we begin, I would really like to thank the Buffalo Public Library for allowing us the use of this wonderful auditorium for this hearing tonight.

I would also like to thank Scott Dean and the rest of the Department of Public Service

Office of Consumer Services for helping us make the arrangements for this proceeding, this hearing, as well as for being available to greet you when you came in and take your names if you wish to speak tonight. We are here today for a public safety hearing that was noticed on December 6th, 2023. On October 31st, 2023, National Fuel Gas Distribution Corporation, N.F.G., filed a proposal to increase its annual gas delivery revenues by approximately 88.8 million.

If N.F.G.'s requests were allowed in total, the average N.F.G. residential customer would see -- would receive a monthly bill increase of approximately \$11.31 while the average small commercial customer would see a monthly increase of approximately \$16.65. Under New York State law, the Public Service Commission must consider a utility proposal and may adopt or reject it in whole, or in

This hearing is being held so you can provide your comments on N.F.G.'s proposal for the Commission to consider when it determines whether to adopt it or to reject it or to modify it in some way. While the Judges to this case oversee the process, they do not make any final decisions. The final decisions on N.F.G.'s proposal are made by the Public Service Commission, which is made up of six members.

Currently the Chairperson, Rory

Christian and five Commissioners, Diane Burman, James

Alesi, John Howard, David Valesky, and John Maggiore.

The purpose of today's hearing is to provide you with
an opportunity to tell the Commission your thoughts

on N.F.G.'s proposal. Any statements made today are
part of the case record. And we have a court
reporter with us today who is seated at the end of
the table with us, who is recording your statements.

Those recordings will be included in the official recording -- record of this proceeding through a written transcript that will be made, which will also be placed on the Department of Public Services internet webpage which we refer to as the Document and Matter Management system or D.M.M. That

1/24/2024 - National Fuel & Gas, Corp. - 23-G-0627 can be located at d.s. -- I'm sorry, dps.ny.gov. The hearing tonight that we're holding is not an evidentiary hearing or a question-and-answer session.

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Instead, it is a forum just to hear your comments. This is not the only opportunity to comment on N.F.G.'s proposals or requests. If you do not wish to speak at today's hearing, but you still want your views to be included in the record, there are other ways to comment and they're listed in the public notice for today's event, which can -- is available at the rear table that is manned by our Office of Consumer Services.

Those ways include submitting your comments through the department's website or by email, regular mail, or by phone and the information to access any of those is out at the table.

Regardless of how the comments are submitted, they are given equal consideration by the Commission and Commissioners. Comments can be submitted and will be considered throughout the entire proceeding which lasts approximately 11 months where it can be extended.

If you do want to make a statement here today, as I noted, there is an Office of

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Consumer Representative that is out back, that is ready to hand you a card, you can put your name on it, and we will call on the individuals that wish to comment in the order that the cards are received.

When I do call your name, please come up to one of the two microphones on either side of the stage.

They're both left on and speak slowly and clearly so that the court reporter can accurately capture your statement for the record.

And before we get -- begin tonight, I just want to remind everybody that there may be some people that provide comments that are different than the opinions that you may hold with regard to certain aspects of the company's filing, I just ask that you all show them respect and that we demonstrate appreciation for the process that we're here for tonight.

We do really appreciate your understanding and thank you very much for coming here tonight. So, with that said, I'm going to call our first speaker. Our first speaker tonight from Buffalo is Brian Talley. Mr. Talley?

BRIAN TALLEY: Hi, my name is Brian

Talley. I'm with Imperishable Ministries. I'm also

1/24/2024 - National Fuel & Gas, Corp. - 23-G-0627 a native in the resident of Buffalo, New York. I've been here all my life. I can't believe that you're trying to raise this 29 percent. My gas bill right now today is -- I just got one for \$429. I just paid \$300 last month. If they raise it, if they raise it 30 percent more, that's another \$150 on top of it. I mean, it's affordable I know. I'm -- right now, I'm on disability, you know, I have a fixed income.

There's no way I can afford that. I don't believe anyone here can afford that. You know, what's going on right now, you know, with these gas companies is -- is really ridiculous. It's a monopoly. I mean, it seems the gas company are in cahoots with the government. As soon as you get a bill, they tell you, like today when I called them on the phone, I tell them, listen, I just paid \$300 last week. Now you want me to pay another \$400? They told me to go down to HEAP. So I put up to the HEAP to cover.

So I thought about that. I said, wait a minute, you know, the only people making the money that the government is sitting here is the gas company. If nothing is coming to the community, we're just the pawns that they're using to get their

1/24/2024 - National Fuel & Gas, Corp. - 23-G-0627 money. So if they send five million dollars here to us in New York in order to help the community, and yet the gas company is taking it off, you know, they're taking their money, you know.

And it's leaving us, like I just filmed right outside, outside right there, I just filmed about a hundred people who are homeless, who have no place to go and yet the gas company is using this money and taking this money from these people. We are the ones who have to pay these bills. We are the ones who get our money and we can't do anything with it, much to buy, you know, it, it's a shame.

You know, I gave my - I've been giving my life to this country, trying to do everything I can in this city, in this community. We built this country ourselves. You know, we built this city and to come in here with fracking and doing all of this and not doing anything for the community is wrong.

And I hope that this bill is not passed. I hope it isn't. Thank you very much.

A.L.J. LECAKES: Thank you very much. The next party, I have Rev. Dr. Majadi Baruti.

REV. DR. MAJADI BARUTI: Greetings, greeting, greetings. I'm Rev. Dr. Majadi Baruti.

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I'm the climate justice organizer at PUSH Buffalo.
Here today, I'm speaking as a citizen of the City of
Buffalo, citizen of Western New York. I'm in the
14222 area zip code considered to be a higher end
area of the city. But the ministry that I have along
with my fiancé, we've been given service to folks in
the community, folks that are on drugs, and need food
and that type of thing. I had a spiel. I don't have
one now.

I mean, I heard the brother just mention, what he paid. And mine was just a little less than that for the winter. I had my fiancé do a survey of the house today because I knew I was coming here and we've been talking to our landlord about fixing some of these dynamics. But I have some means to do this, to pay this rate but it is difficult.

And I like to eat, I've become accustomed to it over my 54 years. I'd like to continue to be able to do it. But I understand that there are people in fact, I was here in the library for the last two, three days trying to organize folks to get here. There were folks that I spoke to, three different people who were homeless because of not

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When I explained to them what we were doing today, they were afraid to come. They thought they would be further persecuted. That this kind of vibration is happening to the poor and to the homeless is a shame. Now, I understand that multinational corporations and corporations don't have the ability to experience shame because they don't have a soul. I understand that that's not a thing. So a heart doesn't work there at all.

But perhaps somewhere in the scrapings of the corporate structure here, there is someone who can hear the plea of black, brown, indigenous women and children whom I serve throughout my ministry and they can say, you know what? Maybe we shouldn't do this. I have these things of hope as a priest of the divine family, I have these ideas of hope. And sometimes when I deal with National Fuel Gas as a part of my climate work, climate justice work, I realized that hope is something that I'm just holding on to and it's almost nebulous. It's almost without form. I can't touch it.

I can't put my hand on it because then

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I see the faces of my elders who could suffer and who could perish like a 50 plus. That's according to the community, the 50 plus people that passed away in the Buffalo blizzard of last year; that is not a natural occurrence. I'm a climate guy. I know what I'm looking at. I'm also a farmer, descendant of farmers. I can feel it on my body. This is not a natural construct. It is a dynamic of the interrelations between the fossil fuel industries, the banks that invested in them, and absolute corporate greed.

People died and will continue to perish. This is a soft winter. But this softness is not normalizing from what I'm understanding and what my body feels, this is not a normal thing for Buffalo. It's heavy water, but the crystallized form of water, as — as snow is a little bit lighter than what it has been but people are afraid. I hear it. They're afraid. There are people who die in their cars.

I've spoken to elders who were afraid that they would fall face first into the snow and that they could not get lifted up out of the snow because no one would see them. This is all in part,

1/24/2024 - National Fuel & Gas, Corp. - 23-G-0627 it's only in part because you got to deal with the U.S. military and other militaries around the planet, you know, everybody in America, we kind of love war. We like fighting in the United States. Everybody likes fighting. You love it.

Love is a little thing that you have - you kind of have an aversion to, but fighting
everybody seems to like that. That's the soul of
what America's about. U.S. military is one of the
greatest polluters on the planet and so is National
Fuel Gas, so is the fossil fuel industry and we can't
do this. We're destroying our planet. I want to
grow sunflowers and collard greens for my elders to
feed them and I want my children, I have two
grandchildren, I want them to be able to live on a
planet that's peaceful and soft and nothing, one that
embraces them, not one where they're paying a \$400,
\$357 bill to a monster, a behemoth, as we call them
at PUSH Buffalo a behemoth we call National Fuel Gas,
that's our nickname for them. We can't do this.

I'm pleading, asking, and I don't want to go to the next step, you know, with protestors, you know, we go into demand and that means there's an or else. We haven't figured that part out yet. But

1/24/2024 - National Fuel & Gas, Corp. - 23-G-0627 we've been out here fighting, PUSH Buffalo has been at this for a long time. I want to move into another form of engagement. I don't want to keep doing this like this.

National Fuel Gas to turn that leaf to reach way down into the crevices of its souls and try to find some dynamic of decency and make sure that people don't perish anymore by your ways. I know you've got your yachts to support, the trips to Monaco and all that. But people have died at their hands. So I'm asking the Public Service Commission, turn this down, turn this away, throw it in the garbage, put it into the trash bin, relegate to the trash bin of history on behalf of these black, brown, and indigenous folks that I'm servicing, specifically these women and these children.

Like the one I'm going to go home to, this Afro indigenous woman who is the victim of three different climate constructs, starting from Hurricane Katrina to Rita and then flooding in Tennessee, then she moved to Toronto and because she's indigenous, she had to deal with the smoke. And she said to me one day, babe, my sisters are running out of the

1/24/2024 - National Fuel & Gas, Corp. - 23-G-0627 forest with their babies on their back. I don't care about your stupid legislation in New York. So I got -- I got the climate issue in my house. She's in my house.

And you know, you would do whatever you could for your family to protect them. Thank you.

A.L.J. LECAKES: Thank you very much. Our next speaker is Lucy Velez.

DUCY VELEZ: I reserved my time.

Okay. Lower that a little. I know because -
because it's going to take me a minute here. Put

some of these up here. Okay. Okay. Just like it

here. Okay. Grab some. Okay. All the way across.

Put it all the way across. Here's more. No, this is

my keys. They displayed my house. These two are on

the side over here only because these are supplements

that need to be -- okay. Okay. These are my

injectables. And these are not duplicates. I want

you to know, none of these are duplicates.

Some of these have to work together.

No, they, yeah, you put them on. Okay. And I want
you to see them. Okay. Thank you. Okay. Thank
you. All right, thank you. Okay. Good evening.

As was said, my name is Lucy Velez and the issue that I want to impress around people is in terms of this rate hike, this rate hike affects a lot of our community. We look at our children and we look at the high cost of asthma, bronchitis, and elderly like me, COPD all the things that go wrong in a community when we don't prioritize safety.

I'm a victim of environmental racism.

I used to live near the Peace Bridge and this was before there were tighter and stricter emission standards. So in that case, I suffered from a lot of emission, carbon monoxide poisoning. In the process, I've learned to have to live taking all these medications from injectables, to supplements that have to work with other medications, to trying to make sure that I eat healthy so that these medications can work. I don't want to keep taking these medications, but I have to. And when you look at them, none of them are duplicates.

You look at the high cost of healthcare, and co-pays, and doctor visits, and specialists, and you look at how much this is happening because when you look at the rate of a hike that National Fuel wants, it may not seem like a lot,

1/24/2024 - National Fuel & Gas, Corp. - 23-G-0627 but when you look at the economics of families and the fact that everyone's in somebody's pocket, at some point you realize that everybody is tight economically. When you look at the cost of dirty fossil fuel, that could have avoided me having to deal with this and a lot of our elders having to deal with these kinds of problems. Our children, we have a very high rate of asthma, bronchitis and we say to ourselves, why?

Say, because we are the victims. And I -- and I'm not trying to make it seem as though this, we have a victim mentality, but because of redlining, because we are poor and we can only live in certain areas, we don't always -- we don't -- we don't always -- we can't always afford nice homes or apartments that are insulated or appliances that aren't old or buildings that aren't insulated and then we have to deal with cold, we have to deal with heat.

We have to deal with the sensitivities that elders and young people go through. And then you're asking for more money, more money that sometimes we can't afford and it just looks like, okay, 11, 12 bucks, it's no big deal. Yeah, it is a

1/24/2024 - National Fuel & Gas, Corp. - 23-G-0627 big deal because copays, doctors, we look at people like that and say, oh, well, you know, they can get Medicaid, they can get Medicare, you know, but the cost to a system across to New York state that, you know, we budget or the government -- the governor budgets, and you look at it and they say, okay, well we got to balance all this out.

When we look at the fact that in 2019, I was one of the people, and many of the people here fought for the -- to the passage of the C.L.C.P.A., okay, which was one of the most aggressive climate legislation. And we were so proud when it passed. And again, National Fuel spits in our face when they break the law because they can get away with it because they have huge lobbyists, okay, that can talk to other legislators, other lawmakers, and find a way to surpass and -- and in order to relegate our arguments that we need clean, renewable, sustainable energy that will keep our community, keep our children, keep our other elders from having to deal with this kind of trauma.

Clean energy is something that everybody should be fighting for. We have a benchmark for 2040 or 2050 to make sure that we

1/24/2024 - National Fuel & Gas, Corp. - 23-G-0627 switch over. I'm sorry, I have problems with words because of cognitive issues. So please forgive me. So because of the fact that we can't switch over like them, we relegate our people to live in Swiss cheese housing where they have old appliances where they, you know, there's money for new appliances, take my stove. Okay? People are crying about, oh, I don't want them to take my -- take my stove because if you're going to give me something that's energy efficient, if I can put solar on my house so that my bills are not outrageous, I can afford to live a little better. I can afford to eat a little bit.

I mean, I -- I don't look like I'm starving. And that's not the case. The case is that good food can keep me from having to take all of this. Good food and holistic treatment can change -- can change the trajectory of a lot of people's lives. So when I look at this rate hike that's been submitted three times, and they just changed it a little, but not effectively enough to make a change that is worth the value of my life or your life or our children's life. So we have to look at that. We have fought, we canvas -- not me I didn't canvas.

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I do, I don't want to go up and down the stairs, I leave it for the young folks to do. They canvas. They got over 500 cards, comments stating that, you know, they don't want this kind of legislation, that they -- it needs to be looked at again. And we went to present it downtown to the Public Service Commission, key operative word, public and they tried to deny us entry just to hand in some cards so that you folks would know what -- what we felt and how we felt. And if you change the process, you change the democratic system that we need, that we're glad that you are allowing us to participate in today.

So we're grateful that you're here, we're grateful that you're listening, but we also have to balance what's going on. I know the companies go into business to make money, but they're also in business to give good service. And unfortunately, Buffalo seems to be like a one-horse town, one newspaper, one gas company. One electrical. One cable company. Well, now we get another one. But the point being is that we need choice. We need our comments to be valued. We need to have it evaluated and looked at for what it is. I

1/24/2024 - National Fuel & Gas, Corp. - 23-G-0627 don't think any of you folks are at the point where you want to have to live like this.

I get confused just trying to keep it straight and I got a monthly -- a weekly Calendar -- pill dispense organizer four times a week. And I took this medication off, I took it off because eight pills cost over a thousand dollars. When you think about the cost, I may have a lower copay based on my insurance, but you're paying for it too, okay, all of y'all are paying for it too. We need to realize that one way or another, we're all paying for the mistakes if we don't change the system and the way we do things. We cannot have this rate hike go through without you folks evaluating it.

Without looking at what it means to our communities and say, let's be even handed about this because a lot of these people make millions of dollars and I was talking to my sister over here. She was saying, with the amount of money that even one executive makes, so many things could be remedied in our community. So I want to -- I don't want to belabor the point, but you know, healthcare is affected by this, you know, the democratic process is affected by this because like I said, the lobbyists,

So that's all I want to 6 7 say. Just think about your children, think about yourselves 10 or maybe even 20 years because some of 8 9 y'all are really young or you look really young to 10 me. So please don't get to a point where this is 11 what your future looks like. Thank you. 12 A.L.J. LECAKES: Thank you Ms. Velez. 13 And just for the record, I'm probably older than you. 14 LUCY VELEZ: Well, you look better 15 You look better than me. than me. 16 A.L.J. LECAKES: Our next speaker is 17 Bill Nowack and Mr. Nowack if you could please just 18 come over here. 19 BILL NOWACK: Sure. Thank you. Is it 20 on? A.L.J. LECAKES: Yes. 21 22 BILL NOWACK: Speaker is ready? 23 A.L.J. LECAKES: It should be. 24 BILL NOWACK: So my name is Bill 25 Nowack. I am the former executive director of the

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New York Geothermal Energy Organization, active in
the community with the Sierra Club and here tonight
active with PUSH Buffalo's efforts and testimony.

You are going to hear about the importance of
wringing as much out of this rate increase as you can
to protect folks in Buffalo and Western New York.

And you have a real opportunity at this point to do
that because New York is turning the corner or
turning the corner away from the use of fossil fuels
like gas to heat buildings and towards
electrification.

And this can result in an enormous cutback on what this rate increase is -- is intended to do. I urge you to look at the capital expense projections that National Fuel has filed in the long-range planning proceeding that the Public Service Commission has. They've outlined two -- two ways forward, actually a third way as well, a business as usual. But that's not really possible given what's happening with the C.L.C.P.A. But they --in the two ways forward that they looked at, one was called the moderate electrification scenario and that's basically doing what National Fuel would like to do to protect their profits and to keep their system

1/24/2024 - National Fuel & Gas, Corp. - 23-G-0627 going as much as they can regardless of whether it fits with the C.L.C.P.A. and whether it meets the goals.

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And there's another one, which is a high electrification scenario, and that one is in compliance with the C.L.C.P.A. It will move us away from heating with fossil fuels. At this point Natural Gas is responsible for 55 percent of the deadly greenhouse gas emissions that happen in New York State. You heard my brother Majadi talk about the importance of the climate crisis that we are in and natural gas is what is primarily contributing to that in New York State. So if you look at these two scenarios they lay out, one of which is compliant with what the Climate Action Plan came up with and another one of which is not.

The one that the Climate Action

Council came up with, which is consistent with that

is \$1.1 billion less expensive to move forward with.

\$1.1 billion that they're going to want to be taking

from Western New York rate payers who cannot afford

that for unnecessary pipes that are only going to be

obsolete if New York State meets its climate goals.

Now, I don't know if -- if the testimony in the long-

1/24/2024 - National Fuel & Gas, Corp. - 23-G-0627 range planning proceeding automatically makes it into this case, but if -- if you can see to it that that happens and as part of the record, it would be really important.

This is \$1.1 billion that we don't need to be spending, that we don't need to be pulling out of people's pockets and that if we do spend that money, it's going to be harmful for the climate and it's going to be stranded assets that rate payers are going to be paying for, for the next 50 years. I don't know how much people in -- in the -- in this group understand, but basically at this point,

National Fuel gets their revenues from the pipes they invest in. They get a percentage based on the investments they make. They don't get their money from the gas that they -- they buy and sell.

It's more on the infrastructure and so much of the infrastructure is not needed at this point and is in fact harmful. So please wring as much out of this great increase as you possibly can and use the clear evidence that is in the Climate Action Plan and in the data that they have already provided you with to do it. That's it. Thank you.

A.L.J. LECAKES: Thank you very much.

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Our next speaker is Brian Van De Bogert.

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BRIAN VAN DE BOGERT: Thank you. I want to build on some of the things that we just heard from Bill as well as some of the things that that Mama Lucy was saying just before that. My name's Brian. I'm also a member with -- with PUSH Buffalo. So last year, you know, the gas utilities like National Fuel and Gas, were required to publish their long-term plans for service delivery in compliance with the C.L.C.P.A., as some other folks have mentioned. N.F.G. was the first utility to submit their plan covering the period from now up until 2042 and as we also heard, they've had to submit their plan three times and each version of their plan, and we've seen each version, each version shows no conceivable path towards getting to the 85 percent emissions reductions by 2050 as required by law.

So it's really clear what National Fuel wants is a license to continue burning fossil fuels with no end in sight. They don't care about that 1.1 billion in savings that Bill was talking about under the high electrification scenario. They want to maintain the expensive, obsolete, leaky

1/24/2024 - National Fuel & Gas, Corp. - 23-G-0627 infrastructure that their profit margin depends on.

They want to kick the can down the road when it comes to making the transition required by the State.

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Eventually this road that they're on would result in an abrupt change that burdens customers with even higher costs and leaves many people out of A job. I want to read one quote, which comes from National Fuel themselves, which they printed in response to a question about the financing of their long-term plan. Quote, affordability concerns and or stranded assets in the gas system will necessarily need to be shared by some combination of taxpayers and electricity customers, end of quote.

When I hear that, I think National Fuel is basically planning to have a bailout later down the line. The proposed rate increase that we're talking about here tonight kind of feels like an early down payment towards that bailout. It seems to me like National Fuel has done the math and they're getting desperate. They've decided to hang on like hell and only look out for their bottom line rather than do the responsible thing and participate in the transition to a more sustainable future.

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MALE SPEAKER: Say it man.

BRIAN VAN DE BOGERT: Thank you.

A.L.J. LECAKES: Thank you very much.

Our next speaker is Reverend Markeisha Jackson.

REVEREND MARKEISHA JACKSON: Hi, I'm
Reverend Markeisha Jackson. I'm with Imperishable
Ministries of Western New York. Also a member and
investor with PUSH Buffalo and a Federal
Communications Commission. It's disturbing for me to
stand here today to know that national -- that a gas
company can charge whatever they want to do. They
can raise your rates whenever they want to, and as a
customer we're obligated to pay it because if we
don't pay it, then it's shut off.

Our power that we possess as human beings, it should be invigorating. It should be so joyous to wake up every morning, but with a rate to go up 30 percent and with the rates that they are right now, we can't wake up happy. Not everybody does. I'm originally from Rochester, New York, so I experienced Rochester Gas and Electric as well. Being a resident of Buffalo, New York, now it's not much of a difference. My daughter has three children, her and her fiancé. I happened to be in

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Rochester about -- this was, I'll say November -
around November before the holidays. And Rochester

Gas and Electric utility worker came, knocked on the

She's at work, her fiancé is at work. The children are at school, 5-year-old, 4-year-old, and 2-year-old. Asks, is Amangelique here? No, she's not here, but I'm her mom. He didn't have to disclose the information, but he did disclose the information. He said, I'm here to cut the power off. What you mean -- what you mean? Did -- was a bill sent? Was there a disconnect notice? We sent numerous -- my daughter's been living at 101 Ontario Street for a year and a half.

She previously lived at 2350 Culver
Road, which is in Irondequoit. They still had her
listed at 2350 Culver Road. So she's getting charged
for a house that she no longer lives there and a
house that she's living in currently. And I'm glad
and I was grateful to be in the position to have \$526
at that time. When that -- when that worker said,
we're shutting this off. No, you're not. Everybody
is not in the position to do things like that.

And figuratively speaking, I'm not

either in that position because I'm disabled. I get

-- I'm on a low-income budget, but God is good. God
is good. Okay. That is the ultimate power and we
are asking that you make sure go through the budget
that they did and you'll see that it is a violation
for them to increase the rates on us without telling
us why they're doing it. It doesn't have to be done
like this. There's lives that are at stake. They
are really at stake. The homelessness isn't
changing. We need people to be in the house. We
don't need them out on the street. But if you're not
in the house with power, you going to be on the
street.

We need this balance brought back into the United States of America, but starting right here in New York. National Gas, National Fuel, National Grid, it's disgusting. And I know we can do better. Thank you.

A.L.J. LECAKES: Thank you very much. Next we have Rahwa Ghirmatzion.

RAHWA GHIRMATZION: Good evening. For the record, my name is Rahwa Ghirmatzion. I am a longtime Buffalo resident. I am a mom. I'm also on the Climate Justice Working Group, previously former

1/24/2024 - National Fuel & Gas, Corp. - 23-G-0627 staff person at PUSH Buffalo, still a member of PUSH Buffalo and a senior fellow at Tishman

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I'm here primarily because I'm a mom. I can't tell you how many times I've been to these hearings. I think the last few times I was here, I had my son with me and he'd fallen asleep and it was full of other moms with their children.

That is not how we really want be, the kind of parents, but obviously we care about their future. This one was born with asthma, beautiful, magical, little black boy. I think about what the planet is going to look like in his lifetime and it's terrifying, it scares me. And this is not a Buffalo issue. This is a global issue. And science -- it's the science, right? Is that fossil fuel extraction has to stop if we are going to have a livable planet. National Fuel and Gas has been around for over a hundred years in this community.

And we've been struggling to work with them and get them to be better stewards for our community for decades. The first ever climate related issue that PUSH Buffalo ever did was because of its residents constantly coming to PUSH, it was

1/24/2024 - National Fuel & Gas, Corp. - 23-G-0627 just a brand-new little organization. And people would say, please help me with this because I pay more for my utility bill, my gas bill in the winter months, right, than I do my mortgage or my rent.

The national average is about 6%, except here in New York and in Buffalo where we are the second -- the third poorest city in the nation, not in New York, in the nation, right, where we have the second oldest housing stock in the country built beautifully, by the way. Right. But often our homes make us sick because it was built before insulation was ever, you know, we knew what insulation was and how to insulate our homes before it was invented.

Many of these homes that were built were more than a hundred years old prior to the '70s when we knew what was going on with lead.

So a lot of our homes are filled with lead because there's been such a huge disinvestment. Most of the housing stock is in very poor shape, right. And so we leak all that energy out. And oftentimes it's what saves people when they can't afford to pay their utility bill, what they do is they turn on their gas stove and use that at home. Now, imagine if that home actually was weatherized,

And do you know how many people have died? Every year we hear people that died from carbon monoxide poisoning. Right, now we are talking about clean natural gas. Right?

Which is really methane going into the air and actually wreaking even more havoc because methane burns faster than does oil. Right? Coal.

And so, you know, how we are being bamboozled is terrible, on top of which National Fuel coming back and asking for more money from y'all -- from direct payers, even though you use its customer's phone numbers, which I think is illegal to do robocalls, all last year, you know, how many of us had to come and re-defend the C.L.C.P.A., you know, myself, most of the people in this room and thousands of other Buffalonians we wrote the solution. Right?

This is what's going to build our beloved community. This is what's going to create a healthy, resilient community for our people. And we have to come time and time and time again to defend it. When does it stop? What is happening with that lawsuit? We have Doreen Harris, who sits on the Climate Action Council. I sit on the climate, you

1/24/2024 - National Fuel & Gas, Corp. - 23-G-0627 know, justice working group.

The only times we've had to fight that her and two other members decided no against the scoping plan. When it passed anyway, because of all the organizing people continued to do, she is the chair of the -- of the New York State Business Roundtable. And they have said they're investing a million plus dollars to reassess, to assess what is happening with the climate bill. On top of working with powerful ideas and New Yorkers for Clean Energy and all these AstroTurf companies to push out an incredible disinformation campaign.

By the way, we have to work double time, not just to understand and write the policies and the solutions, not to come out here and constantly defend what was already passed, but also millions and millions of dollars. They did it in California, they did it in the Pacific Northwest. They brought it here to New York State. We don't have that kind of money. We're dying. So I'm just here to say I'm going to appeal to you because I expect the Public Service Commission to do its job, enough is enough. Con Edison, they see their writing on the wall, they're all about implementing the

A.L.J. LECAKES: Our next speaker is, I think it's Aung Aung Hlaing. I can call her back later. Okay. We'll go to Jim Turner.

Turner. I am an I.B.E.W. Local 2199 member, and have been -- have been employed at National Fuel Gas since 2015. I.B.E.W. Local 2199 generally supports

National Fuel Gas initiatives as outlined in rate case 23-G-0627. These programs will help make substantial contributions towards achieving the decarbonization goals of the C.L.C.P.A.

These initiatives will be carried out by National Fuel Gas, who will take into consideration customer safety, reliability, and affordability. I.B.E.W. Local 2199 recognizes and supports National Fuel in their sustainability efforts. However, I.B.E.W. Local 2199 does not support the proposed closing of three customer service walk-in offices that are located in disadvantaged communities of Cheektowaga, Buffalo and Jamestown.

It's continually mentioned each month

1/24/2024 - National Fuel & Gas, Corp. - 23-G-0627 at our union meetings by our members who work at these walk-in centers, that customers have asked for these offices to be reopened by going directly there and pounding on the doors. To note customers also continued to use the National Field dropbox for their payments to be processed, even after being dissuaded by receiving letters in the mail advising them to find other payment options from the company.

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It needs to be taken into consideration that many customers rely on public transportation. They do not have internet service to look up sporadic outreach events, nor have bank accounts or cell phones and most -- most are elderly in these areas. Over the years, customers have come to rely on National Fuel's set hours on Monday through Friday for these in-person customer interactions for assistance with payment arrangements, HEAP, and many other billing problems. Thank you for allowing me to speak tonight. Your time and attention are truly appreciated on these very important matters.

A.L.J. LECAKES: Thank you very much.

Our next is going to be -- Alice -- Aung Aung Hlaing

did come back? Okay.

1/24/2024 - National Fuel & Gas, Corp. - 23-G-0627 AUNG AUNG HLAING: My name is Aung Aung Hlaing. I am refugee from Republic of Yemen. I'm being two years in Buffalo, New York. in 14207 zip code, which you can see more than 40% of the population are minority just like, you know, refugee/immigrants from Burma or Asia. So they're just like me. They work in the entry level jobs. So they live -- paycheck to paycheck they -- after paying the rent and the utility bills with this kind of, you know, this time of inflation, they can barely

meet the needs.

At the same time, my community members, they have the asthma, just like Mama Lucy, you know, not only the adult people, but also the children. If you look at the, you know, health disparity report of City of Buffalo, you know, 20% of the children has the asthma. So what did it come from is we have the environmental pollution and, you know, they rely on the Medicaid. Medicaid has the prescription for the -- medication for the asthma. If you look at the Medicaid expenses report, one of the prescriptions is asthma medication.

So if National Fuel, you know, raise the 30 percent for me, my family cannot afford to pay

1/24/2024 - National Fuel & Gas, Corp. - 23-G-0627 for the rate because I need to pay for the rent, I need to pay for another, you know, electricity and, you know, a lot of steps. And let me give you a holistic imagination. If we -- if Public Service Commission approved the request from National Fuel, number one is just like immigrant family, just like us, cannot afford to pay for the rate -- price increase and also New York State government need to spend a lot of money on Medicaid because we have more asthma. And then another scenario is we will have more frequent natural disaster just like this.

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This last year we had non-white
Christmas and then we had the snowstorm last week,
you know, who suffer? The low-income family. They
couldn't go to work, so they couldn't get paid. They
are starving at home. And, you know, they don't know
how to deal with that stuff. So at the same time,
every county government, C.E.O., Buffalo government
need to do a lot of snow shoveling. And, you know,
things like that, that will be a bad and over burden
everyone, not only on the government, but also for
the residents.

So I would like to request Public Service Commission to turn up the requests. And for

1/24/2024 - National Fuel & Gas, Corp. - 23-G-0627 me is if we let National Fuel raise the rate and, the case scenario is my, the immigrant family will be in deeper in the racial poverty and then we will have more asthma, we will have more environmental disaster and then for me, I won't wait for the poison we were breathing. Thank you very much.

A.L.J. LECAKES: Thank you very much.

Next, I have Isaac Hakizimana. We'll come back to
that one. Thomas James.

THOMAS JAMES: I just -- I just turned 22 years old and, you know, it's -- it's been kind of hard, man. You guys have the power to change our community seriously and raising that percentage is not going to help. But I'll tell you that right now. It's hard for people like me, you know, I, I live with three other men and we have to -- we have to -- we -- we go in on bills and stuff together. And just for one bill alone, it takes -- it takes a lot.

You feel me? Like, man, it is a lot of stress and, you know, a lot of people I live with -- the people I live with, looks up to me. And when they see me stressing, it makes it hard on all of us even though we still come together to pay this bill, we still have to go to other people for help. And it

1/24/2024 - National Fuel & Gas, Corp. - 23-G-0627 is -- it is quite embarrassing. And it's not even on a like, self-image type of look. It is -- it's a type of look like the simple fact that I have to go borrow from other people or get a loan or something to pay this bill.

And not even on me, but the people I'm living with as well, because I -- prices keep getting higher and higher and it's, it's kind of rough. Like we almost faced homelessness as well, you know, going to miss out on rent because we had to pay this bill but we have to be learning stuff and we have to take half showers. We have to cook, have to, you know, and it's hard being young doing this. It is not -- I lost my grandma recently, you feel me? And I'm, I'm on my own for real, for real with the, the people I live with.

Like we all -- we all going through this together, but it's only so much we can do when in our life, not even -- not even talking about fun stuff or going out to celebrate anything. I'm talking about everyday struggles that we still have to deal with because of bills like this. And it's not right. It's not. And, you know, most of the people in here, we're all low income so it's not hard

1/24/2024 - National Fuel & Gas, Corp. - 23-G-0627 on just me because I'm young or whatever and I spend my money on stuff, but it's -- people been going through this before I even was going through this and I never understood it until now. And it's quite hard, you know I'm just -- you guys have the power to change our communities and our lives for the better.

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A.L.J. LECAKES: Thank you. Next, I have Courtney Friedline.

than this guy. I'm Courtney Friedline. I am a first and foremost, I'm a resident of this city and a child of the city. I'm also a PUSH Buffalo organizer. A couple months ago I attended a winter weather prep event where National Fuel employees encouraged residents to apply for HEAP to help pay their gas bills. I want to wrap our minds around that for a minute. This gas giant is paying its employees to encourage residents to apply for public assistance to essentially pay their salaries instead of just doing the right thing and charging reasonable rates.

It's unfortunate that Buffalo residents continue to be under the thumb of National Fuel. We're spending valuable time tonight and lots before this, that should be used to take care of

1/24/2024 - National Fuel & Gas, Corp. - 23-G-0627 ourselves and our families to fight -- instead to fight this beast of a corporation. National Fuel is getting ready to put forth another increase when what they should be doing is working to reduce gas usage. We already know that many Buffalo residents can't afford gas bills.

We've been supplementing National Fuel with corporate welfare through entitlement programs like HEAP for decades. And why? So that National Fuel Executives can continue to rake in millions annually so that their shareholders can make, take home more profits. They don't need to raise rates, they want to. They want to keep making their millions on our backs. And if a resident isn't one of the folks who can't afford the rate increase, they'll be one of the ones supplementing it through the federal funding it's going to take to pay the National Fuel bills.

As a kid in the '80s, I watched my mom jump through hoops to get assistance to make sure the gas stayed on or jumping through hoops when the gas shut -- got shut off. That was back when residents had to stand outside in line all day to get approved in the snow and in the cold. Stop making poor people

I am with I.B.E.W. 2199. 13 A.L.J. KERSEY: Can you speak --? 14 A.L.J. LECAKES: Could you please

just move a little bit closer to the microphone? TERRESA PIERPAOLI: Oh, sorry.

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A.L.J. LECAKES: You're fine.

TERESA PIERPAOLI: Thank you. I'm with local I.B.E.W. Local 2199 and my name is Terry Pierpaoli and I've worked for National Fuel as a customer service representative at the Williamsville office for five and a half years. I'm the Union Steward for the call center, and I've been elected into the local 2199 executive board and I look to offer the best customer service that we can. I

1/24/2024 - National Fuel & Gas, Corp. - 23-G-0627 support National Fuel and their C.L.C.P.A. proposals because we do care about safety, affordability, and reliable service. Because of this, I'm against the permanent closing of the three National Fuel Customer Service walk-in offices that provide face-to-face contact for our customers.

From my personal experience as a phone representative speaking with rate payers on the phone on a daily basis, I'm continually asked when the National Fuel will reopen the customer walk-in service centers. And why they remain closed? We definitely know there's a public need and want these offices to be reopened. Constantly people are calling and saying that they need help with paying their bills, with looking for installment plans, with being able to find the best way to work with National Fuel.

And without the walk-in centers, we can't give them the customer service that they need and deserve, because some of our customers don't have internet access. They can't afford internet access. They might not have cell phones, or if they do have cell phones, they have limited cell phone minutes.

So when we invest time on the phone with them, I feel

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like we're taking away from their cell phone minutes,

their valuable time, and they in the - in the

interpersonal face-to-face customer service that we

can deliver in the call center, in the walk-in

center.

So I definitely hope that we can consider keeping the Walk-in Centers reopened for our customers to give the best customer service that we can and continue to offer the safe and reliable service that we have done.

A.L.J. LECAKES: Thank you. The next speaker I have is John Buckley.

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(Off the record 7:03 p.m.)

JOHN BUCKLEY: My name is John Buckley and I'm a member of PUSH for several years. I was on the board for 13 years and I was actually a member of PUSH when National Fuel asked for their last rate increase back in 2007, I think it was when gas prices were plummeting because of, you know, the excess gas fracking was put in the process. But when they were asking for a rate increase the last time there was something called a conservation incentive

1 1/24/2024 - National Fuel & Gas, Corp. - 23-G-0627 program demanded of the company asking for the rate 2 3 increase. Are you familiar with that? 4 A.L.J. LECAKES: Yes, I actually, 5 yeah. JOHN BUCKLEY: Is National Fuel 6 7 required to do a conservation incentive program in 8 order to get this rate increase? 9 A.L.J. LECAKES: The programs that are 10 applicable to the company have changed over the 11 years. There's similar incentives to those that 12 apply to the company. 13 JOHN BUCKLEY: Like what? 14 A.L.J. LECAKES: I -- I don't have the 15 information really available offhand. 16 JOHN BUCKLEY: The -- I know the last 17 time they -- first thing they did when they got the 18 rate increase was to tack a surcharge onto 19 everybody's bill and raise an extra \$10 million to 2.0 themselves without any increases of services or 21 products, you know, to the public. And with that \$10 22 million, they started running, you know, high-end, 23 very expensive TV commercials promoting National Fuel

and promoting themselves and telling people to turn

down the lights and turn off the -- turn down the gas

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1/24/2024 - National Fuel & Gas, Corp. - 23-G-0627 at night.

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And that was their conservation incentive program, along with, some -- advertising some high-end efficiency, you know, products. We met with the conservation or with the Public Service Commission at the time and recommended something that would actually conserve fuel and that is a whole house weatherization program where you actually weatherize these houses that have very little insulation in them. And you can conserve a lot of fuel, keep people warm and, you know, don't have to burn as much fuel.

I don't know, at the time I think the Public Service Commission said PUSH could use, maybe it was something like 5 percent of that -- that \$10 million to run a, you know, whole house weatherization program, which was very successful. And, you know, I just wondered if anything like that is in the works or are they just going to run some more TV ads or?

A.L.J. LECAKES: So right now the proposals from the company are made and Judge Kersey has the staff file testimony? All right. So as it exists right now in the rate case it's just a company

1/24/2024 - National Fuel & Gas, Corp. - 23-G-0627 proposal. What happens for the process is that the other parties that participate, including the Department of Public Service staff, are allowed to provide testimony and proposals of their own and that's how the rate case will develop. And so all of the proposals that are anticipated to be considered by the Commission haven't been brought forward yet because we haven't heard from parties like PUSH Buffalo.

We haven't heard from parties like the Public Utility Law Project yet, we haven't heard from the Department of Public Service staff yet. So those — so those programs are brought up. So I think what's most helpful tonight is if you could provide your recommended guidance to the Commission as to what programs you would support based on your experience and history participating in previous National Fuel Gas rate cases.

JOHN BUCKLEY: We'll -- we'll, definitely, I thought the conservation incentive program proposed by National Fuel is totally how it pays --.

A.L.J. LECAKES: With regard to advertising --.

JOHN BUCKLEY: Yeah. And advertising themselves and -- and telling people to turn down the lights. I mean, it is a little ridiculous, but whereas whole house weatherization is a proven way to, you know, conserve fuel and -- and make people more comfortable, very cost efficient. So yeah, I would definitely recommend that. I would not recommend a rate increase, however, that -- if that seems totally off base at this time, when there is the C.L.C.P.A. that's demanding that we, you know, decrease our carbon dioxide output and National Fuel is proposing to build all these, you know, pipelines and so on.

And we have to get beyond this deal.

I mean, we can -- those pipelines that are going to be investing millions and millions of dollars in things that are going to be totally useless, you know, in a few years down the road. I think businesses can't be built, you know, I think it's in 2035 that using any fossil fuels, they have to be electrified. So I don't think that, you know, it makes sense to invest, you know, in infrastructure -- very expensive infrastructure to an industry that it needs to be, you know, phased out.

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And I know Bill, he was talking about geothermal, the wind production, you know, solar energy and the sun. The sun itself, you know, provides more energy than the entire world can utilize. We just need to, you know, tap into that. We really need to -- I mean, it -- it is actually New York State law. We need to phase out this as quickly as possible so that, you know, our grandchildren have a place to live. Thank you.

A.L.J. LECAKES: Thank you very much. Next, I have Ben Siegel.

BEN SIEGEL: Good evening. I live in Buffalo, in the city of Buffalo. I've lived in the city of Buffalo for about 17 years, born and raised in Williamsville and for the last 17 years, I've worked in marketing, and branding, and communications, and business strategy, and have helped many local -- locally owned businesses and large corporations, as well, sell their product and sell their brand. And I understand marketing messaging very well, and most of it is bullshit.

A number of years ago I worked -- for a long time I worked for a local branding and strategy agency, and one of our clients was National

1/24/2024 - National Fuel & Gas, Corp. - 23-G-0627 Fuel. I worked directly with their senior marketing strategists, including people who are in this room tonight. I know that people have jobs to do, I know that they have bosses to please, and shareholders to pay, and I know that people on the front line of those jobs, including union workers and customer service representatives, want to do their very best in the customers that they serve, in the communities that they live and work in.

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I understand all that, and I know that

-- I know how the business entity makes all that
happen is because they tell lies and they tell
stories to people about how -- how -- why their
products are the best and why their business model is
correct and I know what probably those marketing
individuals here and elsewhere are thinking when they
hear the stories of community members like you're
hearing tonight. They're thinking, they just don't
understand how it works. They don't understand. I
feel -- I feel for them.

I really feel for them, but that's got nothing to do with what we do. How is a snowstorm connected to gasoline pipes. It's all connected.

It's all connected and it's made exponentially worse

1/24/2024 - National Fuel & Gas, Corp. - 23-G-0627 when the people whose lives are on the front lines of communities that are in disrepair and that don't have the protection and the comfort that folks like me have, frankly and folks like I imagine you do as well. And the rest of the Public Service Commission.

They don't understand -- they don't connect those dots and they take for granted the fact that their customers are smart people and there's a saying in the organizing world that we know what we need, where we live -- where we all live. I know that because I work at PUSH Buffalo and I'm their director of communications and I'm on the other side of that fence now. And I understand that marketing, when used correctly, can do a lot of good. Marketing can connect, and messaging, and stories, and truth telling can really work when you're actually telling the truth.

So those who are on the side of
National Fuel, those who work for National Fuel and
make the decisions, and those on the Commission that
are sympathetic to National Fuel and their -- their
needs as an entity, need to trust the fact that those
same customers that are giving them all of their
money are right here telling you and have been

1/24/2024 - National Fuel & Gas, Corp. - 23-G-0627 telling you for years that they're dying because of those lies and nothing else should matter than that. Nothing else should matter than the stories of real people telling you the real truth. National Fuel is not the only entity to blame for the -- the -- the struggles that real people face.

And no one's saying that either. No one's saying National Fuel is solely to blame for -for people's woes. But they are a huge component of
it. And even if they weren't, why would they add to
that? I understand that corporations -- some people
believe corporations are people and they're not. But
I do respect everybody who works there. Take any
ounce of whatever soul you know you have, and listen
to what people are saying and decide what is more
important to you and to this community because when
the waters flood our city, we will be in that flood
as well and everybody will lose because of your
greed. Thank you.

A.L.J. LECAKES: Thank you. One of the last of the cards that I received, although we do have two people that I called on that did not show up. Oh, wait, we also have another card that's coming out, but is Hawa, H-A-W-A Sophal here? Okay.

So it was just very hard for me. So as a student, just like, I look for myself too, just for myself. So, yeah. That's it.

A.L.J. LECAKES: Thank you very much. Clarke Gocker.

CLARK GOCKER: Good evening. Thanks for the opportunity to testify tonight. Yeah, my name's Clark Gocker. I'm a 20-year resident of the city of Buffalo from Western New York. I'm born and raised in Rochester. And yeah, I've come to -- to love the city here. And yeah, I'm a homeowner. I've owned my home since 2006. I've got a couple of apartment units in the house I live in and, you know, each of the apartments are -- are separately metered.

So, you know, I hear from my tenants you know, their -- their struggles and in, you know, paying gas bills. You know, I've done a lot of the -- the work on my house has been done, kind of D.I.Y.

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I've done a lot of the -- the insulation and you

know, other repairs to -- it's a, you know, 120-yearold home. And that's taken a lot of time, lot of

sweat equity. It's taken me 20 years just to restore

what was a house that was in pre-foreclosure when I

purchased it in 2006 and -- and uninhabitable to -
make it a home for myself and for the other folks

that had lived in the house.

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And yeah, I had a bit of a scare this My tenant she called me in the morning her summer. - her partner happened to be a firefighter in Buffalo, and she's like, you know, I think I smell gas in the house. And so she called me very concerned, said, you know, Alan, can you check it out? So I come downstairs in her foyer, sure enough, real thick, really thick smell of gas. So I didn't waste any time called, you know, National Fuel. And -- and to the credit of their workforce and their employees and their maybe the, you know, operations, like, they dispatched workers to the house, super courteous and professional and they responded, you know, as -- as first responders, they, you know, diagnosed the issue.

It was on their side of the

1/24/2024 - National Fuel & Gas, Corp. - 23-G-0627 distribution line. And so they mobilized the crew to the house to come to repair the -- the service line from the gas main. And, you know, I was kind of, you know, I didn't have high expectations. I hold a certain opinion of the company but I learned a lot about their -- their workers and gained a lot of respect that day for quality of service that they provided. But never -- nevertheless that they came in, they -- you know, I advised them on, you know, where I would like meters placed, had the opportunity to relocate some meters outside the -- that were in the basement to outside of the house.

And they did that. They again, courteous, professional but what I found really interesting, and I feel like this is a narrative the company is now promoting. And a lot of the -- the marketing that's been described and some others have talked about here, the misinformation is that, you know, the transition to a equitable renewable energy economy is going to rob all of us of choice. And I found myself in that moment without a choice. If I had my, you know, my druthers, I would've preferred to, you know, maybe abandon the gas system on my property.

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And that's kind of an aspiration of mine to electrify my home, to fully weatherize it, but that wasn't even an option that was presented.

And, and it may be one of the cons I wonder what it costs to send three, you know, maybe they were

I.B.E.W. members, you know, three union workers to my house for a 10-hour day with a back hoe you know, with other equipment that, you know, probably cost more than I earn, you know, in a year, if not, you know, five years of employment.

And so just imagining like if we, you know, want to strategically, you know, downsize this gas system, decommission the infrastructure, I think we're missing a lot of opportunity. And so, you know, my comment here is really it's very granular. You know, I support all the -- the -- the big picture, you know, I think the -- the struggle and the yearnings and the visions that other folks tonight have shared, but I just wanted to share this like more so of kind of, it's very concrete experience that I think there could be a real opportunity to not really non-emergency situations. Yeah.

Emergency in the sense that there's a

1/24/2024 - National Fuel & Gas, Corp. - 23-G-0627 gas leak to stabilize that, but then in terms of, you know, replacing in kind the that distribution infrastructure without providing a homeowner, a business owner, maybe even the community with -- with a choice. And -- and it turned out, you know, you know, then I, you know, brought to mind like, I think a neighbor had a gas leak like two months prior, and then just maybe a month ago, like three doors down, another gas leak. And so clearly the -- the strain on that one you know, distribution line that fed off the main was compromised. And so I feel like there could have been again strategic action taken maybe at a block level in that moment. And it wasn't diagnosed in that way.

And I think that to me, it just illustrated like some of the inherent, maybe kind of structural flaws of how the system is designed to kind of self-perpetuate to be kind of kept in service. And so would urge the Commission in this rate case to keep an open mind about, you know, alternatives to decommissioning the system that that may not be, you know, front of mind at the moment. And I'll, you know, also a -- an employee of PUSH Buffalo and I think we do have plans to, to file for

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We're not parties currently. We -we are parties in the long-term gas plan case, and I
would echo Bill Nowak's recommendation that you know,
all the -- the -- the matter material in the longterm plan case be transferred over to the -- to the
rate case. There's some really valuable information
there. I know Bill quoted, you know, the -- the \$1.1
billion of cost savings on the higher electrification
pathway. Again, by the company's own admission in
that case over the next eight years, they anticipate
spending \$1.3 billion of our money just to maintain
existing gas infrastructure.

And that's crazy, right? That to me
- that just violates the law, right, in spirit and

letter. So, you know, here we are. And so I urge

the Commission like waste no more time; listen to the

community, right? We're the community, we're the

constituents of New York State. We're the ones that

fought hard, is -- is, you know sister Lucy over

there said to -- to win the C.L.C.P.A. So you know,

I'll -- I'll stop there, but yeah, I look forward to

-- to collaborating with the -- the Commission to,

you know, find the solutions that are community

A.L.J. LECAKES: Thank you. The next party I have, is it Richard Dread?

Dread. I'm a proud new member of PUSH Buffalo, but I'd like to try to bring this home as far as making it more real to not only some of my colleagues, but to you guys as well. I come from a family of 13 and I'm the baby of the siblings. My family -- we moved 18 times before I got out of high school, 18 times because we were on the social services and things like that. We were -- they wasn't able to keep up with the rent, so we had to go. Each one of those times, we moved, the gas company, light company was part of that. We couldn't afford to pay that either. Okay.

Which forces families like mine to -to be involved with the criminal activity as I look
at it in later life, criminal activity. Since that
it was 18 of us, each one of us where we moved, that
that bill was transferred to the other sibling's
name. So you had it growing up as a child, you had a
gas bill, you know what I mean? And that continued
and that's what happened in our community. The

1/24/2024 - National Fuel & Gas, Corp. - 23-G-0627 reason why it's so important for you to see the realization of it now is because those bills were not paid and cannot be paid, which happens nowadays when you try to get an apartment. If you got a gas bill, something like that, you didn't pay, you can't get an apartment they won't rent to you.

This is a devastating -- devastation that's happening in our community, and you guys are part of it. You're forcing us to become criminals in order to survive. We shouldn't have to do that. It shouldn't be, you know, and I want to be real about it. We're going to survive because in the past when we did with -- with the utilities, I hooked my phone my -- my line up to yours and vice versa and it perpetuates, it keeps going. And it shouldn't have to -- we shouldn't have to live like that. Thanks for letting me share.

A.L.J. LECAKES: Thank you very much.

All right. That's the extent of the speakers that we have tonight. I'd like to thank everyone for their participation, and for showing up tonight, and providing the public comments. But I want to remind everyone that even if you didn't speak tonight, it is not too late to provide comments to the Public
