LECAKES: I call case 24-E-4 This is a proceeding on the Motion of the 5 Commission as to the Rates, Charges, Rules, and Regulations of Orange and Rockland Utilities, 6 7 Incorporated for Electric Service, and case 24-G-0061, a proceeding on the Motion of the Commission as 8 9 to the Rates, Charges, Rules, and Regulations of the Orange and Rockland Utilities, Incorporated for Gas 10 11 Service. Good afternoon and welcome. 12 We are 13 here today for a public statement hearing that was 14 noticed on May 23rd, 2024. 15 This public statement hearing concerns 16 the proposed increases to the electric and gas 17 delivery rates of Orange and Rockland Utilities, 18 Incorporated. 19 Orange and Rockland filed for new 20 electric and gas rates on January 26th, 2024, to 21 become effective January 1st, 2025. The Company seeks 22 to increase its electric delivery revenues by 23 approximately \$18 million, a 3.7% increase in total 24 revenues, and its gas delivery revenues by

approximately \$14.4 million, or a 6.3% increase in

If allowed, the increases would result in total monthly bill increases for an average residential customer of approximately \$8.81, or 6%, for electric bills, and \$12.73 for gas bills. The Company states that the proposed increases are necessary to allow for necessary investments in critical energy infrastructure and to adequately compensate its employees and develop and implement initiatives that advance the goals of New York State's Climate, Leadership, and Community Protection Act. Currently, the rate case parties have entered into summative discussions regarding the Company's filings.

My name is Dakin Lecakes, and I am the Chief Administrative Law Judge for the New York State Public Service Commission. Also with me today is Judge Erika Bergen. We are presiding over the hearings in this case and the development of a record on behalf of the Commission. At the conclusion of our process, we will make recommendations to the Commission based on the evidence collected in this case.

The Public Service Commission has

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The purpose of today's hearing is to provide the public with an opportunity to tell the Commission their thoughts on the Company's proposed rate files. Statements made today will become part of the case record. We have a court reporter with us today who will prepare a transcript of the hearing that will be included in the official record so that your comments can be considered and read by all the members of the Commission. When ready, the transcript will be available for view on the Department of Public Service website.

Today's hearing is not a question and answer session, but a forum to hear comments from the public. If you do have any questions, however, there are representatives of Orange and Rockland here to discuss any matters with you about the rates of your utility service in the City, seated right over here.

Please note that if you do not wish to speak at today's hearing, but would like your views included in the record, there are a variety of other

When I call your name, please speak slowly and clearly so that the court reporter can accurately record your statement. And with that, we will start with our first speaker, Bruce Levine.

MR. LEVINE: Thank you. Thank you so much. Judges, I start by apologizing for the need to do what I'm doing, stuff on the record. And it is because, due to an illness, I failed to meet the deadline to file my own testimony, which I usually do. I am an active party to the case and -- and will participate in settlement negotiations and try to get things done from there.

What I want to talk to you about is the need to require significantly greater, I'll put it that way, incentives for both heat pumps and electric car chargers. These are not inexpensive items in some ways, but when you look at the car -- my car charging idea and proposal, it's not to do it just home by home as electric cars do in their substance. That's small-scale thinking, no offense

What I've proposed in the past, and I'm going to propose again, is that every municipal building in the territory of Orange and Rockland, over a period of years, being five years, it could be ten years, that they would each get banks of three to four car charging stations that would create an infrastructure to support car charging electric cars throughout the entire region on a decentralized basis. That's the basic idea, and we're still working on trying to understand the cost of it. There are obviously some subsidies available, but it's not going to be a small cost.

I'm asking you to add that to whatever they get me, if you will, right, as a rate increase to cover those costs. In the long run, it will be of huge environmental and, I believe, also economic value to the Company and -- and to the public.

The second thing is heat pumps. There are significant state and federal incentives for heat pumps. And while I asked the Company sort of for a breakdown of what they -- what they were incentivizing, it was not searchable. So I don't really have a clear picture of how many heat pumps

6/18/2024 - Orange & Rockland - 24-E-0060, 24-G-0061 they're installing and whether they're geothermal or otherwise. And -- and I believe that what this Public Service Commission in this hearing should do is, basically, create what we're going to experiment.

Have the Company put in between five and ten in their territory, each year, for three to five years again, and then examine it to see whether it made a significant difference to have them do that. And again, utilizing all the existing incentives, I don't want to lay it on -- entirely lay it on -- lay it on the ratepayers, given the fact that there are these incentives out there. And they could be easily 20, \$30,000.

So those are really my requests and what I'm interested in in focusing in on this rate case. As always, there are people who understand the actual rates much better than I do. We live through PULP and municipal interveners. Those guys are great. So thank you so much. I appreciate your time.

A.L.J. LECAKES: Thank you very much for your comment. With that, we have no other speakers listed. What we're going to do is we're going to go off the record in a moment and we'll keep

Only one other person had entered the room indicating that they were going to provide a comment through other means. So I guess in conclusion, I'd like to thank everyone who participated today, for showing up. And thank you for the comments that we received today. With that, our hearing is concluded and we are off the record.

A.L.J. BERGEN: We're back on the record at 1:49. We had gone off the record for lack of speakers and we now have another participant who would like to make a statement. You may begin.

MS. DRECHSLER: Do I only have three minutes or more than three minutes?

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A.L.J. BERGEN: You can have more than three minutes.

MS. DRECHSLER: Okay. So my name is Jacqueline Drechsler. I live in Valley Cottage, New York. I'm also speaking for my twin sister, who lives with me, named Jocelyn DiPosenza (phonetic spelling).

So I was just informed that this was starting at one and I was told it was at two, and I understand we've only had one other person come to speak?

A.L.J. BERGEN: Yes.

MS. DRECHSLER: Okay. So I'd like to say a couple things about that. Going back in time a bit, on the morning of April 14, 2022, I went to a Zoom Public Service Commission session on the Champaign-Hudson Power Express. I made notes to me, before the (unintelligible) session, and all of a sudden, it was an O and R rate -- rate case discussion.

I wasn't allowed to be part of that discussion, it was their discussion. Five people, myself included, and our former Rockland County Legislator, Harriet Cornell, had put in comments.

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One of the Commissioners, and I won't mention the

name, although maybe I should, but I'm not going to,

had the unmitigated gall to say, and I quote, Well,

only five people commented, so clearly, Rockland

County residents don't care about this, end quote.

The rate hike was approved. Maybe that fellow didn't

know that people were listening.

I'm sure you can see the same thing here today, which clearly, if I'm only the second person coming forward to speak, there's a problem with communication. Because people don't know about this. The lady outside informed me that, oh, it's in the libraries, and here and there. But unless you're actually going to the library and you actually see a notice, you don't know about this.

If it's put into the papers, in the (unintelligible) General News under legal notices, who's going to be looking through, trolling through the Journal News, which most people can't afford anymore, looking for legal notices about a possibility of a rate hike? And if it's posted into the Rockland County Times, well, half the time, you can't find that paper anywhere. So I have an idea.

I have an idea, which is that O and R

6/18/2024 - Orange & Rockland - 24-E-0060, 24-G-0061 should be inserting notices of rate hike cases and P.S.C. hearings into people's monthly bills, along with the correct email address for Secretary Phillips, or whomever one would be writing to on this at the P.S.C., a correct email address, and a case number. That would be engagement with public and customers, not what is currently happening and has been happening for years.

Two, O and R should be installing multiple E.V. charging stations in every town, multiple, and public parks. If we're going to be moving over to electric, which is what you should be doing, there needs to be the ability for people to charge their vehicles. I personally can't, because I live in a condo, and I'm not allowed to do that. I'm not allowed to run an electric cord out my window down two stories to my car.

And they're not going to invest in a charging station for where I live. So I have to go down into some town and hope that there's a charging station that's free.

O and R should be providing serious incentives, financial incentives for customers who want to invest in good heat pumps, not cruddy little

As of a year or two ago, only 6.43% of the energy supply was from in-state renewable energy, only 6.43%. The rest was mostly from gas and coal-fired power plants. And O and R should be including rebates, good ones, for appliances such as electric stoves and ovens and dishwashers. I know they do something in conjunction with Veolia, who also stinks. And I don't understand why dishwashers are not included in this.

I want this Commission to know that

Rockland County residents do care very much about the
exorbitant and constant rate hikes that are squeezing
the lifeblood out of us. My costs have gone up \$300
this year in electricity charges. Partly my fault,
because I decided to move over to a group thing where
all of my energy comes from in-state renewable
energy. So I am paying the cost for that. That was
my choice. I didn't realize it was going to be quite
so high. Because you'll still have all of these
delivery charges and charges from O and R.

And quite honestly, I have to say, the previous rate hike they had, which was for building underground wires for five miles, came to something

6/18/2024 - Orange & Rockland - 24-E-0060, 24-G-0061 like 2 or \$3 million a mile. This is money that should be invested otherwise, although underground is pretty smart. But I have to say that this Company needs to move over to electric in a different way.

So we do care. We are still trying to recover from COVID and get back on track post-COVID.

And I do believe that this kind of rate hike is unconscionable.

I think that's pretty much all I have to say, because this is very unprepared. I was sitting in the diner writing my comments before coming here, because I only heard about it through the grapevine, at the last minute, and you can see how many elected officials have come, how many of the public have come. None. One person. This is a shame.

It's a shame that you do not have engagement with the public. That the P.S.C. doesn't have engagement with the public. And that O and R doesn't have engagement with the public. And that any utility that comes through you doesn't have engagement with the public and that's allowed and it should not really matter. Thank you.
