The only difference, really, is where you'll be waking up on Christmas Day. Will it be at a sister's or brother's home this year, or with Mom and Dad at their home? Will it be with your family, alone in your own home, with calls to make to relatives as Christmas Day progresses?


And so, dear Reader, have a safe and wonderful Christmas and holiday season.

Fort Plain CS looking to save on energy costs

FORT PLAIN — Like just about every school district in New York State, Fort Plain Central School has been socked with higher-than-anticipated energy bills this year. District officials have taken significant steps to save money on energy and hope to save even more in the future through a building project.

One basic step that has been implemented, Superintendent of Schools Douglas Burton said, is lowering of thermostats from 74 degrees to a still comfortable average of 68-70 degrees. "We hope that will help to conserve on our fuel costs this winter," he said.

District officials have also been looking at fuel costs for field trips and may need to limit or eliminate the trips at some point this year.

Steps such as these are necessary, Burton said, because the district has to be responsible to its taxpayers. "We have to stay within a budget as best we can. We're no different from any other school district. Staff has been very positive in conserving heat and cutting down on lighting whenever possible," he said.

District officials are also looking to reduce energy costs in future years.

"One of the goals of the new capital project is to finish all our energy-efficiency needs. We could realize even more savings than we do now," Burton said. But, he emphasized, the district will not proceed with a new building project if it causes an increase in taxes.

During the 2004-05 school year, Fort Plain paid \$180,584 for electricity and \$117,530 for natural gas. For the 2005-06 school year, \$200,000 is budget-

ed for electricity and \$150,000 for gas.

"Considering the increases we're seeing this year," said Business Manager Carl Rockefeller, "this is probably nowhere near what we will need."

A new energy monitoring system installed during the last building project is helping to save on heating costs. A computer controls the temperature in individual rooms and areas. If no one is scheduled to be in a room on, for example, Monday, Wednesday, and Friday, the computer is

programmed to heat that room on those days to the lowest set temperature. "When rooms aren't occupied we aren't heating them," Burton said.

This is the second year for the new

Fort Plain residents, property owners reminded

FORT PLAIN — Section 157-13 of the Code of the Village of Fort Plain establishes the duty of owners and occupants of real property to remove snow and ice from the paved width of adjoining public sidewalks whether the property is occupied or not.

The Code provides that you have twenty-four (24) hours to remove snow and ice from the sidewalk and/or salt and sand any ice on said sidewalk if the ice can not be removed.

Section 157-16 states that if you fail to clear the sidewalk and the village has to notify you, you have four (4) hours to remove the snow or the Village will remove it at your expense for labor, equipment and materials, starting at minimal cost of \$50.

Village Code 157-19. Deposit in street prohibited. (No person, firm or corporation shall deposit, throw, place or strew, nor shall any person, firm or corporation cause to be deposited, thrown, placed or strewn any snow or ice upon any street, avenue or roadway within the Village of Fort Plain.

DPW to close cemetery

ST. JOHNSVILLE — The St. Johnsville Department of Public Works would like to inform the residents of the Village that the St. Johnsville cemetery is now closed for the winter.

They would also like residents to be advised that all home owners are responsible for keeping their sidewalks free of snow and ice. If they do not do so, they will be given a 24 hour notice before the village has it removed at the home owners expense. Also, residents are advised not to shovel or throw snow into the road.

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
