



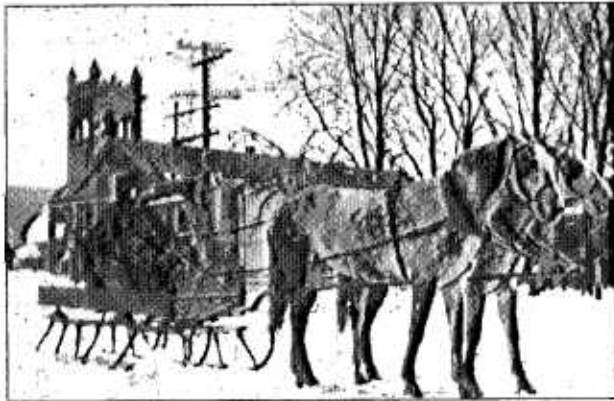
10 to noon is the Centennial Stamp Cancellation; Centennial Celebration & Eagle Camera Dedication starts at noon.

Artists in Walworth

The Western Wayne Art Group met February 18 at the Walworth Town Hall. Featured guest (pictured) was Sally Wood Winslow, director of the Gallery at High Falls in Rochester. The Gallery was created 11 years ago to honor artists who live, work and play in and around Monroe County. The Gallery owns no art, and does not represent any particular artists. It has four open-entry and two juried shows every year, with top-notch pros exhibiting next to first-time exhibitors.



Wood Winslow holds a BFA in studio art from the University of Kentucky with a concentration in soft sculpture and ceramics, graduate work included sculpture and theatre in the fine arts department of Arizona State University. Areas of intense interest have been painting, quilting and photography, with a growing interest in digital manipulation of the latter.

Western Wayne Art Group members brought in their own finished and in-progress artwork for Wood Winslow to critique. As she commented on each piece, she discussed the use of general design rules, and why they are helpful in both creating and analyzing art.

Other nuts-and-bolts subjects were: using diagonals as key elements in composition; using contrasting textures for interest; experimentation with brushes to take advantage of their full range of abilities; discussion of matting, framing and glass quality. In addition to the technical aspects of creating art, she discussed engaging the viewer with story-telling and humor.

The art group meets on the third Tuesday of the month at the Walworth Town Hall, 3600 Lorraine Drive. Meetings begin at 7 p.m. with business followed by a demonstration/ workshop.

Join the artists March 18 and see a demonstration by Sharon Woolever.

The Black Knights extended Coach Christie's career by a game, when they came from behind to defeat Campbell/Savona 55-48 at the Blue Cross Arena.

Marion forged a 14-14 tie after one period of play. Campbell/Savona came back in the second period and led 28-20 at halftime. Marion trailed by as many as 15 points in the game.

Said Christie, "This a dream come true." Marion trailed 39-32 heading into the fourth period. Kyle Elvin connected on two 3-pointers in less than ten seconds making it 41-38.

After a Campbell/Savona 3-pointer made it 44-38, Marion put the defense to work. Matt Elvin had two steals and two lay-ups in 15 seconds. Marion trailed 44-42.

The game was tied after Elvin's steal (he had 10 steals in the game) resulted in a Justin Devlin jump shot. Marion took the lead for good when Elvin stole the ball again and made two foul shots.

Kyle Elvin and Devlin each scored 10 points in the win: Marion was 11 of 14 from the foul line and shot 19 of 57 from the field including 6 of 20 in the game from the three-point line.

On March 1 Marion was 22-1 on the year. Kyle Elvin and Justin Devlin were named to the All Tourney Team. Jared Schutt was named Most Valuable Player, scoring 13 points.
